"As your telegram, to my utmost regret, confirms to me that there has been in the United States a deplorable misinterpretation of the fact that the flag on the German Embassy in Washington was not put at half mast upon receipt of the news of former President Wilson's death, but only on the day of his funeral, I sincerely wish to assure you that the German people deeply sympathize with the National mourning of the American people, whose generous charity for the relief of distress in Germany will never be forgotten here.
