Although the 20 is a little light for long range duck Unfortunately most of us don't have access to the money tree, so we have to settle for one gun, maybe two at the most. Gauge size is going to be dictated by what gun for deer, even with rifled

A 10 gauge gun is strictly slugs. Its range is much too for geese, although there are some hunters who use it for pass-shooting ducks. It's a small cannon and it packs a wallop, so think twice about it punishing your shoulder.

If each shot bruises your shoulder, then you better go for a smaller gauge if you expect to enjoy any kind of accuracy.

A 28 gauge should be limited strictly to small game and bird shooting other than waterfowl. It's a light gun that allows for very fast swinging onto the target.

A 410 will handle small game and birds up to about 30-35 yards. With slug ammo it will take care of small

Above all if your hunting includes quail and dove, don't go for the 10 gauge. You won't be able to get small size shot unless you load your shells.

Best all-purpose gun is the 12 gauge. It packs the power and shot to down waterfowl at long range. With buckshot or rifled slugs it will handle deer and big game. Its effective accurate range with slugs, however, is limited to about 100 yards.

that just because it is small, the shells are cheap. Actually the price difference between a box of 20-or 12-gauge shells is so slight it's ridiculous.

Only way to save money on shotgun shells, regardless of gauge, is to load your own.

From 50 to 55 percent of the shotguns sold every year in the U.S. are 12 gauge. This ratio has been holding true for many years, and because of this popularity, a wide range of powder and shot loads are easily obtainable.

A 12 gauge will serve every purpose all the way from deer to waterfowl to quail.

Be suspicious of anyone willing to sell an off-gauge shotgun at a pittance price. These are guns like the 14, 24 and 32 gauge models, which were once manufactured in this country. They'll shoot okay. But you'll spend most of your hunting time hunting shells or component parts for loading shells. At best these off-gauge guns are collector's waterfowl to quail.


