W. E. Combs Candidate for Sheriff

W. E. Combs has this week authorized The Texas Spur to announce that he will be a candidate for the office of Sheriff and Tax Collector, subject to the action of the July primaries. Mr. Combs is comparatively speaking a new-comer to Dickens county, however, during the year or more that we have known him we have found him to be genteel in every respect and a fair, square shooter. And no doubt, should he be elected, would fill the office with a high degree of satisfaction. Following is his statement to the public:

TO THE VOTERS OF DICKENS COUNTY:

I hereby announce my candidacy for Sheriff and Tax Collector of Dickens County, Texas, subject to the action of the democratic primary July 23, 1932.

In making my announcement I want to say that I have no malice toward anyone and am doing so solely on my own accord, and after being solicited by good, honorable citizens of Dickens County.

As an introduction to those whom I have not met I will give the following facts about my life:

I was born in Wise County, Texas, in 1887, where I resided until 1922. I was engaged in the farming business for several years and went into the mercantile business at Paradise, Texas, for three years. I moved from Wise County to Tinton, Oklahoma in 1923 and engaged in the grocery and produce business, for four years. I then moved from Tinton to Ralls, Texas, and again engaged in the grocery business.

In November of 1930 my son and I went into business in Dickens county, of which I am general manager. In my business experience here as elsewhere I feel that I am competent to meet and deal fairly and squarely with the public, and I promise if I am elected to this office I will endeavor to make as good a Sheriff as Dickens County has ever had; and to deal with all fair and fearlessly.

I have at all times stood for law enforcement to all alike, and will deal openly in the law enforcement of our county. I will endeavor to have none but the best, honorable, upright men on the law force and will enforce each and every law to the best of my ability.

I will make every effort to see each voter of Dickens county in my campaign, and I want each voter to take this announcement as a personal appeal and solicitation for consideration, assuring you it will be highly appreciated.

Two children of Mr. and Mrs. V. H. Huddleston are in the Nichols Sanitarium here as a result of injuries received when the truck in which the family was traveling overturned on the highway east of town, Sunday morning. Catherine, age 5, suffered a broken right leg; and Mollie, age 10, is in a semi-conscious condition from head and spinal injuries. The accident occurred at the double corner railroad crossing near the east county line, and is reported to have been caused by faulty brakes.

County Inited to Big Barbecue

The "menfolks" of Dickens county and surrounding trade territory are invited to be honor guests at a big spirit raising, depression killing, get-together, to be held at Spur Experiment Station, Saturday, April 9th.

Spur merchants, cooperating with Superintendent R. E. Dickson, are sponsoring the big event which free barbecue with all the natural accompaniments, pickles, onions, bread and hot coffee, will be served. Two yearling Hereford steers, raised by Luther Jones and grain fattened at the station for the past 175 days will be barbecued for the noon day feast. The barbecuing will be done in the old-fashioned way over an open Mesquite fire, and will be done under the direction of Geo. S. Link, a past master not only of the barbecuing art but in the concoction of the cooking sauces which makes the chunks of beef so tasty and delicious.

At this meeting the results of the feeding tests of the much-talked-of 100 steers will be made available. Supt. Dickson informs us, however, that said results will be issued in pamphlet form (and may be studied or thrown away) but that no speeches nor borsome after-dinner talks will be allowed to mar the occasion. Also an inspection of the terracing work that has been underway at this station for the past six years will be made, and the results of the tests shown. The Spur station is the fountain-head of terracing information and the initial beginning of the national terracing program that is now being pushed by the department of agriculture, and if for no other reason you should come out to this meeting and learn something of the merits of this new theory of farming.

We'll see you at the big feed on the ninth and we will have one more day like we used to have in Dickens county.

honors Conferred on Utilities Officials

Signal honors were conferred on two Middle West Utilities System men by their communities last month.

In Chicago, Samuel Insull, Jr., vice-president of the Middle West Utilities Company, was awarded the Junior Association of Commerce annual medal as "the young man under 35 years of age who has performed the most meritorious civic service in Chicago during the year" and the award was in recognition of the recipient's outstanding participation in the city's relief work.

Man Partly Burned Kent Alive in Oven

Memphis, Tenn.—L. Jack Doty, known as the "oven man" because he lives in an electric contrivance heated to a temperature of 103 degrees for nearly a year.

