45 Million Drouth B. F. Yeates, Old Aid Bill Passed by Congress

The emergency drouth aid bill appropriating forty five million dollars to be loaned to people of the drouth stricken areas, was passed Wednesday by congress,af ter being held up for an addition al fifteen million dollars for food loans, the larger appropriation being for feed, seed and fertilizer only. The bill was immediately sent to Hoover for his signature

Upon the failure of the fifteen million food loan bill, congress was asked to appropriate twenty five million to the Red Cross, while President Hoover issued proclamation for a ten million dol lar contribution on the part of the people to the Red Cross as drouth aid measure in providing food for both rural and urban peoples.

Distressed people as a whole are not seeking charity, and would much prefer loans rather than Red Cross aid. 




