Announcement is made this week by the Brady school board of the definite selection of the site for the new Brady high school building. Block 183 and the south three-fourths of Block 184 are the ones selected, and the former, in all probability, will be chosen for the actual site of the new building. The property is located across the street north and two blocks east of the stand-pipe, while Block 184 comprises the Mrs. Betty Tulk property and lies east of the Noyes block. The John Tulk residence occupies the north one-quarter of Block 184, and is not included in the transfer of this block.