Doctors said Doty could not survive the severe burns he received in an automobile crash last year because they covered one-third of his body. No one ever had, according to scientific opinions. But so far Doty has fooled them all. He even plays bridge.

The 27-year old man, married and the father of a 2 year old boy takes his plight philosophically. He is almost completely encased in an oven made of steel and tin inside of which is four large light bulbs to supply the heat.

Physicians said the purpose of the "oven" is to keep Doty warm while the body surface is built up for skin grafting. His hands and legs are most severely burned. The danger, a noted skin specialist explained, is that the burned areas might start bleeding.

Within three months his doctors expect to begin grafting on new skin.

Ranks Waive First Lien in Favor of Government Loan

An important meeting of field inspectors for West Texas was held at Lubbock, March 20th, presided over by A. P. Swallow from Regional Manager Owen W. Sherrill's office at Dallas.

The field inspector for this territory, D. H. Sandigre, whose headquarters are at Spur, reports attendance at the meeting as representing about forty surrounding counties.

The purpose of the meeting was to make clear to the field men the nature of their duties and to clarify matters pertaining to the correct information required from applicants for crop production loan funds, with as little delay as possible to prompt and quick handling of all applications.

The Region Managers office is organized on a scale to handle all applications for loans with practically no delay. Checks are being sent to applicants within twenty-four to thirty-six hours from date applications are received. This has been made possible because efficient and expeditious methods of handling have been provided, and all red tape dispersed with.

Mr. Sandigre states that he has noted a lack of interest in many communities in the counties under his supervision on the part of many business men who appear not to have grasped the significance of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation. This act was to get new money into circulation and to revive business generally. In the communities where business men are fully alive to the importance of seeing that deserving farmers in their trade territory are made acquainted with the provisions of the Crop Production Plan, the local boards are kept busy almost day and night preparing applications and business is receiving a stimulus as checks are returned and the farmers have cash to spend in the purchase of needed supplies.

It will be of interest to many farmers to learn, that Regional Manager Sherrill has obtained a waiver of priority liens in favor of government crop loans. The waiver granted by J. E. Fouts, Supervising Receiver for National Banks and M. N. Gossett, President Federal Land Bank of Houston, who have wired Mr. Sherrill in part as follows:

Wash., D. C. March 18, 1932. "We are authorizing all National Bank receivers in Texas by wire to execute subordination or waiver agreements in favor of your agency in all necessary cases of purpose stated."

"In order to cooperate with government advances to farmers, The Federal Land Bank of Houston agrees to waive priority of crop mortgages to extent of first lien to secure funds advanced by government."

