Breast cancer screening set

A special clinic offering breast cancer screening will be held at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt next Thursday, April 16, and those who wish to schedule an appointment should call (806) 356-1905 or 1-800-377-4673.

The clinic is being sponsored by the Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a registered nurse.

Cost for the screening is \$75 and a minimum of 15 women must register for the clinic to be held. Funding is available through the Texas Dept. of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and by performing a breast self-exam each month.

p.m., beginning April 18. No appointment is necessary, and walk-ins are welcome. For more information, call the local office at 806-647-4240 during regular business hours.

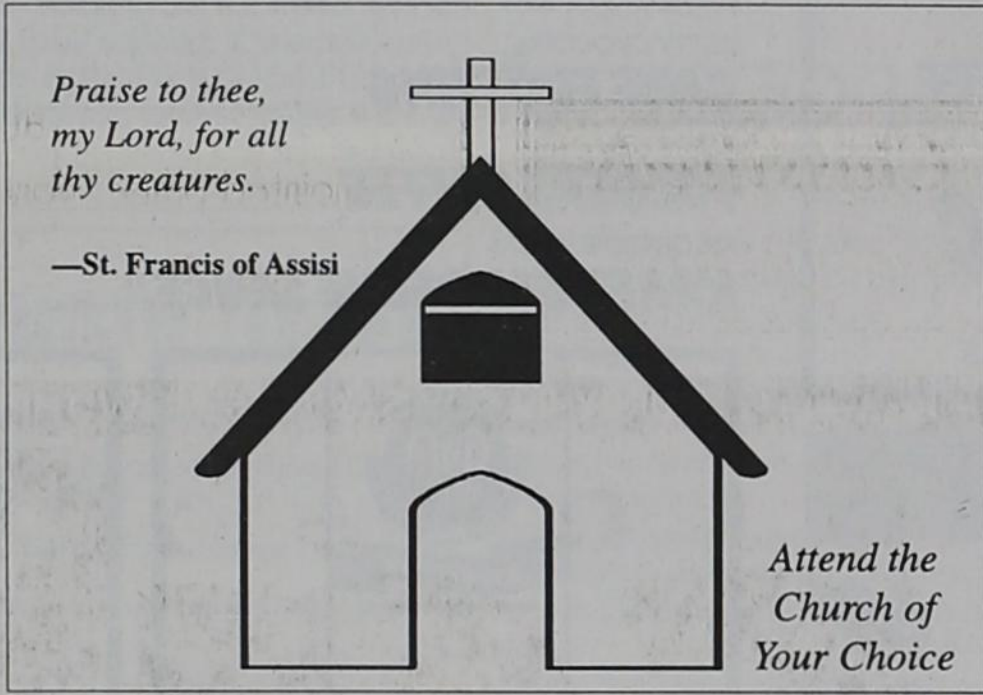

Deadline for applications is April 27.

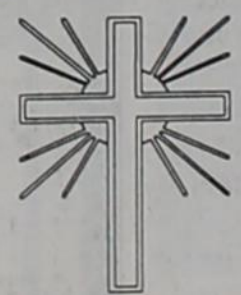
MS Society plans meeting

Producers to get tips on battling boll weevils

Ways individual cotton producers can adjust their production systems this season to better manage boll weevils will be presented during a special three-hour workshop on April 17 at the Texas Cotton Ginners Conference and Trade Show at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

Without a coordinated weevil eradication program in operation on the Texas High Plains, individual growers are on their own this season in battling what is shaping up as a heavy onslaught by the insects, said Dr. Randy Boman, cotton agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

To help them and growers across Texas and in neighboring states mount the best possible attack on boll weevils, the Extension Service

and Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., are conducting the special workshop from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m.

Producers who participate will receive continuing education units needed for state certification of pesticide applicators.

"On the South Plains, the state's largest and most concentrated cotton production region, we're looking at record numbers of weevils that went into overwintering habitat last season," said Boman.

Surveys by scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service are finding the survival rate of those overwintered weevils is very high, he said.

