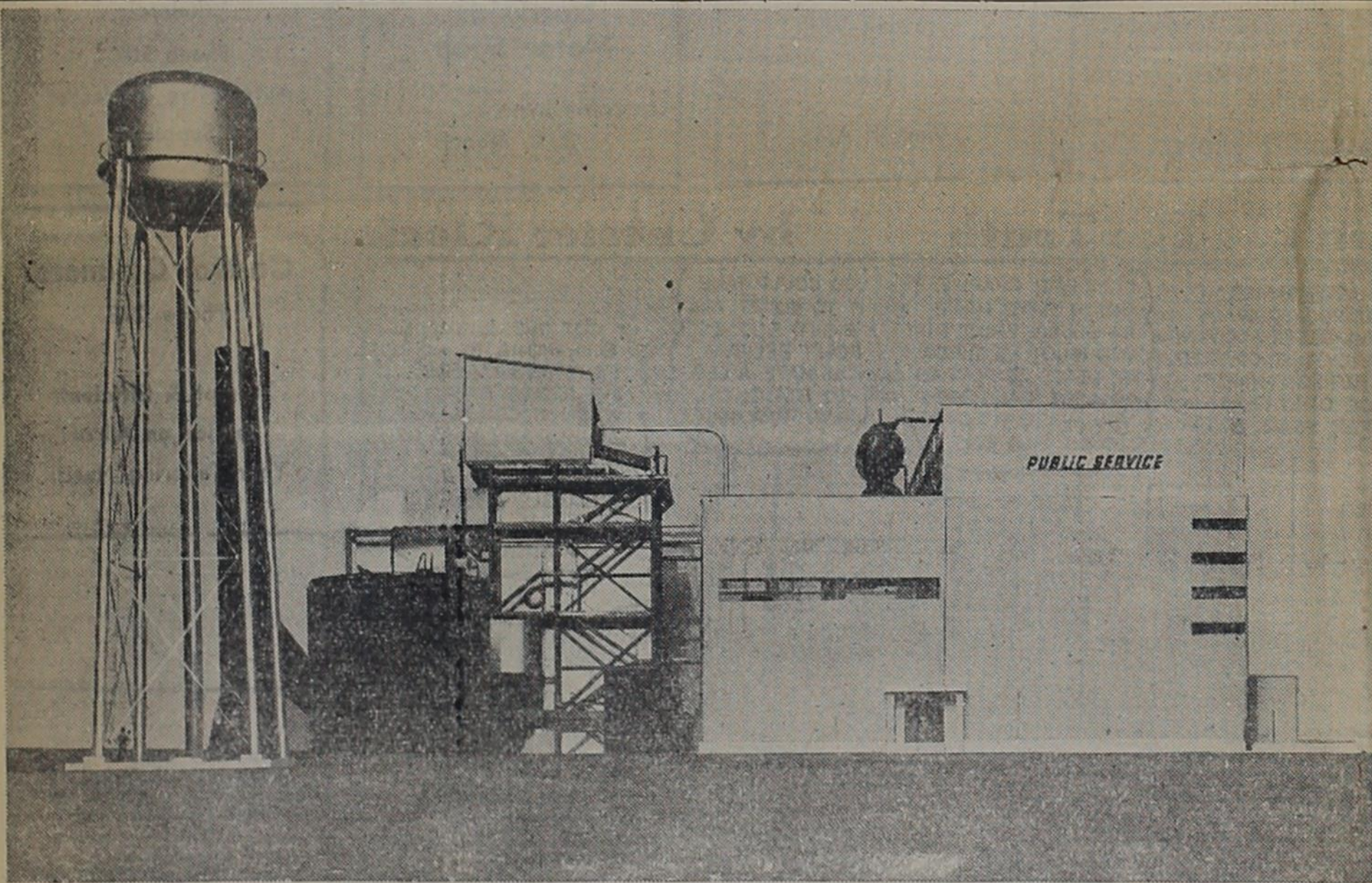

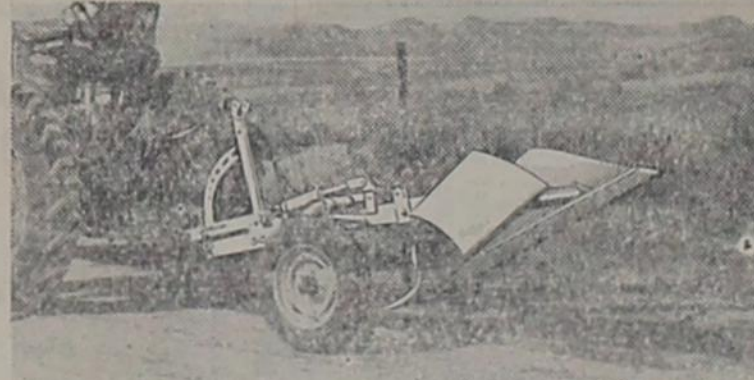

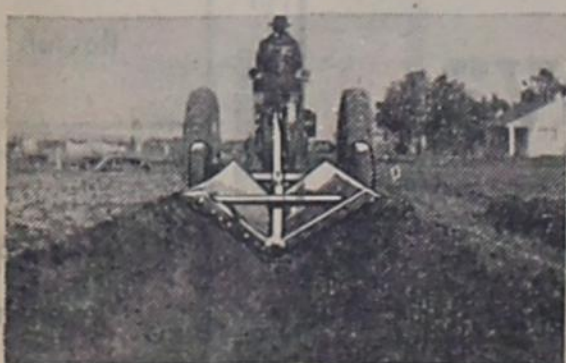

Grass Control
In Cotton

COLLEGE STATION—Seedling grass in cotton may be controlled more economically by using chemicals than by hand-thinning and hand-hoeing alone, according to Romer E. Rea, associate professor of agronomy for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Six systems for controlling weeds in cotton were tested at College Station last spring. The main weeds to be controlled were annual grasses, Johnson grass and trumpet vines.

