Lindbergh Baby Found Dead Late Thursday

Radio reports received here Thursday afternoon state that Chas. Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., 2-year-old son of Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh, kidnapped several weeks ago, had been found, dead. The body was found hidden in underbrush on the estate at Hopewell, N. J.

Reports state further that the body was badly decomposed, leading officials to believe that the child was never carried from its home.

It is to be hoped that the world-wide search which has been in progress will unearth the perpetrators of the kidnapping and possible murder. Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh have the sympathy of the entire nation.

Europe Buying Hockley Co. Grain In Car Load Lots

The nine cars of maize shipped last week by the White Face Farms, an account of which was published last week, totaled 708,000 pounds on arriving at Galveston, where it was graded as No. 2 and better.

This grain is an export shipment and will go to Europe, where it has become exceedingly popular within the past few years. It is stated that much of it is used in the making of bread and that it has been found as an excellent substitute for barley in the manufacture of beer. It is likely that the demand for West Texas sorghum grains will grow and that within the next few years the surplus of this section will be sent to other parts of the World. These grains at present are commanding a ready cash market which will improve as their uses are better appreciated. The classification given this shipment also proves conclusively that choice grain can be grown in Hockley County when properly cultivated.

The threshing of this grain was done by J. R. Joplin, who states that when the remainder of the crop is threshed the rentals of sorghum grains on the White Face Farms for last year will amount to about 1,500,000 pounds, the nine cars not being half of the amount on their yards.

The White Face Farms are located northwest of Levelland and comprise over seventy-five labors of land, and are operated on a rental basis under the management of Ira Willis of Dallas. Hockley County Herald.

Work on Spur-Dickens Highway Is Underway

Work started Wednesday of this week on the Spur-Dickens Highway which will be gravelled and topped with a layer of asphalt.

The work is under the management of the State Highway Maintenance Department and will be carried out with all expediency. The construction manager has stated that with exception of about five employees, local citizens would be employed in the work.

One Sample Of Public Ownership

The people of Virginia, Minnesota, light their houses with electricity for 2 cents a kilowatt hour—50 kilowatt hours for a dollar—less than half the cost in any neighboring city. The new rate for electric cooking is 1.8 cents per kw. h.

After this, it is not necessary to state that Virginia has a public owned plan. But the story of that public enterprise is well worth summarizing.

The plant was brought from a private company in October, 1913, at an outrageous price. The domestic rate at that time was 11.3 per kilowatt hour; which the public authorities immediately reduced to 6.3 cents.

In less than 19 years, public management has rebuilt completely the old, worn-out plant, paid off all bonds, made a total capital investment of \$1,846,820 in utilities, including steam heating and a gas plant, and cut electric light rates to the lowest in the state.

There is now a surplus of \$300,000 in the light and power fund. Does public ownership pay?

The Bethlehem Steel Company is graciously providing its half-starved workers with garden plots, 50x100 feet, in which to raise vegetables. How many vegetables would it take to equal the \$1,600,000 bonus paid to a Bethlehem official a few years ago?

MY BEDROOM IMPROVEMENT
(Mrs. Ora Henley, Prairie Chapel Club)

When the club members asked me to be the bedroom demonstrator for our club I thought it was impossible for my room was in such a run down condition and I could not spend much on it. My room had been papered twice with builders paper and you could see as much of the first paper as you could of the last, it was so ragged. The ceiling was warped and I thought it could never be smooth again. The doors, windows and floors were so rough it looked impossible to paint them. I had no convenience whatever for my clothes and linens and my furniture was old and scratched; there was no rug for the floor.

I tore the old paper off the wall and canvassed the walls with old sheets and worn out clothing. After the ceiling was nailed back in place, we papered with a cheap but dainty design bedroom paper. I smoothed the floor and woodwork the best I could and painted the floor dark brown, the doors and woodwork a buff color which harmonized with the ground of the paper. The furniture was cleaned and varnished with walnut varnish. I took an old discarded rocking chair and braced and varnished it for a reading chair.

I made a rug of old sacks died tan, rose and black. I started this rug last year but did not finish it. Since the colors were good for my room I could use it nicely.

I made a dressing table of scrap lumber and a chest of drawers from an old dresser. These were varnished walnut too. I am more pleased with my clothes closet than with the other improvements. It is made with cardboard boxes and scrap lumber for a frame. I now have an adequate storage place for my clothes and bed linens. I am really proud of my clothes closet for it saves many steps and takes care of my clothes, too.

I have a pretty yellow bed spread that I used to give the not of color, then I purchased light yellow marquisite for the windows.

The expense of the room is as follows: Wallpaper .72; floor paint .78; paint for doors and woodwork .45; window curtains .81; the varnish was given to me so my total expense was \$2.76.

It has taken lots of work but the pleasure I derive from my room is worth more than the work and expense.