"What this points to is probably a record year for weevils in the Southern High Plains," Boman said.

The seminar will open with an overview of the weevil situation across the state by Dr. James Supak. He is the associate head of the department of soil and crop sciences at Texas A&M University and former Extension Service cotton agronomist at Lubbock.

Brant Baugh, Extension integrated pest management (IPM) agent in Lubbock County, will identify weak links in the weevil's biological structure.

Boll weevil management from start to finish will be covered by Phillip Kidd, Extension IPM agent in Terry and Yoakum counties. Proper timing of control efforts will be chronicled by Clyde Crumley, Extension IPM agent in Gaines County. Lubbock County Extension agricultural agent Mark Brown will discuss the importance of planting for an early crop.

In-season management will be covered by Dr. Dan Krieg, Leideg, professor of crop physiology at

Texas Tech University. Boman will discuss timely termination.

A panel of crop consultants will present their perspectives on crop management for the 1998 season. Panel members will be Dana Palmer, John Hunter, Donald Kitten and Bob Glodt. Following a question and answer period, Dr. John Abernathy, dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Texas Tech, will summarize the situation.

Louder will be honored as "Outstanding Conservation Homemaker."

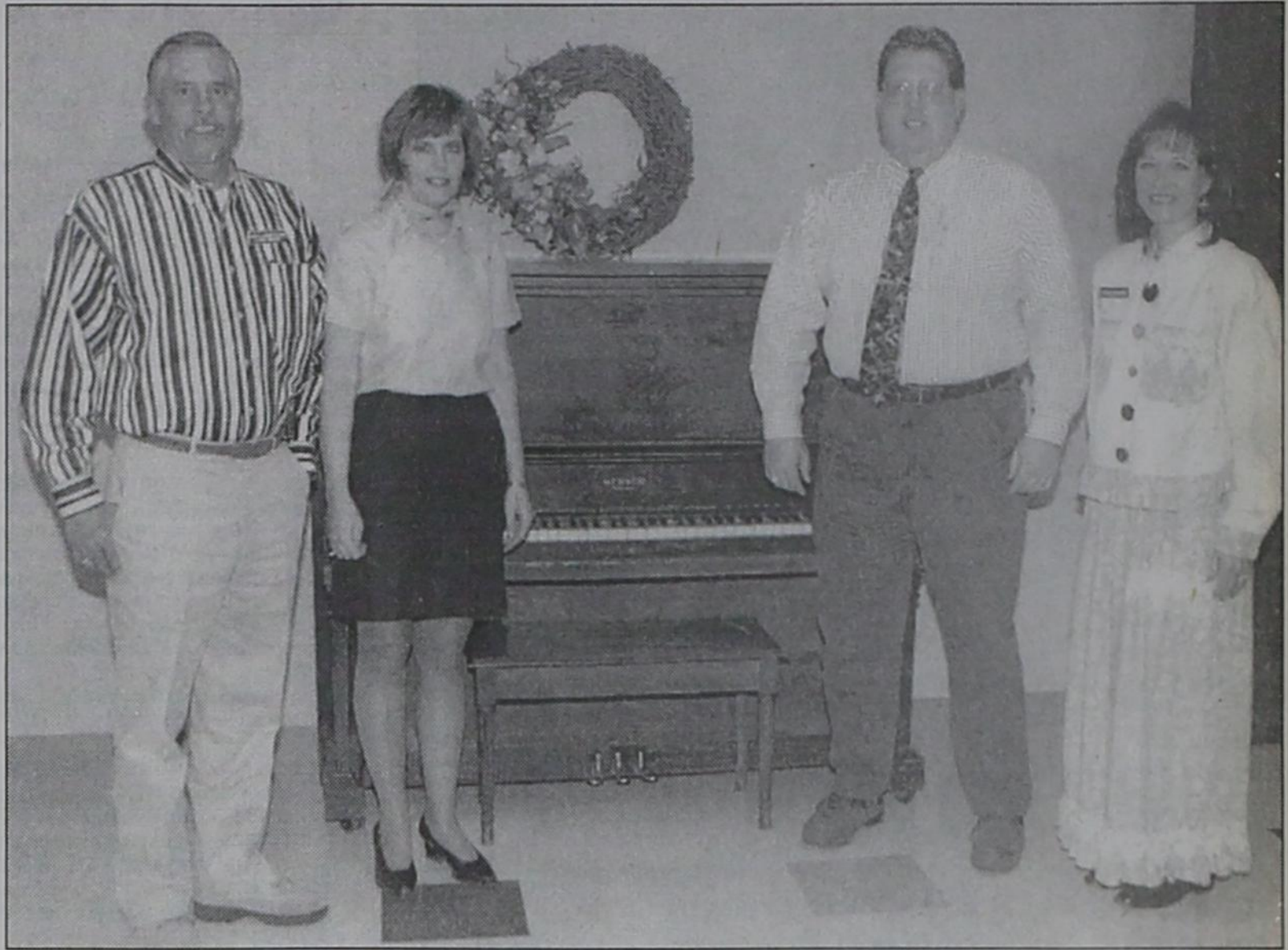
In addition to these winners, the district's essay and poster contest winners will be recognized.

