## 'Words can't express feelings,' coach says

(Editor's Note: More than 300 friends, players and former Bobcats attended the reception at the Castro County Country Club Sunday to honor Kenneth Cleveland, DHS boys' basketball coach and athletic director, and his wife, Libby. Instead of covering the story the usual way, the News asked Cleveland to write his reaction to "Kenneth Cleveland Day" and his reflections on his teams, the 1968-69 season, and his community.)

Looking back over the past eight years as basketball coach and employee of the Dimmitt public school system, I can truthfully say there is

not a man in Dimmitt with a more gratifying and satisfying job than I have.

**THERE ARE many reasons** for the above statement. The most recent reason occurred Sunday afternoon.

We had a good basketball team this year, in fact one that was capable of competing at the state meet in Austin. I know many people had reservations in Austin and there was nothing the boys and I wanted more than to be able to take you to Austin. However, it didn't work out that way. I know in many communities the people would be very unhappy — perhaps with the coach — if their good team did not make it to the state meet.

The Dimmitt people are something special, and they proved it to me Sunday afternoon. Words can't describe the feelings Libby and I experienced Sunday afternoon when we drove into Dimmitt and saw the big sign across the street and others in store windows. It was a complete surprise to me. These

## Boy dies in knifing

An argument that reportedly started on a basketball court ended in the knifing death of a 17-year-old Dimmitt boy in East Dimmitt Monday night.

**KILLED IN the stabbing** was David Lee Bailey, 305 N.E. Seventh St., an employee of Dimmitt Public Schools. He died in Plains Memorial Hospital's emergency room at 10:30 p.m. of two stab wounds — one in the left side of his neck and the other in his left rib cage.

Police Chief W. W. Jones has filed a charge of murder with malice against William Sanders Jr., 17, a farm laborer in the Flagg community. Sanders was arrested at his home by Sheriff Jack Cartwright an hour after the stabbing, and is now in Castro County Jail.

Jones said the stabbing occurred shortly before 10 o'clock Monday night in front of Dick Thomas' Cafe in East Dimmitt, and reportedly climaxed an argument that had started between Bailey and Sanders in a local gym earlier that evening.

Funeral services for Bailey will be at 2:30 p.m. today (Thursday) in the New Hope Baptist Church. Burial will be at Castro Memorial Gardens.

Bailey is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ethel Mae Thomas; his father, L. J. Bailey of Lubbock; and two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Jewel Ewing of Houston and Ruth Mae of the home.

## Stock show is 'best ever'

Dennis Hill's heavy Hereford steer, Vic Nelson's light Hampshire barrow and Mike Hutton's light Hampshire lamb were the grand champions of the Castro County Junior Fat Stock Show.

**THEIRS WERE** judged the best of 209 project animals qualifying for the annual stock show for the county's 4-H'ers and Future Farmers.

Animals in this year's show — especially the calves — were described by County Agent Charles Hottel as "the best we've ever had."

Dennis, a Hart FFA boy and son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Hill, showed his 990-lb. Hereford to the purple banner over 27 other steers.

Vic, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Nelson and a member of the Hart FFA, had to take his 200-lb. Hampshire barrow through the biggest division of the show — 112 qualifiers — to capture the grand championship.

Mike, a Dimmitt FFA boy and son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hutton, took his 84-lb. Hampshire lamb to the purple banner past 68 other lambs and the winners of seven other classes.

**ON MIKE'S heels** all the way was Gary Hart of Hart, whose heavy Hampshire lamb won the reserve class championship under Mike's, then went on to capture the reserve grand championship over all other breed and class champions. Gary is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Percy Hart.

Teddy Smithson, Dimmitt FFA student showed the reserve champion steer, a 793-lb. Angus. Teddy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Rayphard Smithson.

Winning the reserve championship in the barrow division was a 191-lb. crossbred shown by Bob Waide, Hart FFA boy. He's the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Waide.

Debbie Davis, Hart 4-H girl, was named the best all-around young showman in the county, and Cindy Hill of Hart won the showmanship award in the calf division.

Don Sanders of Hart was named the top showman in the barrow division, and Teddy Smithson of Dimmitt captured the showmanship trophy in the lamb division.

All the winners received banners, rosettes and ribbons from the Dimmitt Young Farmers, sponsors of the show; trophies provided by local merchants; and cash prizes from the Castro County Farm Bureau.

