# Major school changes eyed

By DON NELSON Life is going to get a lot tougher for students in Texas public schools.

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) has drawn up new curriculum requirements that will be much heavier in such "basic" courses as English, math and science, all the way from the first grade through high school.

In grades 1 through 6, the new curriculum will require more emphasis on English language arts, math, science and social studies.

Junior high students will be required to take a semester course in computer literacy before they enter high school.

At the high school level, many present "elective" courses will give way to such required courses as an extra year of science, math and English for a basic high-school diploma. Also, high school

students will be given the option of going for an "advanced transcript" diploma. Newly required courses for this advanced curriculum will include two extra years of math and-or science, two years of foreign language (Spanish is the only such course offered here), a year of computer science, and extra year of English and a year of fine arts.

The TEA plans to launch the new curriculum in the 1984-85 school year (starting with the incoming freshman class at the high school level) and make the new standards fully operational in 1987-88 in all the state's public schools. However, the Texas Legislature must approve the plan before it goes into effect, and the Governor's Select Committee on Public Education may still

have some input. "This is the first attempt by any state to establish such a specific core curriculum," Supt. Robert Ryan said. He predicted that the new curriculum plan "would put Texas in the forefront" in US

education. "This is revolutionary," Board Secretary Deanne Clark commented when the Dimmitt School Board reviewed the proposed new curriculum at its December meeting Monday night.

Ryan agreed that the new plan is a gigantic effort that will require the printing of new textbooks, hiring or retraining of teachers for the additional required courses, dropping of some elective courses, and perhaps a juggling of classroom space at the high school

Ryan said he felt Dimmitt High School would have to go back to a seven-period day to provide students with enough classroom space and period flexibility to fit in the required new courses plus a reasonable number

of electives. "If Dimmitt High School stayed on a six-period day, a student could only get 11/2 years of athletics and 21/2 years of band," Ryan said. Those two subject areas are the most popular

electives in DHS. Main casualties of the new curriculum are likely to be the vocational courses, he said.

Also, Ryan said, students probably will no longer be able to work half a day and go to school half a day, as many now do under vocational "cooperative" programs.

"The days of taking any combination of four electives - such as band, athletics, vo-ag and industrial arts - are pretty well gone," he said. "There's still quite a bit of

# Obituaries

#### Fred Bruegel Sr.

Johannes Fredrick Bruegel, who emigrated to the US from Germany in 1921, drilled his first water well here by hand in 1930 and built a family agribusiness that included farms, livestock operations, grain elevators, cotton gins and export trading, died Tuesday afternoon in Plains Memorial Hospital. He was 85.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church, with Rev. Vernon O'Kelly, pastor, officiating. Burial will follow in Castro Memorial Gardens, directed by Parsons Funeral Home.

Born in 1898 in Rodelsee, Bavaria, Germany, he learned the baker's trade as a boy at the Bruegel Bakery, which has been in operation since 1596. He was drafted into Kaiser Wilhelm's Imperial Army in 1917 and served until the end of World War I. In 1919 he joined the Free Cores, an anti-Communist movement.

He emigrated to the US in September 1921, and worked a year as a steam hammer operator at the Maxwell Auto Co. plant in Detroit, then in 1922 moved to Apache, Okla., where he farmed eight years with his aunt.

He came to Castro County in 1929 and purchased 480 acres of land in the southwest part of the county. It was the first of many sections of native grass land that he bought and "broke out" through the years in Castro and Parmer Coun-

On April 7, 1932, he married Sarah Juanita Cox of Dimmitt. They lived in Parmer County nine years and on their farm four miles south of Tam Anne two years before building their permanent home six miles west of Dimmitt in the mid-1940s.

In 1956, Mr. Bruegel built the first unit of Bruegel & Sons Elevators north of Dimmitt. Through the years this main facility has grown to an exportlicensed elevator complex with 3.2 million bushels of storage capacity, plus seed storage buildings and a commercial feed mill. The family business also expanded to include Bruegel & Sons West elevators and Bruegel Bros. Gin & Elevator, both near the Castro-Parmer County lines, and a partnership in facilties in the southwest part of the county. Mr. Bruegel also was a partner in the Easter Gin from 1957 until

Mr. Bruegel also owned business properties in Dimmitt, and in the early 1960s built the Bruegel Shopping Center in the 200 block of West Bedford



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#### Keep records on gold, silver

Taxpayers who buy and sell gold and silver or other precious metals, either occasionally or as dealers, should keep accurate records of the transactions, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The profit made by an individual, other than a dealer, on sales of precious metals is considered a capital gain and is reported on Schedule D of Form 1040. Dealers treat as ordinary profits income.

The value of numismatic items, such as gold and silver coins, is based on their age, history, art, condition, rareness, metal content and face value. The value of bullion gold and silver or other precious metal, which is generally purchased as a speculative interest, is dependent upon the fluctuation of precious metal prices on the world money market.