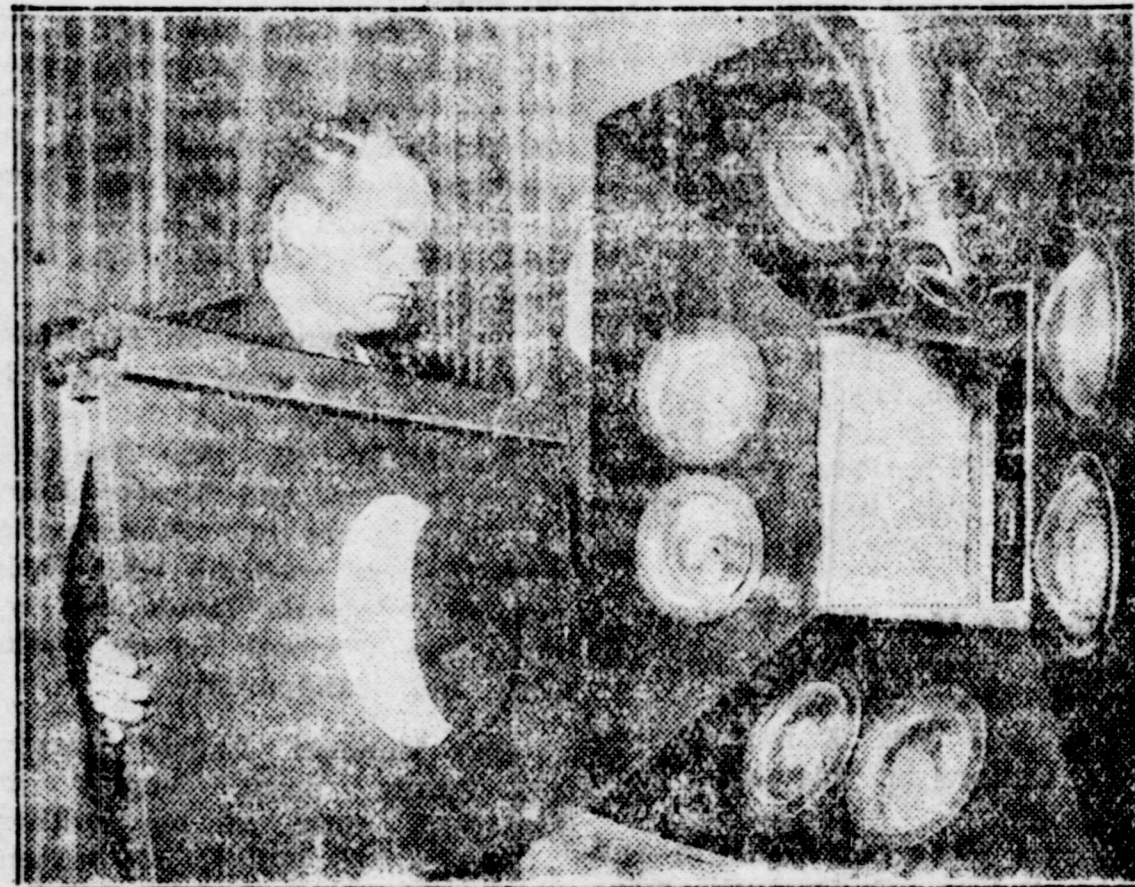

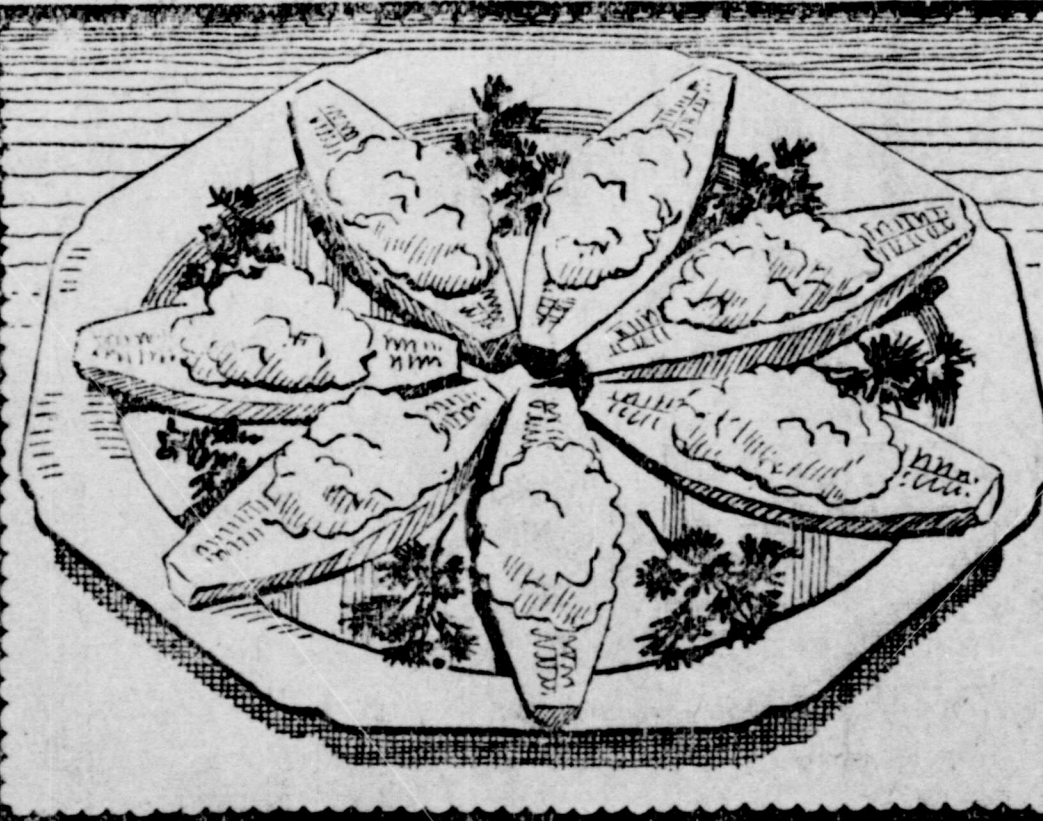

Savory Salmon

Serve it as a very special dish in a feather-light soufflé, or a golden-crust loaf. Garnish it for a salad with your most tempting celery curls or tiny lettuce cup-leaves. Boil for two minutes three-fourths cup of vinegar; twelve whole cloves, twelve peppercorns, six allspice berries and one-eighth teaspoon salt. Pour hot over the salmon and let stand several hours. Drain and serve cold in cucumber boats or on lettuce garnished with sliced cucumbers.