Minding Your Own Business

Staying alive—A little driving advice

When it comes to cars, only two varieties of people are possible—cowards and fools. —Russell Baker

I glanced quickly over my left shoulder. There was the opening I needed to blend in smoothly with the freeway traffic. Then suddenly, the driver of the car in front of me slammed on her brakes. She had run out of nerve at the end of the freeway on-ramp and was afraid to merge into the rapidly flowing traffic.

I used all of my computer-regulated, automatic braking system to scrub off speed and avoid a collision. Just as I relaxed, knowing that I'd flirted with disaster, I glanced in my rear-view mirror. There, approaching at speed, was the biggest sports utility vehicle I'd ever seen.

The driver was checking the freeway traffic flow over his left shoulder. He was talking on the phone at the same time. So, there I was between the coward and the fool. I slipped down in the seat and said, "Lord, I'm coming home."

I guess the fact that you're reading about this tells you I survived. Somehow the driver of the SUV jumped the median and avoided hitting us. When I last saw him, he had both hands on the wheel and the phone was no where to be seen. I vowed to write this column right then. I hope it will save a few lives and reduce injuries.

Some bad driving habits

Watch out for these drivers. (And don't be one of them.)

♦ **Left-Lane Larry.** Larry loves the left-hand lane of four-lane highways. He drives there all the time. He often runs 45 m.p.h. in the 55 m.p.h. speed zones, or 60 in the 70 zones. The fact that he impedes smooth traffic flow and frustrates other drivers hasn't occurred to him. Larry needs to learn to drive in the right-hand lane and use the left-hand lane to pass slower traffic.

♦ **Lane-Jumping Judy.** Judy often runs a little late. To make up time, she darts back and forth between lanes trying to get ahead. She accelerates quickly and dives into an opening in the other lane. Then she hits the brakes because she is going faster than other traffic. Soon she'll dart back to the other lane. She doesn't signal. She just jumps from lane to lane trying to pass other cars. Judy needs to be patient. The price of impatience is often an accident.

♦ **Rubber-necking Randy.** Randy is curious about everything. Is that a new house over there? Look at that gal in the white shorts! Is that a '63 Nash? There's a new sign! Randy sees it all. All except the road, that is. Randy needs to pay attention to traffic and road conditions. Otherwise, he may get to check out the latest equipment in the emergency room.

♦ **Telephone-talking Trisha.** Trisha just got a new car phone. It included 100 free minutes of air-time. She was so excited she couldn't wait to call her friends. In the first three minutes she crossed the center line twice and nearly side-swiped the guard rail. At least she can call 911 if she's still conscious after the crash. Cellular phones are wonderful tools to use when the car is stopped.

