Lindbergh Baby Found Dead Late Thursday

Radio reports received here Thursday afternoon state that Chas. Agustus Lindbergh, Jr., 2year-old son of Col. and Mrs. Lindbergh, kidnapped several weeks ago, had been found, dead. The body was found hidden in underbrush on the Hopewell, N. J.

Reports state further that the body was badly decomposed, leading officials to believe that the child was never carried from its home.

It is to be hoped that the world-wide search which has been in progress will unearth the perpetrators of the kidnapping and possible murder. Col. and Mrs Lindberg have the sympathy of the entire nation. ----
