Lombard, players honored at Waco

Nazareth basketball players and coach Joe Lombard were honored Saturday at a banquet at the TABC Texas High School Hall of Fame ceremonies in Waco.

Lombard was named girls coach of the year, for all classes. Three of his players were named to the academic all-state team, and the Swiftettes won an award for hitting the highest percentage of free throws, of any team in the state, during the

Seniors Shari Schilling, Renee Ramaekers and Johnny Schmucker were named to the academic allstate squad.

Schmucker maintained a 90 average this year, while Schilling and Ramaekers both had 94 averages.

DHS all-stater is first woman in state Hall of Fame

Lometa Odom, former Dimmitt all-stater and Wayland All-American, made history again Saturday when she became the first woman ever inducted into the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame.

She was inducted at the 11th annual Hall of Fame Installation Banquet at noon Saturday, amid a standing ovation by more than 1,000 in the Waco Convention Center. At the same banquet, Joe Lombard of Nazareth was announced as the High School Girls' Coach of the Year.

"I accept this honor on behalf of all the people who touched my life," Odom said in her four-minute acceptance speech. "It's been a lot of hard work, yet many happy memories. My life is richer because of all who helped me reach today.

Odom also paid tribute "to all my former teammates, who are my friends. I feel that each and every one of them share the honor with me, for without them there wouldn't have been a team.'

Many of those former Dimmitt High School teammates

were on hand in Waco for the induction - to Odom's They were Mauriene Smithson Matthews of Plainview (a fellow DHS all-stater and Wayland All-American), Decimae Dennis, Connie McRee Barrington, Darlene Cates Wooten, Katy Coke Wright, and Odom's sister, Margaret Parks --

who also was an all-stater at DHS and an All-American at

Also attending were Odom's mother, Opal; her sister, Danna Beck; and Allan and Peggy Webb, all of Dimmitt. Webb was one of the Wayland Flying Queens' pilots while

Odom played on the national championship women's team. "You should have seen the look on her face when those ex-Bobbies walked in as a group," Mrs. Beck said.

Odom departed from her prepared remarks to introduce her former DHS teammates, "and I issued a blanket challenge to anyone who wanted to play us," she said. Introducing her family, she commented, "In thinking of those who contributed to this, credit has to go to my family

She also paid tribute to the late John Blaine, who developed her into an all-stater as a DHS sophomore and guided her and her teammates to three state championships from 1950 through 1952, to her college coaches, and to the family of the late Claude Hutcherson of Plainview, who sponsored the Wayland Flying Queens and provided the planes that enabled them to play a coast-to-coast schedule.

Odom played in only 11 losing games throughout her basketball career — seven in high school and four in college. The Bobbies went undefeated in 1952, and the Flying Queens were undefeated three straight years while Odom was the starting post forward.

'Did I ever let a loss upset me? You bet - we weren't supposed to lose," she said this week. "I'd find myself wondering what I could do to keep this from happening One game which Odom's team was tagged to lose was in

the 1952 state tournament against undefeated Penelope. The Bobbies were undefeated also, but Odom had a badly sprained ankle and was not playing up to her usual par. 'They had a 44-0 record going into the game, and they were favored," Odom recalled. "We were scared to death of them, and we hadn't been playing very good ball in the

two games before that.' Jinx Tucker, sports editor of the Waco Tribune, wrote before the showdown that Odom was "snake-bit." Odom convinced Coach Blaine to tape both her ankles as

tightly as he could, and vowed, "I may never play another

game, but I'm going to play this one."

With outside forwards Mary Nelson and Darlene Cates feeding her the ball, Odom scored 38 field goals and two free throws for 78 points - a state tournament individual scoring record that has never been equalled. Meanwhile, guards Mitzi Wilson, Katy Coke and Decimae Dennis 'pretty well shut down Penelope's offense," Odom recalled, and Dimmitt won the game and the state championship - the third of five that the Bobbies would win in a six-year span.

That 78-point game was the high point of Odom's amazing high school basketball career - a career that also included two other state championships and victories over two Iowa state championship teams in 1950 and '51. Other high points followed - making All-American four years at Wayland while playing on three national AAU championship teams; playing on the United States team that won the gold medal in the 1955 Pan American Games in Mexico City; being the unanimous choice as captain of the 1956 All-American team.

During her senior year at DHS, she averaged 39 points per game. She stands fourth on the Wayland Queens' all-time scoring list with 1,614 points.

After graduating from college, she coached at Gruver a year, at Spearman four years and at White Deer 17 years. She has coached junior high girls in Plainview the past six years, and said one of her star players so far has been the daughter of her former DHS and Wayland teammate, Mauriene Smithson Matthews.

Odom's installation Saturday by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches was her third induction into a hall of fame. She was inducted into the Helms Foundation National Hall of Fame in 1968, and in 1971 was the first woman inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

The income and patronage capital statement showed that wholesale power was again the largest item of expense in fiscal '83 - \$8plus million, some 74% of the entire expense total.