Commercial chemicals sold under the trade names Premerge and Lion Oil No. 1 were used in this experiment. Costs of the chemicals were \$2.62 per acre for one application of Premerge and \$2.50 per acre for two applications of Lion Oil No. 1.

Rea reported that the cost for hand labor was \$13.30 per acre where the cotton was hand-thinned, hand-hoed and given regular tractor cultivation—no chemical being applied. The cotton was hoed six times.

The cost for hand labor was only \$3.29 per acre where Premerge was applied before the cotton came up and two applications of Lion Oil No. 1 were made for early weed control after the cotton was up. For late weed control, flame cultivation was used.

Where only the two applications of Lion Oil No. 1 were used after the cotton came up, the cost for hand labor was \$3.78 per acre. Flame cultivation was used for late weed control.

The hand labor cost was \$6.90 per acre where only Premerge was used before the cotton came up.

Where machine thinning, rotary hoeing, high-speed tractor cultivation and late season flame cultivation were used, the cost for hand labor was \$8.75 per acre. The rotary hoe weeder attachment was used twice in this system, and the cotton was hand-hoed three times.

Use of Premerge before the cotton came up, supplemented by delayed rotary hoeing and high-speed tractor cultivation followed by late season flame cultivation, resulted in a hand labor cost of \$10.33 per acre. The rotary hoe was used once and the cotton was hand-hoed three times.

In this experiment, two pounds of Premerge in 10 gallons of water were applied per acre in a 10-inch band over the drill immediately behind the press wheels. This treatment was used to control shallow-seeded annual weeds and grasses until time for the first cultivation.

Lion Oil No. 1 at the rate of five gallons per acre was applied

to a 10-inch band in the drill below the cotton leaves. The two applications were made seven days apart. These applications gave from 94 to 99 percent control of the annual and Johnson grass seedlings. All treated young grass seedlings were killed by the first application of Lion Oil No. 1.

In another test, a chemical sold under the trade name Esso Weed-killer No. 38 was just as effective as Lion Oil No. 1.

Rea said, "Except for the burning of an occasional leaf that was oiled accidentally, there was no evident injury to the cotton plants from any of the chemical treatments."

The results of this experiment was given in Progress Report 1412, available from the Publications Office, College Station, Texas, or can be obtained through the local county agents office.

Health Talks

Things usually get a bit noisy around the house this week from Christmas to New Year, not only little boy and girl "things" but grownups things as well. From the "oh's" and "ah's" of opening Christmas gifts until the big swell of horn tooting and "Happy New Yearing" there are lots of decibels batted about.

Decibels are the measuring sticks for sounds. Somewhere between 70 and 100 decibels has been set as the dividing line between harmless and harmful sounds. Since New Year's Eve is usually at least a 100-decibel celebration, you can more or less expect a somewhat jittery and jumpy New Year's Day.

For sound does has a definite effect upon the nervous system. Even when you know the sound is coming, and you do expect noise on such occasions as the Christmas holidays, New Year's Eve and Hallowe'en, the noise "hangover" will probably still be felt. Man never completely adjusts his physical, mental, or nervous mechanisms to noise. Continuous noise over a period of time may be a

serious threat to health, impairing not only the nervous system but hearing as well.

Such is the mechanism of noise that it doesn't greatly disturb the person making the sounds because he sees the action causing the noise and his nervous system apparently adjusts itself automatically in anticipation.

During the fun of holiday gathering and partying, you may witness some fancy magic tricks and be asked to take part in some games of hypnotism. Magic tricks are one example of how everyone loves to be spoofed but hypnotism is another matter entirely, a direct contact with the mechanism of a personality which the doctors feel should never be used for entertainment purposes. Nervous disorders can be readily created by direct suggestion in the average adult under hypnosis, and children are even more susceptible with a greater danger of potential harm from hypnotism.

Pulling rabbits out of a hat and all the tricks that make things appear out of nothing make for very pleasant entertainment. When

your eyes start getting spots before them, however, spots that aren't really there, it's not fun and you don't enjoy it. Everyone sees spots at times and during tension (such as excessive partying) or excessive use of the eyes, those spots may become more noticeable. That is normal. Sometimes they aren't normal; farsightedness and astigmatism (important curving of the light-catching parts of the eye) can also cause spots. So when the spots appear and you know you're tired or excited or you've been reading too much, you might ignore those spots as much as you can. If they keep coming back or persist even when you rest your eyes, they may not be of the harmless variety and you would do well to have an eye examination.

It's quite true that kissing can spread germs. But there are germs in the air you breathe, too, and you don't stop breathing. Cold germs aren't often spread by kissing mainly because the person with the cold doesn't feel happy enough to want to kiss or be kiss-

ed by anyone. So to get back to the mistletoe. According to the legends of that holiday berry, you are supposed to put a berry from the bough and hand it to the person you are going to kiss. And that is probably the slang expression, kissing is the berries, was born.