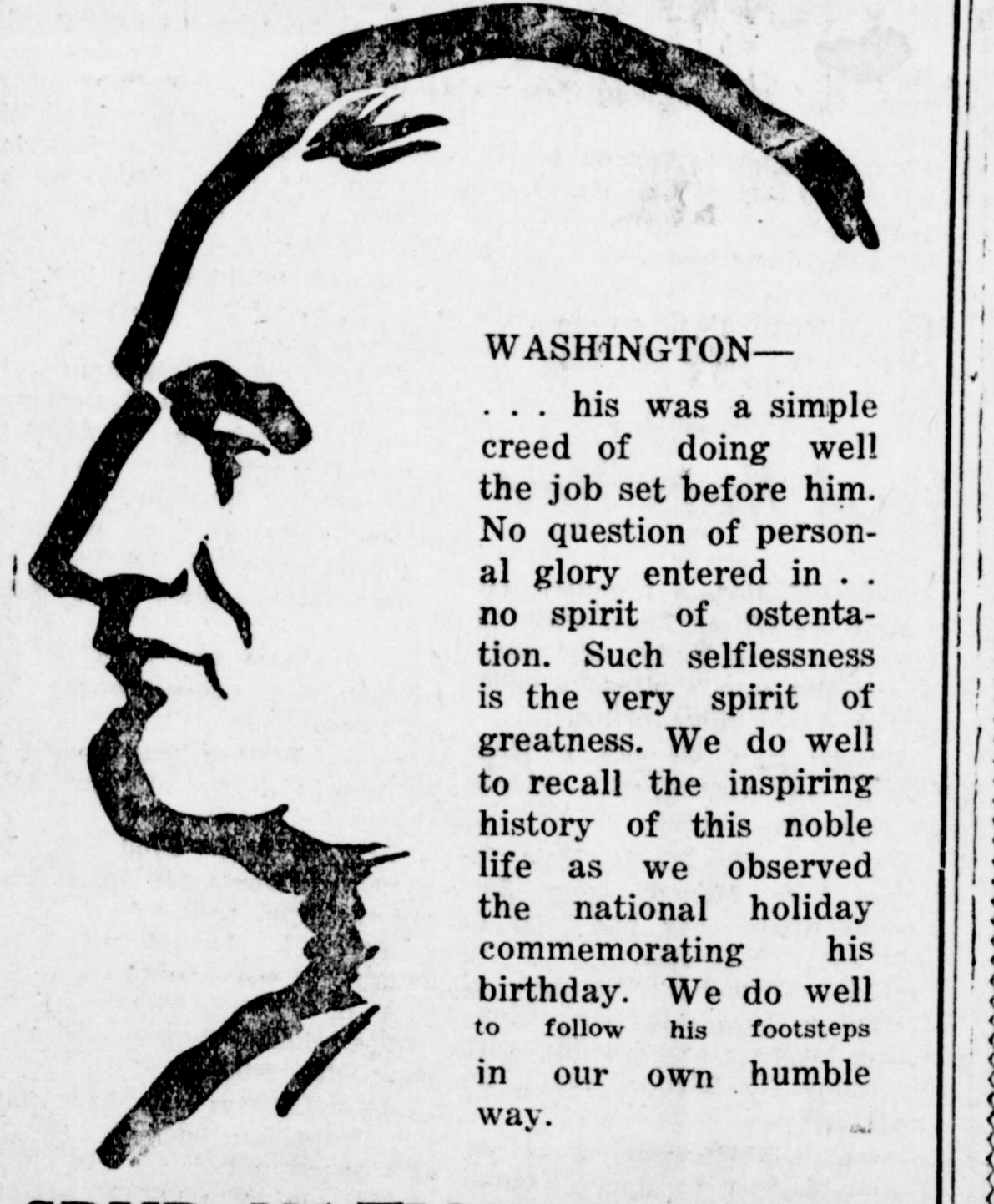

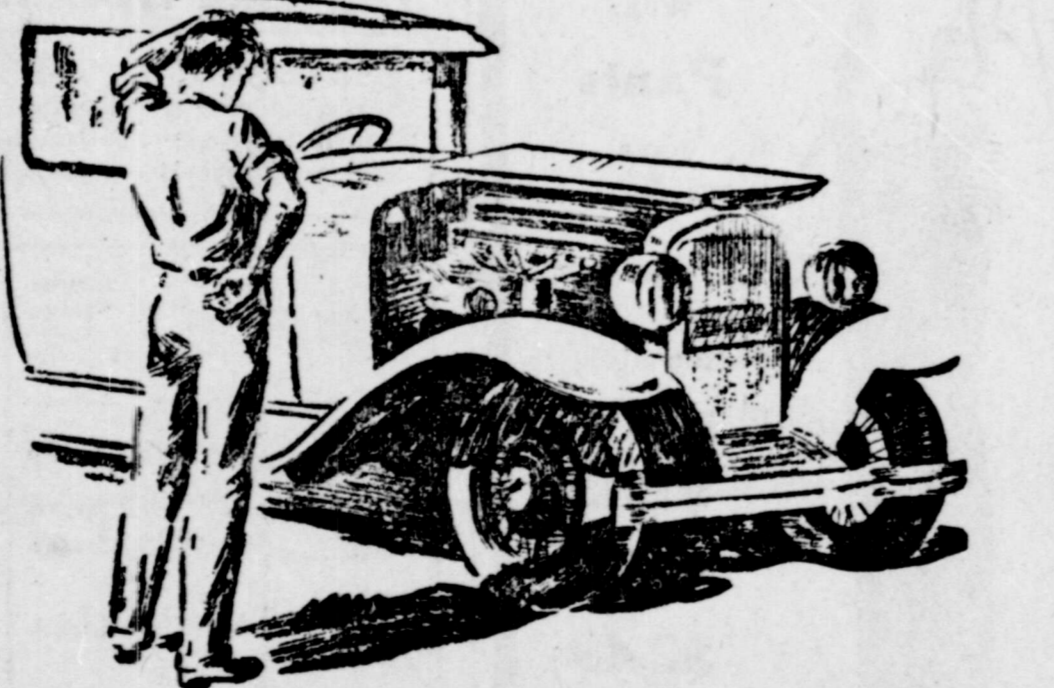
