PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL PROPGNDMENT TO BE VOTED
AMEN NOVEMBER 4, 1930. ON NOVEMB Be It Resolved by the Legislature
of the State of Texas, that Art. of the State of Texas, that Art. amended by adding a new section
to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:
"Section 3a. The Supreme Court may sit at any time during the year
at the seat of government for the transaction term thereof shall begin a

$v$ of the Constitution of Texas shall be amended by repealing the sentence of said section which reads:
"The Supreme Court shall sit for the transaction of busines first Monday of October in each
year until the last Saturday in June of the next year, inclusive, at the
Capitol of the State." Section 3. If the Constitution
shall not have been previously amended so as to provide that the
Supreme Court shall be open at all times, then, in that event the foregoing Constitutional amendment qualified electors of this State, at an