## Sale is tops--for Girlstown, too

Girlstown USA turned out to be as big a winner as the county's 4-H and FFA youths Saturday in the auction sale that followed the Junior Fat Stock Show.

**THE COUNTY'S young showmen** got record prices for their animals as \$32,908.30 changed hands — and Girlstown got many of the animals.

Almost 30 local businesses and individuals got into the spirit of a Young Farmers idea and sent 20 well-fed barrows and 11 well-groomed lambs to the girls' home near Whiteface, paying the floor price on top of their premium bids to do so.

The basic meat requirement for Girlstown's 81 girls is a steer and two hogs per month. Unless Executive Director Marshall Cooper trades some pork and mutton for beef, Girlstown has a 10-month supply of pork now and its girls could eat lamb chops and leg-of-lamb for a full month, thanks to Castro County's buyers.

Seven members of the Dimmitt Young Farmers, sponsors of the show, took the decorated animals to Girlstown Sunday morning and unloaded them before the surprised and delighted girls and their supervisors.

Cooper told the Young Farmers this was the first time stock-show buyers had taken animals off the market and diverted them to Girlstown.

The average sale price on the youths' lambs was a whopping \$1.04 per pound — almost four times market price. Joe Ashley bought all the lambs for market at 28.3 cents per pound, and local buyers paid the difference between the floor price and their own bids as premiums for the young showmen.

The average price paid for the youths' barrows Saturday was 51 cents per

market price. Homer Hill of Hart bought all the steers for market at 27½ cents per pound.

Auctioneers Jack Howell, Dean Sanders and Joe Newman called up the bids, donating their services, and those attending the auction were in a spirited buying mood.

**Dr. David Bechtol**, Dimmitt veterinarian, paid a record \$4.10 per pound for Mike Hutton's grand champion lamb, an 84-lb. Hampshire. And Farmers State Bank of Hart paid \$3.60 per pound for Gary Hart's reserve champion lamb, a 102-lb. Hamp.

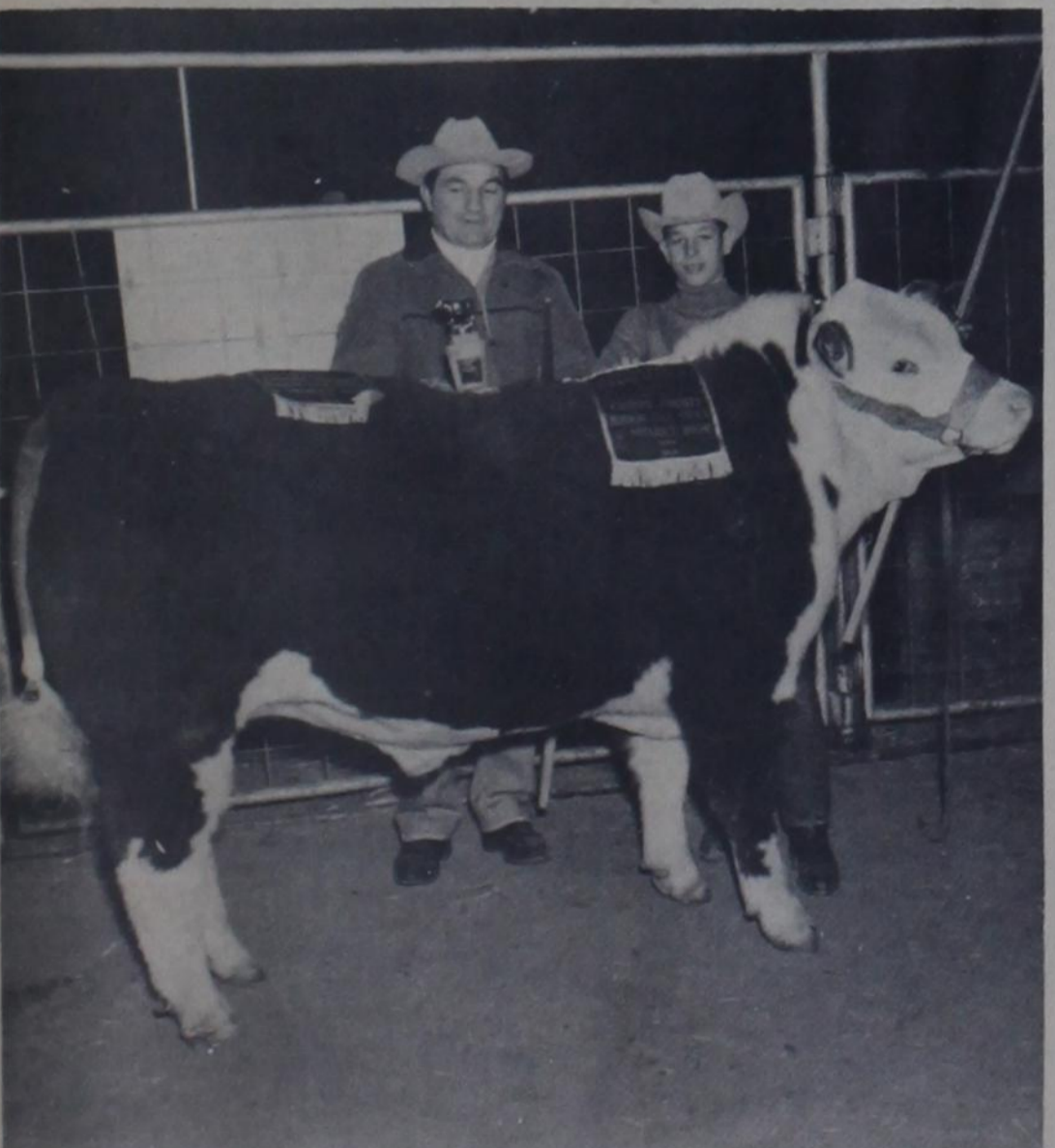
Kicking off the calf sale, Farmers State Bank paid \$1.10 per pound for Dennis Hill's grand champion steer, a 990-lb. Hereford. Teddy Smithson's 790-lb. Angus, the show's reserve champ, brought 60 cents per pound from Castro Co-op Gin.

