

However, this year the worst was over by Saturday, sale day, and the weather was bearable but by no means balmy. Maybe some time we will have a pretty weekend for the show but don't depend on it.

Few, if any, counties are as fortunate in East Dimmitt Monday night. as ours in having an ample supply of local auctioneers to cry their Junior Fat Stock Show sales. According to the Fat Stock Show story in last week's News 291 animals had been entered in the competition. I didn't count the number of animals on the auction lists, but I am sure that a big percent of the 291 were sold at auction.

Selling that number of animals in one auction sale would probably be more than one auctioneer could survive, even old leather tonsiled Colonel Jack Howell. It is our good fortune, however, to have three colonels of the auctioneering type. Howell was ably assisted in the sale Saturday by Colonel Dean Sanders and Colonel Joe Newman. All three men are top flight auctioneers. I know they are because you can't understand a word they say. I bought an animal or two without ever knowing what the successful bid was or when I made the offer.

Boy dies knifing

An argument that reportedly started on a basketball court ended in the knifing death of a 17-year-old Dimmitt boy

KILLED IN the stabbing was David Lee Bailey, 305 N.E. Seventh St., an employee of Dimmitt Public Schools, He died in Plains Memorial Hospital's emergency room at 10:30 p.m. of two stab wounds - one in the left side of his neck and the other in his left rib cage.

Police Chief W. W. Jones has filed a charge of murder with malice against William Sanders Jr., 17, a farm laborer in the Flagg community. Sanders was arrested at his home by Sheriff Jack Carlwright an hour after the stabbing, and is now in Castro County Jail.

Jones said the stabbing occurred shortly before 10 o'clock Monday night in front of Dick Thomas' Cafe in East Dimmitt, and reportedly climaxed an argument that had staried between Bailey and Sanders in a local gym earlier that evening.

Funeral services for Bailey will be at 2:30 p.m. today (Thursday) in the New Hope Baptist Church. Burial will be at Castro Memorial Gardens.

Bailey is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ethcl Mae Thomas; his father, L. J. Bailey of Lubbock; and two sisters. Mrs. Bessie Jewel Ewing of Houston and Ruth Mae of the home.

Almost 30 local businesses and individuals got into the spirit of a Young Farmers idea and sent 20 well-fed barrows and 11 well-groomed lambs to the girls' home near Whiteface, paying the floor price on top of their premium bids to do so.

The basic meat requirement for Girlstown's 81 girls is a steer and two hogs per month. Unless Executive Director Marshall Cooper trades some pork and mutten for beef, Girlstown has a 10month supply of pork now and its girls could eat lamb chops and leg-o-lamb for a full month, thanks to Castro County's buyers.

Seven members of the Dimmi't Young Farmers, sponsors of the show, took the donated animals to Girlstown Sunday morning and unloaded them before the surprised and delighted girls and their supervisors.

Cooper told the Young Farmers this was the first time stock-show buyers had taken animals cff the market and cf Hereford. diverted them to Girlstown.

The average sale price on the youths' lambs was a whorping \$1.04 per pound - almost four times market price. Joe Ashley bought all the lambs for market at 28.3 cents per pound, and local buyers paid the difference between the floor price and their own bids as premiums for the young showmen. barrows Saturday was 51 cents per Mrs. Bingham at the school.



Kicking off the calf sale, Farmers State Bank paid \$1.10 per pound for Dennis Hill's grand champion steer, a 990-lb. Hereford. Teddy Smithson's 790lb. Angus, the show's reserve champ, brought 60 cents per pound from Castro Co-op Gin.

IN THE barrow sale, Farmers State Bank paid \$1.25 per pound for Vic Nelson's grand champion, a 200-lb. Hampshire, and the Hart Buyers Club paid 80 cents per pound for Bob Waide's reserve champion, a 191-lb. crossbreed. Helping keep the prices up throughout the show were the buyers clubs from Hart and Nazareth, made up farmers, business men and teachers. If bids started sagging, buyers club bidders would jump in and kick them upward to assure that the young stockmen would do better than break even on their project animals.

The new Nazareth Buyers Club, 72 members strong, bought 15 animals Saturday, spending approximately \$1,130 on premiums.

The Hart Buyers Club, with 31 members, paid out an estimated \$996 in premiums for 10 animals.

Notice is here given as re-quired by Section 4 of the Water **Rights Adjudication Act of 1967** (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Trrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements

in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.







Food-cost average is holding steady

Retail food prices in the first half of 1969 are likely to average close to current levels.

Extension consumer marketing specialist, prices will be lower on many fruit products, fresh and processed vegetables, fats and oil products and pork. Eggs, turkey, dairy products, potatoes, candy and other chocolate products and soft drinks will be higher than in 1968, she says.

Soften yeast in 1/4 cup scalded milk, cooled to luukewarm. To remaining hot milk, add oleo, sugar, salt and vanilla. Stir until oleo has melted; cool. Add beaten eggs and yeast. THE amendment, considered the first step in the overall water development program for Texas, must still get the nod of the State Senate and the state's voters before becoming law.

"This amendment, if adopted by the Senate and the people of Texas, would have a lasting effect on the state, especially the West Texas Area," the Springlake legislature said.

The amendment giving constitutional authorization for the financing of the gigantic water plan resulted from an intensive two-year study by Clayton's House Interim Water Study Committee.

Sign-up deadline week away; landlord-tenant rules eyed

By CHARLEY HILL **County Office Manager**

The final date, March 21, is drawing near to sign up to participate in the 1969 feed grain, wheat and/or cotton programs. If you wish to participate, don't let this date slip by. We will be glad to assist you in any way concerning the different options available to you in participating in these programs. Advance payments are being made on 50 percent of the additional required diversion under the feed grain and wheat programs.

Landlord-Tenant Provisions

As you who participate in the diversion programs know, the landlord-tenant provisions of these programs are very important. Also, as you know, the regulations concerning the landlord-tenant relationship have teeth in them.

The proper application of these rules to protect tenants and sharecroppers is one of the most difficult responsibilities of all county committees. In spite of the efforts made, an occasional case arises where it is eventually determined that payments were not correctly divided between tenants/sharecroppers and landlords/operators. The seriousness of a matter such as this is usually compounded by the number of years the violation has been occurring.

BEGINNING with the current signup, additional efforts are being made to prevent cases such as these from arising in the future. Effective with the 1969 programs, the following provisions will apply:

1. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for any farm until all producers who are entitled to share in a crop or proceeds there-from are shown on the program document with the applicable shares shown and signatures obtained.

2. No payment (including advance payment) will be made for a farm where the price support shares and diversion shares are not the same, unless a proper explanation is made to and approved by the county committee.

3. The number of tenants and the shares received by those tenants in 1968 will be compared with the 1969 enrollment documents on all farms. No payment will be made when there are fewer tenants or the tenant's share is reduced.
