





Terraces Pay For Themselves And a

Gonzales, March 20 .- "These terraces paid for the tractor I bought to use in making them and the labor and fuel too, the first year that I had them," was the statement of W. L. Ladewig of the Dreyer community in Gonzales county to County Farm Agt. J. M. Saunders while walking over his farm. Mr. Ladewig's figures more than bear out the statement. The tractor cost \$600, labor and per acre for the 80-acre farm, ed approximately 1-7 bale to the Tenn. acre, or slightly more than 11 In 1929, after teracing, Taking an average price of 15 Coal Co. cents for cotton the year before and the year after the terraces were built, Mr. Ladewig estimates an income of \$825 from the 80 acres in 1928 and \$1850 in 1929, showing a difference of \$1025 which pays for the tractor, the cows. See J. W. before.

In 1930 Mr. Ladewig, who be lieves in rotating his crops, planted corn on this 80 acres and secured a yield of 40 bushels per acre while the highest previous yield of this same land had been 19 bushels per acre. He says the conserving of water on this land has helped as well as conserving the soil, as previous to terracing the rolling nature of it caused even a very light rain to run off before it could sink in. There are no ditches in the field now, though previous to terracing there were deep ditches across which it was impossible to cultivate.