**IN THE barrow sale**, Farmers State Bank paid \$1.25 per pound for Vic Nelson's grand champion, a 200-lb. Hampshire, and the Hart Buyers Club paid 80 cents per pound for Bob Waide's reserve champion, a 191-lb. crossbred.

Helping keep the prices up throughout the show were the buyers clubs from Hart and Nazareth, made up farmers, business men and teachers. If bids started sagging, buyers club bidders would jump in and kick them upward to assure that the young stockmen would do better than break even on their project animals.

The new Nazareth Buyers Club, 72 members strong, bought 15 animals Saturday, spending approximately \$1,130 on premiums.

The Hart Buyers Club, with 31 members, paid out an estimated \$996 in premiums for 10 animals.

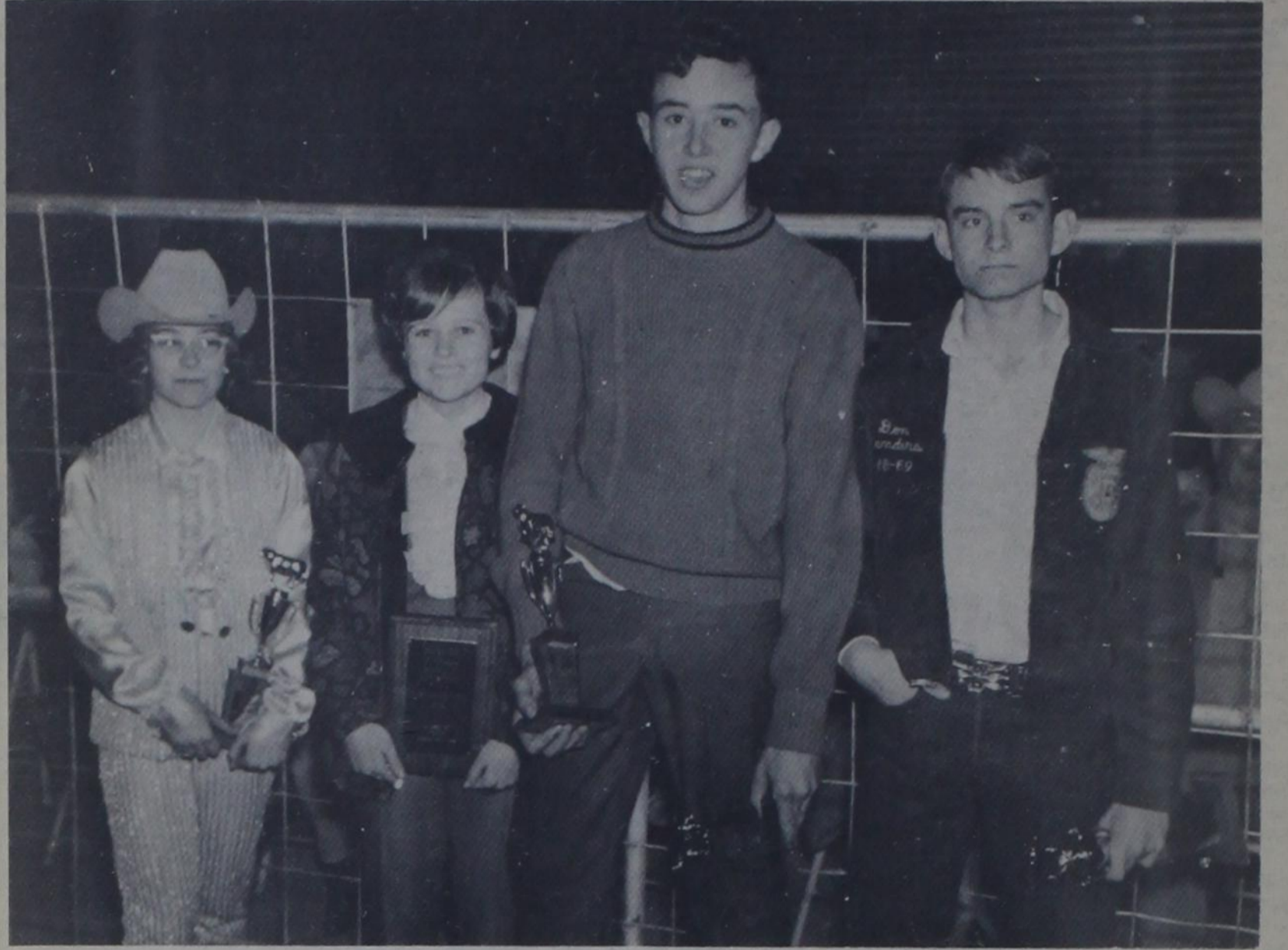

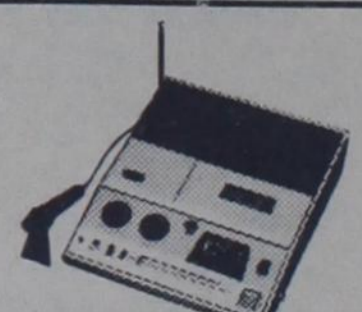

## Try this kalachy and Mexican salad

By IRENE KEATING

Today I'd like to share a couple of recipes with you. Catherine Fuller has been gracious enough to let me share her kalachy recipe with you. All of you who have ever tasted them know how good they are.

#### KALACHY

- 1 cake yeast
- 1 cup scalded milk
- 1/2 cup oleo
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 eggs, well beaten

4 cups flour, sifted  
Soften yeast in 1/4 cup scalded milk, cooled to lukewarm. To remaining hot milk, add oleo, sugar, salt and vanilla. Stir until oleo has melted; cool. Add beaten eggs and yeast. Add sifted flour gradually, using only enough until dough is smooth and elastic. If dough is too soft to handle, 1/4 cup additional flour may be worked in.

Cover and let dough rise until doubled in bulk. Turn dough out on floured board and cut little pieces from dough (about the size of regular yeast rolls). Mold into biscuits by placing dough in the palm of one hand and rotating it with the other hand cupped, or use a small biscuit cutter. (If you use your hands, dip them into flour before shaping dough.)

**GREASE EACH** roll generously with melted oleo. Place on greased cookie sheets and let rise for about 30 minutes. Make impression in center of each, using the tips of your fingers. Fill with desired filling. Bake at 425-degrees F. about 20 minutes. When done, spread more melted oleo on around each filling.

Sprinkle with powdered sugar. Makes 2 1/2 to 3 dozen rolls, 3 to 3 1/2 inches in diameter.

Poppy seed filling — buy canned filling.

