

LIVING AT HOME

Many writers of today suggest thrift and economy as the one principal that will put the country back on its feet and gone further than that. gone further than that. Ford's plan for employees, also some Kansas firms have adopted the plan of requiring that their employees shall save a certain per cent of their salary, and have posted notices about their place of business: "Save your money or lose your job." Most every one will agree that the American people acquired the extravagant habit during the war, and that it is difficult to overcome. Neverthelesss we also agree that we should be more thrifty.

The accomplishment of J. B. Whiteman of Brady is a good example of what most men can do if they will only try. "Whitie," as he is commonly known in Brady, is the manager of the West Texas Telephone Company. He has a very efficient office here, and can usually be found looking after the Company's business and that is the reason that it is unusual that he finds time to do so many other things in addition to his regular duties.

"Whitie" served on the school board, and on the water board; he is active in the various bodies of the Masonic lodge, a member of the Luncheon Club, and a member of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce. Ordinarily when a person is found who belongs to so many organizations, he is inactive in all of them, or most of them, any way. But not so with shape. MANN-RICKS AUTO "Whitie," for he never shirks.

Now, this story is not being written to boost "Whitie," but to encourage some other fellow who is under the impression that his position takes up so much of his time that he does not have time to do anything else.

"Whitie" kas a cow, some chickens, and a garden to cut down the family living expenses and during his spare moments he takes care of them and incidentally he kept a record of their production, which he submitted as follows: During the year he kept an average of 23 hens and he received 3103 eggs; he had 41 fryers and 5 hens for the home table; he sold 108 dozen eggs, bringing him \$32.40-an average of 30 cents per dozen; he consumed 1800 eggs for home uses; the feed for the year cost him \$66.05. Estimating the fryers at fifty cents each and the hens at \$1.00 each, the eggs consumed by the family cost slightly more than one cent per dozen; the chickens were fed Purina food and sprouted oats; the size of the chicken lot is 66x70 feet.

The record on the cow is for eight months, during which time she produced 720 gallons of milk and 240 pounds of butter; milk and butter sold above home consumption brought \$198.25. The feed for the cow cost \$113.15, leaving a net profit above home consumption of \$85.10. The cow was fed Purina Cow Chow.

Now the garden is a small place of 35x40 feet, but it proved profitable and carried its part of the burden of supplying the family table and furnishing some for the market. Raised 213 pounds of tomatoes, sold 113 pounds for \$6.78, canned 12 quarts of tomato sauce, 12 quarts of beets, 10 quarts of beans and had plenty of green vegetables for the home table.
