



A Letter from J. L. Jenkins to the People of Dickens Co.

Potter, Ark., Feb. 8, 1932. Dear Readers:

As I was asked by many, before I left Dickens County to write my observations of this country to the Texas Spur. I am now going to tell you some of the things that I have seen for "Sunday clothes." and learned.