Cheese filling — whip one-third cup cream cheese, add 1 cup cream style cottage cheese, one-third cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and one egg. Add 1 tablespoon cornstarch and cook slowly until thickened.

**HERE IS another recipe I got from Catherine for a salad. This salad has an unusual flavor and is simple to make.**

#### MEXICAN SALAD

- 1/2 large head lettuce
  - 1/2 can (15 oz.) Ranch style beans, chilled
  - 1/2 small onion, chopped finely
  - 1/2 lb. rat cheese, grated
  - 1 tomato, diced
  - 1 cup chilled Catalina dressing
  - 1 small package Fritos, crushed
- Prepare lettuce as for any tossed salad. Drain and wash chilled beans and add them; also add the tomato, onions, cheese, and dressing. Chill 30 minutes to an hour before serving. The crushed Fritos are added and mixed well immediately before serving. Make 6 large servings.

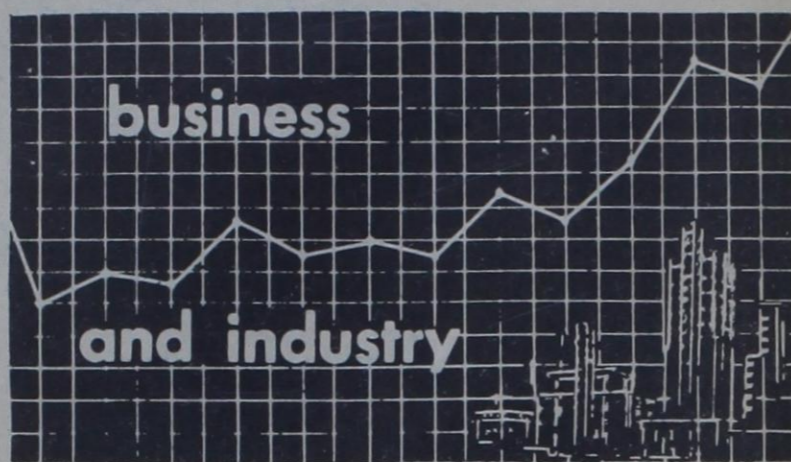


## Two ladies attend history seminar

## House approves money proposal for water plan

The House of Representatives last week passed Rep. Bill Clayton's proposed constitutional amendment which would authorize \$3½ billion dollars of state bonds to be issued over the next 50 years to start water importation in Texas.

THE amendment, considered the first step in the overall water development program for Texas, must still get the nod of the State Senate and the state's voters before becoming law.

"This amendment, if adopted by the Senate and the people of Texas, would have a lasting effect on the state, especially the West Texas Area," the Springlake legislator said.

The amendment giving constitutional authorization for the financing of the gigantic water plan resulted from an intensive two-year study by Clayton's House Interim Water Study Committee.

## In Castro, we don't have to worry about main US conservation issue

A survey of 50 conservation leaders conducted by the Christian Science Monitor revealed that the most important conservation issue facing the nation is the abatement of air and water pollution.

THOSE RESPONDING to the Monitor's questionnaire were presidents, directors or conservation experts in organizations working for improvement of the environment.

In the survey, conducted to assess where the nation stands now on conservation and the environment and the chief problems ahead, replies to other questions showed that:

Ninety-six percent favored setting up a council of environmental advisers to assist the President.  
Ninety percent replied that Congress

should establish a joint committee on the environment.

ONLY 59 percent were optimistic about the long-range outlook for a livable environment.

Ninety-eight percent said state and local governments should do more in conservation, both in planning and expenditure.

Seventy-five percent said that the Department of the Interior should be reorganized into a department of resources and the environment.

Eighty-eight percent said they did not believe the nation is really saving more wild land and natural rivers than are being lost each year to development and pollution.

IN RESPONSE to a question as to what new conservation legislation should be given priority by the Nixon administration and the 91st Congress, pollution was named by most of those responding.

Other priorities recommended for 1969 were preservation of additional wilderness; stricter livestock regulations on public lands; control of importation of rare wildlife species; strengthening of the highway beautification act, restoring protection to park areas against highways and airport intrusions, updating of mining laws, and protection of estuarine and marine resources.

The Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies pay volunteer fire departments this amount when the department works at a fire in rural areas, involving property insured by them.

