

Recently the Texas and Pacif-Railroad received permission from the Railroad Commission to cut day coach travel rates from Fort Worth to Sweetwater to a 2 cents a mile basis instead of the usual charge of 3 3-5 cents. The their calculations. found that passanger traffic would be increased about 80 per cent in order to make the new rate pay expenses. In a short period of time, the business of the road on these trains increased 103 per cent, leaving the company a handsome profit.

Not many months ago the Federal Farm Board and some of the big packing companies poblish ed the fact that although the market for cattle, hogs and sheep had declined very sharply, and the wholesale price of meat had followed suit, the cost to consumers was not reduced proportionally. The presentation of these facts induced a few of the retailers to reduce the price to consumers, and a result the market in those cities steadied and consumption of meat increased as much as 300 per cent, according to the report of retailers who satisfied themselves with a smaller profit in each sale.

As a general rule, the cost of food over the retail counter, and the cost of many manufactured products have not declined in proportion to the manufactureus' reduction. Consequently consumers, with reduced buying power, have been unable and unwilling to purchase hevend immediate and pressing needs. Large profits on individual sales have reduced consumption and as a consequence ducts: factory hands and clerical help have been laid off and wages reduced, adding distress and again reducing consumption to the minimum. A tremendous lot of energy and money is being wasted in an effort to relieve distress simply because there is no effort to remedy the cause of much of it .-Farm & Ranch.
