loan on cotton to 6c per pound. Such action will have undue and unfair influence toward depression of price. Strongly urge that you have Farm Board authorize loan on cotton of at least 10c per pound.

"The great cotton crop of the South is in the most critical situation since 1914. The success of the Farm Board and the farm relief act is on trial. If it fails the farmers at this critical time they will despair of its usefulness. Please call the board in extraordinary session if necessary and take favorable action."

Senator Connally also sent telegrams to all Senators from the cotton growing states urging that they join in urging the Farm Board to fix a loan value on cotton of not less than 10c per pound. Senate: Connally pointed out that if the Farm Board is to perform the function which Con. gress had in mind in it creation, it must come to the aid of the cotton farmers at this time.



MRS. G. R. WOODS DIED SUNDAY FOLLOWING LONG ILLNESS.


