

U. S. CROP FORE-CAST 10,135 BALES **DECLINE IN TEX**

Washington, Oct. 3. - A reduction of 440,000 bales during September in prospective cotton production this year was shown in the Department of Agriculture's forecast issue today placing the crop at 10,135,000 equivalent 500-pound bales. The decline in the condition of the crop from Aug. 25 to Sept. 25 was 7.0 points, compared with a 10-year average decline of 5.8 points.

IN NEW DRILLING As a result of the big gas strike on the W. Z. Stapleton farm, 14 miles

STRIKE RESULTS

north of Brady, several weeks ago. four new wells have been contracted in the vicinity of the gasser. The contract was made by O. L. Billingsley, who for the past several years has been drilling in the Mercury section, and the wells will be located on a 600-acre block, towards which some thirteen farmers have contributed acreage. Those who have acreage included in the block are Dr. J. G. Mc-Call, Lem Holland, W. Z. Stapleton, Paul Jones, J. A. Spencer, E. H. Mc-Cluskey, H. H. Knight, Sam Hughes, C. H. Price, L. L. Lay, D. A. Roper, T. B. Baker, W. J. McCartney. All four of the wells are to be drilled to a depth of 500 ft., unless pay oil or gas is struck at a lesser depth, and the first well is to be spudded in at

The first well will be located somewhere near the gas well, while the location of subsequent wells will depend upon the showings had.

Speaking of the oil prospects, Mr. Billingsley said he was certain there was oil there, and that with as near a perfect structure as can be found, he believed it the prettiest proposition and the best chance for oil he has yet encountered.

The Stapleton well, originally drilled for water, struck two sands, the first at 369 and the second at 469. with a gas flow that steadily increased, until at present a steam guage registers a pressure of 85 poundsmaking it the strongest gas well this side of Brownwood. Mr. Stapleton has had the gas piped to his house and is using it for light, heat and cooking, the gas being carried thru a two-inch pipe. As a result, the well has proved of greater value to im than if it had been a water we







A column story in the Santa Barbara (Calif.) Daily News tells how J. L. Mead, the millionaire Chicago bicycle dealer, got his first start through a want ad. The closing paragraphs of that story are as follows:

"The history of Mead's career reads like a romance. During the boom days of Wichita, Kans., he first made and then lost a fortune. He went to Chicago and got clerical employment, but his eyes gave way and he had to try to make a living for himself and family outside an office. His chief asset was an old-fashioned ordinary bicycle. He put a want ad in a daily and sold this very readily. A friend asked him to help sell another bicycle. He did this and made a small commission. That gave him an idea. He began to sell bicycles on commission, advertising both to buy and to sell bicycles. From the first he made money and soon he was making more than an ordinary clerical salary. Then he began repairing bicycles. From that he began to manufacture them and quickly made a fortune.

"Then he went back to Wichita and bought up some of the busted real estate. Last year this was taxed for more than a million dollars and he paid the taxes. He now has a winter home in Pasadena and is on his way there now to spend the winter with his wife and family. He is the founder, president and principal owner of the Mead Cycle company of Chicago."
