Ponca City Will Have No Taxes

Wealthy Residents Shower Gifts on Citizens

Ponca City, Okla., July 19.—Ponca City, the pet of two prominent oil men, whose bounties have included swimming pools, horseback riding and free movies as well as more substantial gifts now is to become a taxless city.

The city commission announced today there would be no city levy next year. For several years no general revenue levy has been made and this year the \$238,714 sinking fund appropriation, for which an 8-mill levy was made last year, will be paid out of the profits of the municipal water and light plants.

This, too, in spite of the fact water and light rates twice have been reduced in the past two years. The rates are about on a level with those in other Oklahoma cities.

There are no other taxless cities in the State.

Lew Wentz bachelor millionaire, devotes his especial attention to the welfare of crippled children and to every Ponca citizen. He gives ice in the Summer and toys at Christmas time.

Touched by the sight of a farmer digging deep into his pockets to take his large family to the movies, Wentz inaugurated free movies in the city auditorium twice a week. They're not talkies but they're well attended.

A free swimming pool for children in one of the city's parks is the gift of Wentz and an annual feature is Wentz' bathing beauty contest for "unmarried ladies" under 5.—adv

THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

All girls whose mothers are not club members planned the canning budget, for their families with the aid of the agent.

Goss, the Chandler Club will receive the work; August 2, at Mrs. Pentecost the Twin Wells club will be given the demonstration; August 3 the Duncan Flat women will meet with Mrs. Fred Henry for the work; August 8 the Dickens women will be given the demonstration and on August 9 the McAdoo women.

RELISHES

Dicel Relish

1 quart chopped cabbage. 1 pint chopped white onion. 1 pint chopped sweet red pepper. 1 pint chopped sweet green peppers. 3 tablespoonfuls of salt. 4 tablespoonfuls of mustard seed. 2 tablespoonfuls celery seed, (crushed). 3-4 cupful of sugar. 1 quart cider vinegar.

Soak the pepper in brine (one cupful of salt to one gallon of water) for 24 hours. Freshen in clear, cold water for one or two hours. Drain well, remove seeds and coarse white sections. Chop separately, and measure the chopped cabbage, peppers and onions before mixing. Add spices, sugar and vinegar. Let stand over night covered in a crock or enameled vessel. Pack into small hot jars that have been sterilized.

When ready to pack, drain the vinegar off the relish in order that the jar may be well packed. Pack the relish in the jars, pressing it carefully; then pour over it the vinegar which was drained off. Paddle the jar thoroughly to get every bubble out and allow the vinegar to displace all air spaces. Garnish each jar with two slender strips of red pepper. Place these strips vertically on the seams in the jar on opposite sides. Cap, clamp and process in a water bath for 15 minutes at 180 degrees F. (simmering).

Bee Relish

1 quart chopped cabbage. 1 quart cooked, chopped beets. 1 cupful grated horseradish. 2 cupfuls sugar; 1 tablespoonful black pepper. 4 tablespoonfuls salt. Mix ingredients, and cover with vinegar, heat mixture to the boiling point. Pack in jars and seal.

Corn Relish

1 dozen ears of corn. 1 head of cabbage. 3 sweet red peppers. 3 sweet green peppers. 1 quart of vinegar. 1 cupful of sugar. 2 tablespoonfuls of mustard. 1 tablespoonful of celery salt. 1 tablespoonful of salt.

Cook the corn for three minutes in boiling water to set the milk. Cool and cut from the cob. Cook all together for 20 minutes. Pack into clean hot jars.

Uncooked Tomato Relish

1-2 peck ripe tomatoes. 1 qt. of cider vinegar. 6 green peppers. 6 sweet red peppers. 4 medium-sized onions. 1 cupful of finely chopped cabbage. 2 teaspoonfuls of celery seed. 1-2 tea-
