BRADY WATER & LIGHT WORKS TO IN-STALL ANOTHER ENGINE AND PUMP

\$10,000 WORTH OF NEW EQUIPMENT AND IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE AT LOCAL MUNICIPAL PLANT-NEW UNIT WILL BE USED ON WATER PUMPS.

New equipment and improvements at the Brady Water & Light Works plant totaling \$10,000, have been authorized by the board of trustees. The new equipment includes a 100-horsepower Fairbanks-Morse engine and a new Sullivan air-compressor, which will be used exclusively to operate all the water pumps in the pit, thereby taking all this load off the two engines now in use, and which will be used in developing light and power. The new equipment will be a duplicate of the engines and compressor now in use, and will add another unit to the present 200-horsepower





fore is entitled to Federal aid. Without question, some interesting facts will be developed in the program of addresses by these speakers, and Brady and McCulloch county citizens owe it to themselves and their county to be present at the meeting in order that they may realize how vitally important it is that this highway be developed. As the matter now stands, there is grave danger of losing this designation, and all points on the entire highway route must co-operate on the work.

The following letter received by H. F. Schwenker, county vice-president of the P. S.-to-G. highway association, from Secretary Boswell, sets forth the situation very clearly:

"As stated in my telegram of this date, the annual convention of the Puget-Sound-to-Gulf Highway association will be held at Brady Wednesday, November 22, beginning at 10:00 a. m. This is a most important meeting, as the highway may lose its designation unless the association evidences more activity.

"The time until the meeting is very short and it is up to the county vicepresidents to see that delegations are worked up from their respective counties. 