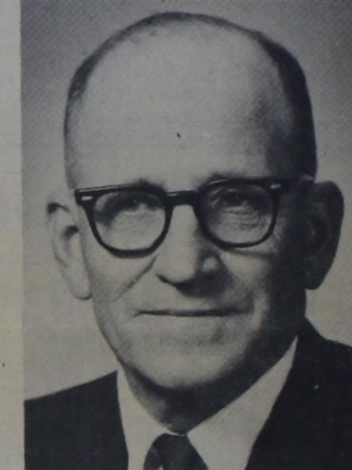

## Research foundation's trustees to elect, review projects Saturday

At least 80 High Plains leaders in agriculture are expected to attend the spring meeting of the High Plains Research Foundation board of trustees Saturday at the Holiday Inn, Plainview.

**THIS MEETING**, one of two conducted annually for the trustees, will begin at 9:30 a.m.

Highlighting the agenda will be selection of officers for the research farm at Halfway. Harold Hinn, chairman of the board, will conduct the meeting.

New trustees also will be elected.

Research foundation personnel will give individual reports on projects under study at the farm. Also, chairmen of the foundation's commodity committees will be on hand to discuss research in various areas.

**IN OTHER business**, the trustees will review new research projects to be undertaken by foundation personnel. Among new projects to be proposed include methods of chemical application on cotton and corn, yield comparisons of four Triticale varieties, herbicide residue effects, methods of herbicide incorporation, studies in minimum seedbed preparation for cotton, sorghum, soybeans, and castors, economic evaluation of fertilizer and herbicide application through automatic sprinklers and an economic study on feeding swine in portable pens with slatted floors.

Officers for the Foundation include Hinn; Virgil Patterson of Amarillo, vice-chairman; Frank Moore of Plainview, president; and R. G. Peeler of Hereford, Ewald Quebe of Lockney and Steve Taylor of Amarillo, vice-presidents. Grady Tunnell of Plainview is secretary-treasurer.

Members of the executive committee include Wayne Byerly of Plainview; Donald Johnson of Lubbock, Don Marble of South Plains, Virgil Payne of Plainview, Steve Taylor of Amarillo, W. B. Tilson of Plainview, Ralph Wheeler of Edmonson, A. C. Verner of Lubbock, C. I. Wall of Amarillo, Dr. D. M. Wiggins of Lubbock and Leo Witkowski of Hereford.

Dr. Tom C. Longnecker is executive vice-president and director of the private enterprise foundation, which is supported by agriculture, business and industry.

Other discussion planned for the meeting will be activities for the annual field day, which is traditionally scheduled for the second Thursday of September.

## Fish in your lake? Fertilize it now

Now is the time to start fertilizing your playa lake if you have fish in it or plan to stock it, according to Dwane Smith, fisheries biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

**SMITH SAYS** lake fertilization should be completed before the hot weather starts.

Lakes and ponds are fertilized so they will contain enough food for small fish when they hatch or are released. Fertilizer will stimulate a plankton bloom which is desirable for bass fry.

The growth of aquatic vegetation may be controlled by proper use of fertilizer. A control program should be

inaugurated before weed growth starts in the spring.

**ONCE A** program of fertilization has started it should be pursued to the end, according to Smith. Smith says a good rule of thumb in determining how much fertilizer to a pond is this: When you can see your fingernails with your arm submerged to the elbow, add fertilizer. Then wait a week or two for the next test and if more fertilizer is needed, add it.

Chances are that the same fertilizer that's needed by the surrounding land will work just as well in your pond.



## Financial Facts

**Metal for manufacturing coins** usually arrives at the mint in the form of bars. Each bar is checked for weight, even to the fraction of a troy ounce, and assayed for purity. The same accuracy is given copper and other metals added to make coinage alloy.

The first step is the placing of silver and copper proportions set by law, into a crucible, and melted down to a homogeneous mass.

The object of copper is to increase the wearing quality of silver.

The molten alloy is then poured to form ingots. Then the ingots are rolled into flat sheets, slightly thicker than the coins to be made from them. During each step, many checks and measurements are taken including the trial blanks.