My hope is that if you see yourself in some of these driving situations you will take action to correct bad driving habits. Next week in part two, I'll tell you about some other drivers to watch out for. Don't miss Staying Alive, Part Two.

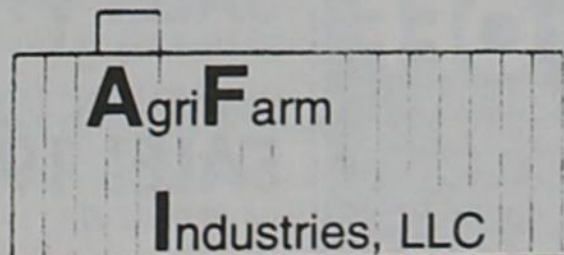

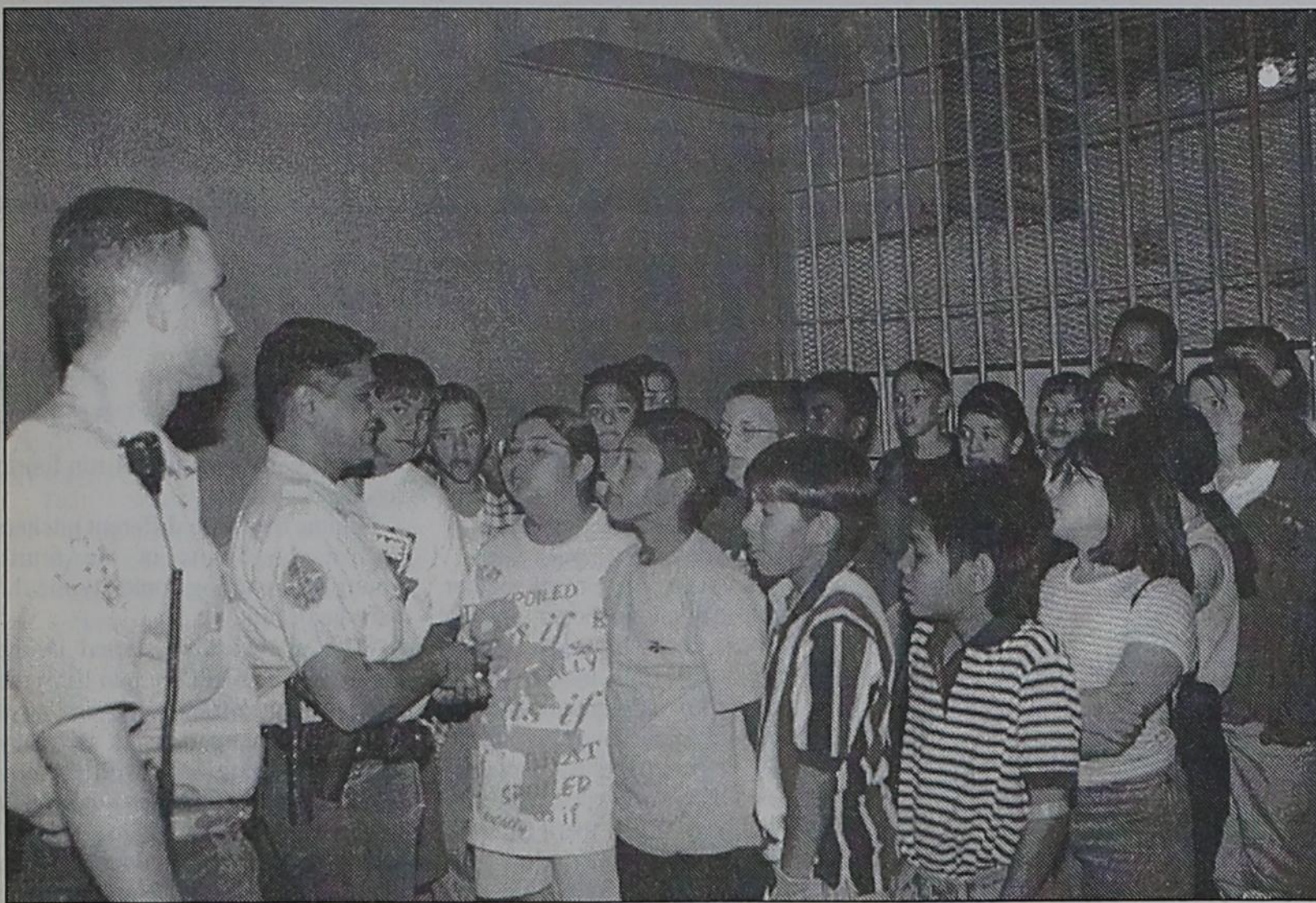
Patterson is active in the

Higgins participates in Farmers Union 'fly-in'

Doug Higgins of Hart joined more than 120 other Farmers Union members from throughout the nation to present National Farmers Union's 1998 priorities to lawmakers and the Clinton administration during a fly-in in Washington, D.C., recently.

The priorities were established by delegates to National Farmers Union's 96th anniversary convention in Albuquerque, N.M., early in March.

"Farmers Union members feel very strongly that President Bill Clinton's feet be held to the fire on the promise he made to rebuild a safety net for independent family producers when he signed the 1996 farm bill," said Higgins. "The 1996 farm bill gave producers planting flexibility, but it left them without marketing flexibility."

Higgins and the other NFU fly-in participants visited with members of Congress and their staffs, as well as with USDA Secretary Dan Glickman and other USDA officials.

NFU fly-in participants called on members of Congress and the Clinton administration to remove the caps on loan rates set by the 1996 farm bill, to extend marketing loans from their current nine to 15 months and the reinstatement of the Farmer Owned Reserve—a program that would enable farmers to store grain on their farms. The group also put high priority on implementation of a floor price for milk, reinstatement of the Emergency Livestock Feed Program, continuance of the Livestock Indemnity Program and better risk management programs.

Farmers Union members presented a special order of business calling for reversal of market concentration and restoration of competition in agricultural markets. NFU recommends enforcement of current anti-trust laws, mandatory price and terms reporting for live-animal transactions and adoption of laws that prohibit meat packers from owning or controlling live-animal inventories more than seven days prior to delivery for slaughter. In addition, Farmers Union members called for an interdepartmental task force to address the continued move

toward concentration in agricultural markets and other sectors of the US and global economies.

"According to USDA statistics, the farmers' share of the consumer food dollar has fallen from 37% in 1980 to 23% in 1996," said Higgins. "Education of our national leaders and communication with the general public is vital to the survival of family farms and ranches."

"Our goal was to send a message to Congress that the 1996 FAIR Act is not providing a safety net for America's family farmers and ranchers," Higgins said. "The FAIR

