> As an example, Bentsen noted that some farmers switched from cotton to wheat in 1982, working to build an acreage base so they could participate in the wheat program with their 1983 crop. They learned, several of them too late, that under the most recent farm bill the 1982 crop would not count toward their acreage The Bentsen bill would

> establish a Farm Acreage Base and a Crop Acreage Base. Each would be set on a five year moving average. The bill would permit farmers to switch up to 25% of their Farm Acreage Base from one crop to another each year. 'It is high time that the




Deadline is Tuesday for certifying wheat

By CHARLEY HILL County Executive Director

The final date to certify wheat and other small grain crops will be May 15. You will also want to certify your ACR (set-aside) acres for wheat at the same time. If your ACR acres required for wheat are certified by May 15, we will be able to make your diversion payment soon after that date.

Accuracy of certification is very important. Irrigated and dryland need to be certified separately.

You need to certify your acres even if not enrolled in the program in order to protect your base, and future planting history for your

(set-aside) land? ACR land must have been in a crop two of the three years or planted to wheat for the 1984 crop

Can I bale my ACR (setaside)?

Yes, as long as it is wheat planted before Jan. 12. No other cover can be baled.

What if the wheat is not ready to bale by May 15?

Wheat that is not ready to bale by May 15 can be baled after May 15 if you come in and request an extension of the May 15 date. An inspection fee of \$20 will be charged and a field visit made. The wheat will have to be baled prior to the soft dough stage. Is there a reporting date for ACR?

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



The aldermen remarked that if there is less revenue, then expenditures must be cut, rather than raise the tax rate at this time.

Two bids were received for providing the city's insurance coverage for general liability, multi-peril, public officials coverage, auto liability and other coverage.

The Ronnie Parker Insurance agency of Dimmitt submitted a bid of \$27,229 for a one year policy and a partial bid of \$46,195 for three years' coverage, with premiums for auto, umbrella and airport policies to be added in, since they are only available on a yearly basis.

The Texas Municipal League submitted a bid of \$19,956 for a one year policy, but did not have figures available for a three year term.

Also, portions of the bid form submitted by TML were altered and a different deductible was listed, rather than the \$250 designated on the bid form. These alterations resulted in confusion on the bid terms, so the aldermen voted to hold the bids until they could be examined in more detail.

A special meeting for that purpose is set for tonight (Thursday) at 7, and City Manager Paul Catoe said that a representative of Johnson & Higgins of Texas, Inc. (the company that would administer the TML policy) is planning to be at the meeting.

The aldermen accepted specifications on two vehicles for the city, a pickup for the works department and a car for the police department. Bids will be called for on the two ve-