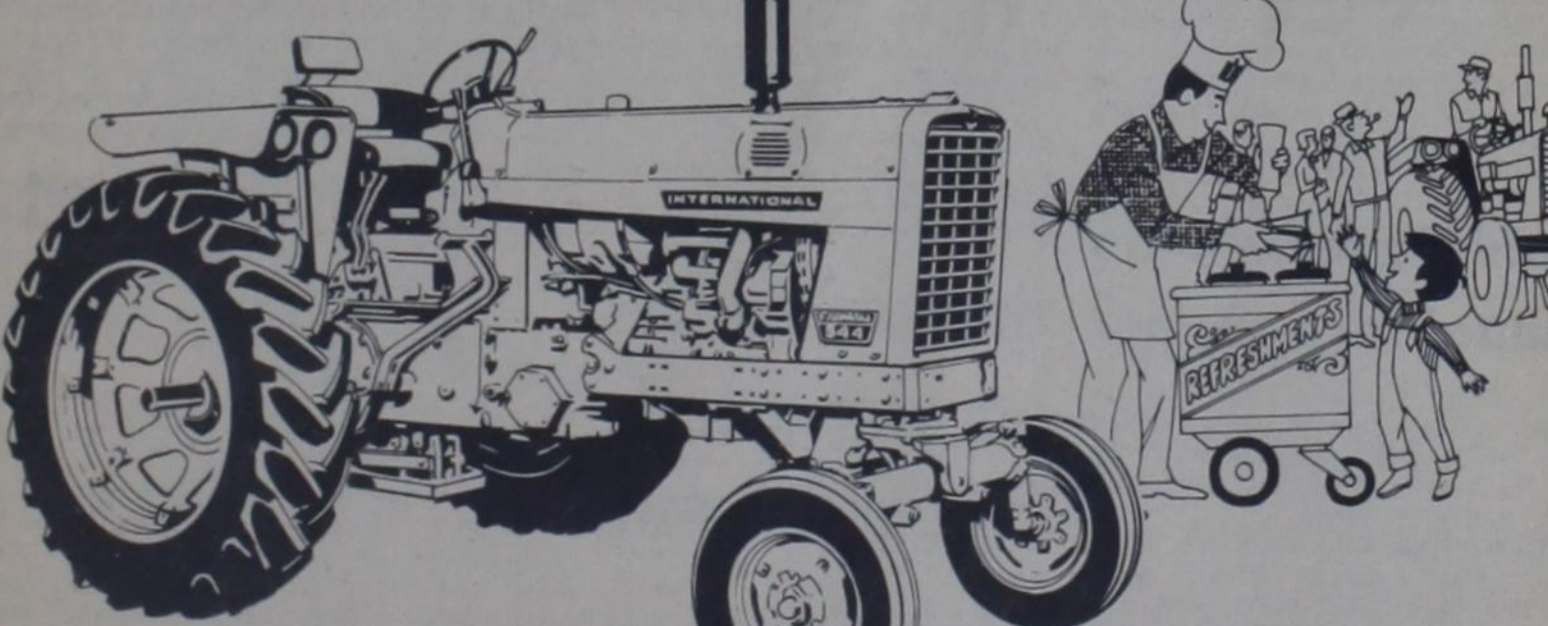

# Sign-up deadline week away; landlord-tenant rules eyed

The final date, March 21, is drawing near to sign up to participate in the 1969 feed grain, wheat and/or cotton programs. If you wish to participate, don't let this date slip by. We will be glad to assist you in any way concerning the different options available to you in participating in these programs. Advance payments are being made on 50 percent of the additional required diversion under the feed grain and wheat programs.

### Landlord-Tenant Provisions

As you who participate in the diversion programs know, the landlord-tenant provisions of these programs are very important. Also, as you know, the regulations concerning the landlord-tenant relationship have teeth in them.

The proper application of these rules to protect tenants and sharecroppers is one of the most difficult responsibilities of all county committees. In spite of the efforts made, an occasional case arises where it is eventually determined that payments were not correctly divided between tenants/sharecroppers and landlords/operators. The seriousness of a matter such as this is usually compounded by the number of years the violation has been occurring.

**BEGINNING** with the current sign-up, additional efforts are being made to prevent cases such as these from arising in the future. Effective with the 1969 programs, the following provisions will apply:

1. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for any farm until all producers who are entitled to share in a crop or proceeds therefrom are shown on the program document with the applicable shares shown and signatures obtained.

2. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for a farm where the price support shares and diversion shares are not the same, unless a proper explanation is made to and approved by the county committee.

