

### O Comment SUMMARY OF 4-H PANTRY DEMON STRATIONS

The eleven 4-H pantry demon strators who began at the first of the year to try to raise enough to provide their families for the time that they did not have gardens have succeeded. even though the drouth cut them little short on their pantries: In the eleven pantries there is a total of 5757 quarts of containers, an average of 523 quarts to the pantry. The value of these pantries is \$3.489.15 with an average of \$317.22 for each pantry. The pantries are divided into divisions fruits. vegetables, meats, pickrelishes and dried fruits, dried etables, preserves, jams and Tomatoes, cured meat. is a total of: 1563 qts, fruit. 2023 vegetables. 013 qts. meats 496 qu pickles and relishes. 189 ibs. drig fruit. 53' qts. preserves, jams an jellies. 100 lbs. dried vegetables 262 gts. tomatoes. 5 .-000 lbs cured meat.

He is beginning to keep an accurate monthly record of expenses and income from his poultry yard. During the month of November he marketed 3.096 eggs, or 258 dozen at a price of 35 cents per dozen, realizing the total sum of \$90,30.

His expense of keeping the flock was as follows: 560 pounds of mash at \$2.90 per 100 pounds, \$16.14; 900 pounds of grain at \$2 per 100, \$18.00; oyster shells \$2.00; medicines; \$2.10; lights, 50 cents; making a total expense of \$38.74. With a total of \$90.30 income from the sale of eggs and an expense of \$38.74 in the upkeep of his flock, the net income amounts to \$51.56 for the month. Mr. Holly's poultry houses are




