Spur Tramples Post 91-0 to Cop Sub-District Title

The Spur Bulldogs went wild to win over the Post Antelopes 91-0 on a heavy field here Armistice Day. The first string scored fourteen points early in the first quarter to put Spur in the lead. When the second string went in and the two teams were about evenly matched. Neither team scored in the second period although they played in Posts for thirty most of the time. Spur's goal line was threatened late in the third quarter and a part of the first string was sent in to start a second scoring spree which continued the rest of the game. The entire first string line up was used late in the last period. Captain Puckett, Jim and Joe Hahn were Spur's offensive stars, while the Morgan brothers with Rickles and Barrett played a brilliant defensive game and ran interference for the ball carries. Chapman, Albin, Laine and Stephens were the ground gainers of the second string.

Post made several good plays through the line but their aerial attack was broken up by Spurs ends. McCampbell, Craddock, Speck and Thomson were Post's best men.

Powers kicked off to Morgan on his 48 yd line Jim Hahn lost 10 yd when tackled behind the line of scrimmage. Spur failed to gain on next play. Puckett flipped a 16 yd pass to Joe who ran 50 yds for a touchdown. Puckett hit left tackle for point.

Puckett kicked to Craddock on his 15 yd line. Craddock picked up 1 at left tackle. McCampbell got 1 at right guard. McCampbell punted to Jim Hahn on his 40 he returned around the right end for touchdown. Puckett went over left guard for point.

Puckett kicked over goal line Post returned to 3 yd line. McCampbell failed in line plunge. Craddock was stopped by Puckett for 2 yd gain. McCampbell fumbled the ball from center and was downed behind his goal for a touch back 2 points.

Spurs second string composed of Stephens, Laine, Albin, Carson, C. Barrett, Payne, Garner, and Hindman and Chapman, Dodge and McCormick filled their posts at end and center.

Hindman took Posts kick on 50 yd line and returned to the 32. Albin went by right tackle for 2 yds. Laine added 2 on end play. Carson passed to Laine on 16 yd line and he finished the remaining distance for a touchdown. Stephens failed to go over no point.

Clark received the kick on his 30 and was stopped on the 40 yd line. McCampbell was downed by Chapman for 2 yd gain. Pass incomplete. McCampbell punted to Laine on the 30 yd division. Laine returned 10 yds. Dodge is removed from game injured. Clyde Dickson takes his end. Stephens managed 8 yds to be forced out on the 48 yd line. Laine ran right end for 3 and Albin tried left end for 20. Stephens got 1 at right end. Albin picked up 7 around left end. Stephens failed to make first down. Laine made 1 yd for first down. Laine failed at left wing. Laine lost 7 yd on try at right end. Carson's heave to Albin incomplete.

Without regard to the merits or demerits of the charges made, it is unfortunate and unjust that the rules and regulations of the league permit the filing of protest charges on the heels of a most important game, withholding team stars from the game, without a severe penalty for failure to substantiate the charges.

By withholding these men at this time, whether the charges are proven or disproven at the trial to be held Saturday, the game Thursday was lost, and Spur's promising prospect of the district championship dispelled.

Spur's scoring aces, Captain Puckett and Jimmy Hahn, were withheld from the game because of an unsettled protest as to their eligibility, which was filed at the last crucial moment. It is conceded by every one that the score would have been reversed had these two men been used, since almost every play was built around them. They were the keystone in the arch of Spur's football club.

The players who saw action did their best, and are to be commended for putting up the hard est fight of the year—with their leaders helpless on the side line. Slaton was held without gain for four downs once when they had the ball inside Spur's one yard line. Spur's lone touchdown came early in the second period when Joe Hahn intercepted Rickles' pass and ran ninety five yards to score.