3. The number of tenants and the shares received by those tenants in 1968 will be compared with the 1969 enrollment documents on all farms. No payment will be made when there are fewer tenants or the tenant's share is reduced, until a proper explanation is made and approved by the county committee.

4. Procedures also provide that without exception a refund will be required of any amount of payment erroneously made to a landlord which was earned by a tenant or sharecropper. In such case, the correct payment will be made directly to the proper party even though the erroneous payment may have been credited to the proper payee's account.

ALL OF THIS does not mean a land-

owner cannot replace an unsatisfactory tenant or that a tenant cannot voluntarily leave a farm without being replaced by another tenant. It does mean that a satisfactory explanation must be made and the county committee must be satisfied that the landlord-tenant provisions have not been violated before the intentions to participate will be accepted.

March 14 — Final date to request wheat measuring service.

March 31 — Final date to request wheat loans.

Halsell, born in 1877, was a lifetime rancher and acknowledged as the cattle king of the Texas Panhandle. He man-

aged 300,000 acres of the old XIT Ranch, purchased by his father, which extended into Castro County.

He founded Amherst and Earth, and was president of the Halsell Land & Cattle Co., headquartered in Amherst. His later holdings included land throughout the Southwest. His Mashed O Ranch, known popularly here as the Halsell Ranch, is located in Lamb County. Halsell Street in Dimmitt is named for him.

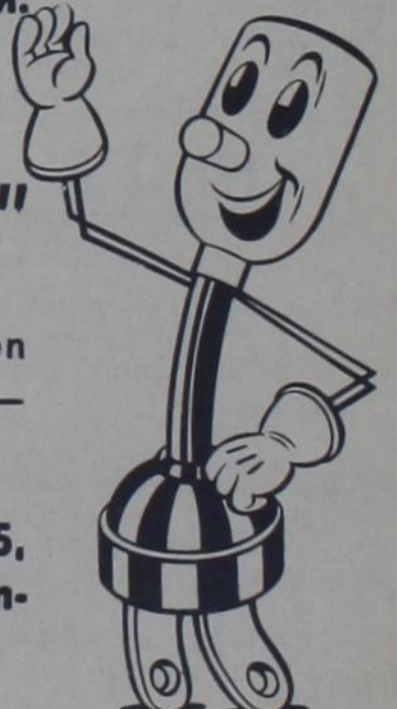

### Hearing slated on school bill

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake announced this week that a public hearing has been set on House Bill 300, the package bill that came from the Governor's Committee on Public School Education.

THE HEARING will be March 25 at 1:30 p.m. at the press table in the House of Representatives, Clayton said.

House Bill 300 is the bill that contains — among other recommendations — the proposal that school districts with less than 2,600 pupils be consolidated, and also that the school tax structure be drastically changed.

The bill would affect all three school districts in Castro County. Under the realignment proposed by the Governor's Committee, the Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth school districts would be consolidated into one, forming almost a county-wide school district.

Clayton has said publicly that he will oppose both the consolidation plan and the proposed change in the tax structure.

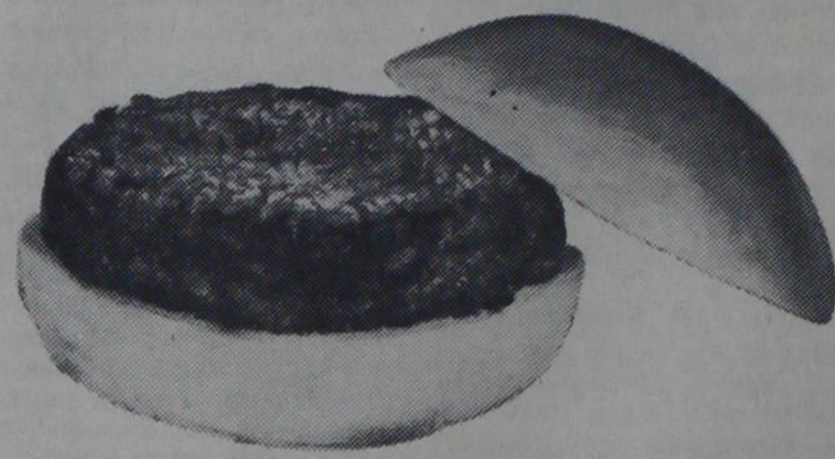