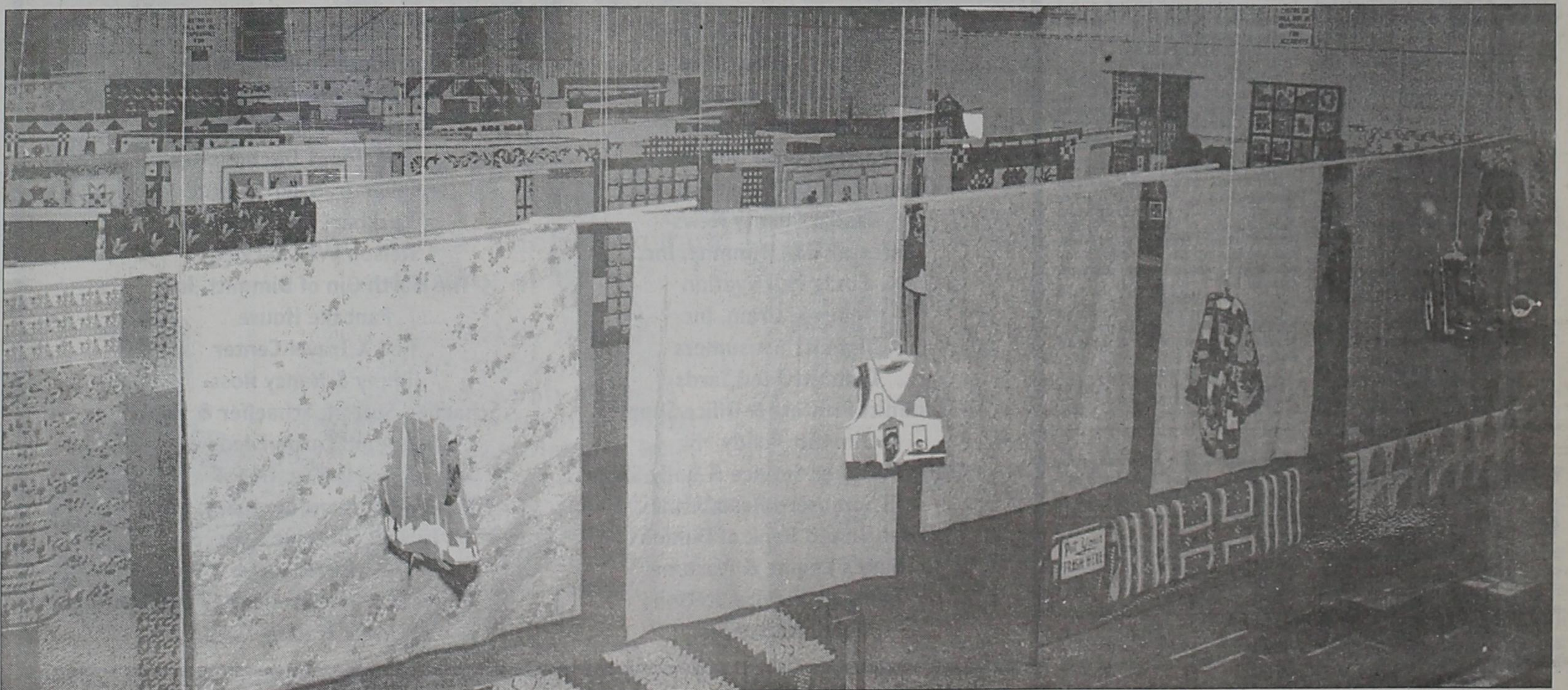

favor of two years of community supervision.

Andrew Orlando Diego's probation was revoked after he was found to have had a usable amount of cocaine in his jail cell on Feb. 14. A motion was approved in court allowing stipulation of evidence in the case.

Mario Garza entered a plea of "no contest" on charges of possession of a controlled substance over one gram and under four grams, a third degree felony, on Nov. 6, 1997. He was assessed a fine of \$1,000, court costs, and a donation to Crime Line, in addition to being sentenced to six years confinement in the TDCJ Institutional Division, with suspension of

the confinement in favor of six years of community supervision.

seum. National attention has been given to this quilt by researchers of Civil War quilts and how they have survived. The quilt was donated to the museum by the P.P. Robb family of Dimmitt.

Indian Headdress was pieced and quilted before the Civil War by Annie Carlock, great-great-grandmother of Mary Goff of Elida, N.M., current owner of the quilt. During the war, the quilt was hidden in a barrel of feathers to protect it from the soldiers who made the Carlock home into a hospital and used the family's quilts and blankets during the Chickamauga Battle.

Several antique quilts were displayed at the library, courtesy of Jackie Reis, Sharon Newman and Jan Heichelheim, all of Lubbock; Betty Girard of Amarillo; and Tommie Nisbett of Dimmitt.

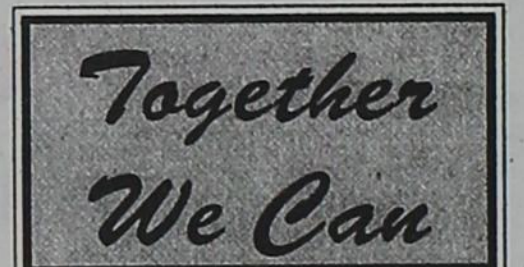