Evans said ETSI representatives have talked to utility companies in Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma, but there are no signed contracts.

He did say that "generally, the utility companies are interested in the evaluation of alternate transportation contracts." If ETSI gets right of way

in all states and sells enough contracts to utilities, construction would begin in 1985.

The pipeline project is in a formative stage at this time, and so are opinions concerning the pipeline. Bill Nelson, president of

Texas Wheat Producers Board is the only farm leader who has publically opposed the venture, saying it would hurt the railroads and in turn make rail rates higher for wheat transportation.


Other area farm leaders have not voiced an opinion on the matter, and one local utility company was not aware of the project.

"We called one other town for references and they gave us a good report on the agency. The reason we didn't sponsor the booklet is that we didn't feel like it was our place, and we're always leary of out-oftown promoters."

Heller said the Chamber directors felt like if KDHN had not sponsored the booklet, the agency would have approached other places in town and found someone to sponsor the booklet.

"Most participating merchants are satisfied with the coupon offer," Heller said. But she said a few merchants were not made fully aware that there would be 400 plus booklets sold. "They were led to believe that there would only be about 35

booklets sold." "Most of the merchants realize it's going to cost them their products or services, but in return they get good advertising and more customers into their

"After talking with the participating merchants, whether they are happy or not, they will try to honor the coupons," Heller said.

She urges people who bought the booklets to go ahead and use them, "But be unerstanding with merchants who run out of items or have any other problems."

"We can work together and this can be a positive thing for the community."

#### Pensioners may owe tax

Because pension income may be either fully or partially taxable, federal income taxes may be withheld from pension payments. Withholding is not compulsory, and any person can apply to their payor for exemption.

However, many retirees may find the withholding a convenience that can spare them penalties when they file their federal income tax returns. Without tax withholding, a retiree who owes \$300 or more for 1983 may be liable for an estimated tax penalty.

A retiree who chooses not to have tax withheld from pension payments may pay quarterly estimated payments to avoid the penalty. Additional information may be found in Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," which can be obtained free by contacting Internal Revenue Service.







# Social Security in

Castro County

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first receives hospital inpatient service in a benefit period, will increase to \$356 in 1984. The 1983 deductible is \$304.

Also scheduled to increase are the per day amounts patients are responsible for after certain lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

After 60 days of inpatient hospital care in a benefit period in 1984, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$89 a day.

The 1983 figure was \$76.

For each reserve day of inpatient care, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$178. The 1983 figure was \$152.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered costs except \$44.50 a day. The 1983 figure was \$38.

Also scheduled to increase is the basic monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance, the part of Medicare that helps pay for doctors' services and other medical services. The basic 1984 premium will be \$14.60, up from the 1983 figure of \$12.20. Some people will pay more because the basic premium is increased 10 percent for each year a person could have had this protection but did not.

Finally, the basic premium for hospital insurance, paid by people who do not otherwise qualify for this protection, will rise to \$155 for 1984, up from the 1983 figure of \$113.

# NOTICE OF APPLICATION OF ETSI PIPELINE PROJECT, A JOINT VENTURE TO OPERATE PIPELINE TRANSPORTING COAL AND PROPOSED ROUTE THROUGH CASTRO COUNTY, TEXAS

ETSI PIPELINE PROJECT, A JOINT VENTURE, has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a certificate of public convenience and necessity to construct and operate a pipeline for the transportation of low sulphur coal from the Powder River Basin of Wyoming and Montana to various electric generating facilities in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana. The approximate location of the proposed pipeline through Castro County, Texas, is shown on the map below.

The proposed pipeline route through Castro County enters at a point approximately 1.5 miles east of where Farm to Market Road No. 168 enters the county from the north, then proceeds in a southwesterly direction crossing Farm to Market Road No. 168, Farm to Market Road No. 1075, Farm to Market Road No. 2567, Farm to Market Road No. 86, the F W & D Railway, State Highway 194 approximately 3 miles southeast of Dimmitt, Texas, U.S. Highway Route 385 approximately 5.5 miles south of Dimmitt, Texas, Farm to Market Road No. 1524, Farm to Market Road No. 145, Farm to Market Road No. 1055, and Farm to Market Road No. 303, exiting the county approximately 3 miles east of where Farm to Market Road No. 303 exits the county to the south.

The lands which the pipeline would traverse and the lands necessary for related facilities will be subject to the power of eminent domain if the parties cannot agree on price. Under the Texas Natural Resources Code, the Railroad Commission of Texas has the legal authority and jurisdiction to determine, after hearing, whether a certificate of public convenience and necessity should be granted to permit construction of the pipeline and, if so, whether the proposed route should be altered to satisfy local objections. Pursuant to Section 111.301 of the Texas Natural Resources Code, a hearing will be held at the Railroad Commission of Texas, 1124 South IH 35, Austin, Texas, at a time to be determined by the Commission.






