Aside from cheap grains, ease in handling and other common sense features connected with this system of producing calves, Mr. Smith lists the following advantages of creep feeding: adds weight, produces a higher finish, insures a uniform calf crop, lessens shrinking weaning, permits marketing 45 to 90 days earlier, aids cows to go into winter in more thrifty condition. and allows marketing of slaughter calves or continued feeding in dry lot.

A creep is simply an enclosed feed lot with a bar placed horizontally across the top of its narrow entrance to prevent older cattle from entering where the calves can easily go. 

#### Farm Service by a Bank

A farm service department was inaugurated a year ago by a bank in Olympia, Washington, and a farm advisor appointed. Close cooperation has been maintained with the state college extension service. Work in dairying is carried on in conjunction with the Dairy Herd Improvement Association. Also a pasture contest was held in cooperation with the four banks in the county which offered prizes amounting to \$100. Work in poultry was carried on in cooperation with the Co-operative Poultry Association and assistance was given in organizing an economic conference for the benefit of berry growers. The farm advisor of the bank is active in the Agricultural Council of the county composed of farm and other organizations interested in agricultural development, and also in the Farmers' Market. Six hundred farm business analysis blanks were distributed while farm account books and poultry record books were also provided to farmers and have been helpful in starting many farmers in keeping

business records.



Violation of the prohibition law is so flagrant in this country that 'any boob can see it,' said George L. Baker, dry mayor of Portland, Oregon, in New York

"Enforcement is the most trying work of municipal, state and federal authorities,' Mayor Baker said, "because people who are ordinarily strong for general forcement of all laws and are good Americans under ordinary conditions, violate the prohibition laws and contribute to the breaking down of other laws. They feel that their personal liberties are being restricted.'

Our tendency to legislate on every phase of human liberty has augmented the 'breaking down process' of respect for law by both young and old. rich and poor: Unnecessarily restrictive legislation always brings law violation, and continual law violation brings disrespect for law.



#### May Was Biggest Month for Chevrolet home north of Afton.

Chevrolet production during ery month of 1930 and was the Spur Monday. largest single month's output since July, 1929, W. S. Knudsen, president and general manager, said in announcing the May total production of 113.852 cars and trucks.

The May figure, representing world production, compares with 113,187 last May and with 106,096 in April this year. While the increase over last May is slight. Mr. Knudsen pointed out that dealer stocks of both new and used cars are now in far better shape than a year ago.

An interesting angle of the May output, Mr. Knudsen said, was a heavy increase in the number of cars built for export. This trend was also pronounced in April this year, and in May the export requirements were nearly five times as heavy as in the corresponding month last year.

The heavy May output was the direct result of a decided pickup in sales in certain sections of the country, notably the area along the North Atlantic seaboard, Mr. Knudsen said. He pointed out that this section was the first hit by the industrial slump which followed the stock market crash, and it appears to be, appropriately the first to recover. Certain other secetions are also showing signs of recovery in Chevrolet business, the president said.

During May Chevrolet plants operated at a normal average of and one-half days a week. employment went above 36,-000 men, the company's normal payroll, Mr. Knudsen declared.




