Thousands Of Visitors in Spur Last Saturday

The largest crowds of many months thronged the streets of Spur, Saturday of the past week, the chief drawing card being an advance inspection of the steer feeding experiments being carried on at the local Experiment Stat-

Fifteen hundred or more men and boys were visitors at the station during the morning and for the big barbecue dinner, served complimentary by the station and the merchants of the city. 896 of the visitors registered and an inspection of the list showed them to have represented 21 different communities.

During the morning a general inspection and discussion of the steers was made and the various combinations of West Texas grown feeds that was being fed and relative costs. Posters of the different rations and cost per hundred pounds gain in weight were placed on each of the pens. Cost figures ranged from \$3.88 to \$4.75 per hundred pounds gain; and we are informed that in computing the costs highest market prices were placed on the feeds used. Only rough details were given at this preliminary inspection but from the figures shown it can readily be seen that this project has already made a profit.

Plans have been made for final inspection of the steers on April 22 when the experiment will be concluded and the beeves shipped to market. On this date minute details of the experiment will be issued.


