



Former Athletic Star Is Killed In Vietnam

Tragedy struck home to Dimmitt from Vietnam again last Thursday when Warrant Officer L. E. "Gene" Easley, Army helicopter pilot, was killed in action.

EASLEY, 34, was a 1951 graduate of Dimmitt High School, where he rewrote record ball player. He was married to the former Fayrene Greathouse, also a 1951 DHS graduate, who now lives in Brady.

He died in an Army field hoson a helicopter mission. He was flown to the hospital by his copilot and reportedly lived long enough to write his wife a final



THE VIETNAM War struck close to home recently, with the death of George Wall aboard the Aircraft Carrier USS Forres-

offer their deepest sympathy and condolences to his family.

I did not know George Wall personally, but I do know the dangers carrier sailors face 24 hours a day - both in combat zenes and on training missions.

I served aboard an aircraft carrier during Werld War II, with Admiral Halsey's famed Third Fleet, Task Force 38.

TWICE OUR carrier was engulfed in flames, and afire from bow to stern. Once, off Okinawa, after being hit by a Japanese Kamakazi (suicide plane), our carrier burned cut of control for four hours, only by great effort and herice action by the crew, was the ship saved from sinking.

In both instances, the toll in dead and wounded was staggering, and damage to the ship and p'anes very heavy.

Carrier duty is hazardous duty, and should be so classified by the US Navy, as are flying and submarine duty.



STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be
