

Hance supporters will rally here Tuesday night

An old-fashioned ice cream supper will be used Tuesday evening to raise funds to help Congressman Kent Hance continue his race for the US Senate.

The event will be held at 8 p.m. in the Castro Expo building, and is open to the public.

"Admission is free, but bring your check book," said Carl King, co-chairman of the Castro County Hance for Senate Committee.

Local members of the Hance Youth Corps will serve homemade ice cream, and musical entertainment will be provided by the Singing Farmers of Hart and the Flatland Bluegrass.

Castro Countians helped kick off Hance's campaign for the Senate in February with a chili supper and reception that netted \$22,800 — twice as much as Hance expected.

That money helped the Dimmitt native forge into the lead in the six-man race and into a runoff with State Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin for the Democratic nomination.

However, Hance's campaign fund was almost half a million dollars in the red by the time he completed his statewide primary campaign, which included an expensive but successful "television blitz" late in the campaign.

The primary runoff election will be held June 2, with absentee balloting to begin next Wednesday.

Hance campaign workers are hoping not only to raise more money through Tuesday's ice cream supper, but to generate a bigger

voter turnout in the June 2 runoff. Local Democrats gave the county's native son 91% of their vote in the May 5 primary, but most Hance campaign workers were disappointed with the 40.46% voter turnout here, although it was twice as high as the state average.

"I would have hated for Kent to have finished behind the way (Bob) Krueger did and know we could have turned it around," said Harold Bob Bennett, co-chairman of Hance's county campaign committee.

"It may be that close again, and we can turn it, but not with a 40 1/2% turnout. It scares me that we had the power to make a big difference in this race, but we didn't do it."

Statewide, Hance received 31.25% of the vote, Doggett 31.18% and Krueger 31.11%. With 1.4 million ballots cast in the race, less than 1,000 votes separated Hance and Doggett, and Krueger lost his chance for a runoff by less than 1,100 votes.

In Castro County, 1,802 voted in the May 5 Democratic Primary. The county has 4,705 registered voters, with the large majority registered as Democrats.

Those who didn't vote in the May 5 Primary can still cast ballots in the June 2 primary runoff, King emphasized.

After the May 5 Primary, Hance said, "I wish we had had a higher turnout. In the runoff I've got to get my votes out or I'm in deep trouble. I've got to have a huge turnout in Castro County on June 2. I'd like to see an 80% turnout."

Plan to vote absentee? Apply now for a ballot

County Clerk Joy Jones said this week that anyone wanting to vote absentee for the June 2 primary runoff election should apply with her office for a ballot at once.

Absentee balloting will begin May 23 and end May 29. But because of the Memorial Day holiday, the clerk's office will be open only four days during that time span — Thursday and Friday, May 23 and 24, and Tuesday and Wednesday, May 28 and 29.

If you did not vote in the May 5 primary, you can still vote in either party's runoff election, Mrs. Jones said.

The clerk's office will mail absentee ballots to voters who are registered in Castro County but are living elsewhere, such as college students and military person-

nel. If you voted absentee in the May 5 primary and wish to do so again for the June 2 primary runoff, you must apply with the clerk's office for a new absentee voting kit, Mrs. Jones emphasized. The only exception to this is military personnel who voted in the first primary.

On the Democratic ballot, the primary runoff is highlighted by the US Senate race between Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett, and the race between Don Richards and Thomas M. Richards for Representative in Congress, 19th District.

On the Republican primary runoff ballot, the only race is between Larry Combest and Ron Fleming for Representative in Congress, 19th District.

Political parties to convene Saturday

Both major political parties will have their county conventions Saturday afternoon.

The Democrats will meet at 2:30 p.m. in the Court-house assembly room (basement), with County Chairman Oscar Wylie presiding.

The Republicans will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt City Hall meeting room, with County Chairman Deanne Clark conducting the meeting.

Members of both parties elected delegates to their county conventions in pre-

Castro is named for drought aid

Although it was reported Sunday that Castro County has received designation for drought assistance by the US Dept. of Agriculture, local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation director Charley Hill said that his office has not yet received official notification.

"We won't know what all is involved in the designation until we receive the official notice," Hill explained.

According to information released Sunday, farmers and ranchers in designated counties can apply for Farmers Home Administration emergency loans and to purchase low-grade feed

corn at reduced prices.

"There's no doubt that we are in a drought situation, but the problem is not as obvious right now here because most of those with cattle are grazing them on wheat crops, but if there isn't any rain in the next 30 to 45 days they could really be in trouble," Hill said.

Other Panhandle and South Plains counties designated as eligible for drought assistance are Carson, Deaf Smith, Hardeman, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lubbock, Moore, Parmer and Sherman. A total of 166 counties have been designated state wide.

inct conventions that were held after the polls closed May 5.

At Saturday's county conventions, local party members will elect delegates to their respective state conventions and draft resolutions regarding party pro-

cedures.

In the Democratic presidential sweepstakes, Wylie reported, Sen. Gary Hart has the most support among delegates elected to Saturday's county Democratic convention. Of the 54 delegates elected from the 16 voting precincts, he said, 22 expressed a preference for Hart, 17 for former Vice-President Walter Mondale, two for Rev. Jesse Jackson and 13 preferred to remain uncommitted.

This bucked the statewide trend, which indicated that Mondale was the leader among most Democratic delegates across the state.

The Republicans expressed their presidential preference on their May 5 primary ballots, with 101 favoring President Reagan and four preferring to remain uncommitted. The Democrats opted to use the convention-caucus method for expressing their presidential preference.

Wylie said a major item on Saturday's Democratic convention agenda will be to promote a big voter turnout here for the June 2 primary runoff election, in which Congressman Kent Hance will face State Sen. Lloyd Doggett for the party nomination for the US Senate, and Don Richards and Thomas M. Richards will face each other for the party's nomination to succeed Hance as the 19th District congressman.

For industrial development

DISD donates \$14,000

By a vote of 5 to 2, the Dimmitt School Board voted to donate \$14,000 to the industrial fund proposed by the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee, represented by Chamber President George Sides and Industrial Revenue Bond Program Chairman George Lamberth.

From a total fund of \$49,000, efforts will be made through a steering committee and a full time industrial developer to obtain new businesses or industries for Dimmitt or Castro County.

Lamberth said that the fund proposal calls for \$27,000 for the salary for the developer, \$9,000 for travel expenses, \$7,000 in fund reserves to assist in expenses associated with helping active candidates implement construction plans, \$4,000 for labor-related costs, such as social security and insurance, and \$2,000 for supplies, utilities and miscellaneous.

School board president Charles Wales and board member Stanley Nelson voted against the proposal. Wales stated that he felt the prospect is too much of a gamble with the taxpayers' money.

The current school health insurance plan allows for coverage of retired employees, and the board voted to adopt board policy allowing retirees to opt for such coverage at their own expense for as long as they wish. The only cost to the school district will be possible rate increases due to a higher experience factor.

A self study for 1983-84 identified science to be a weak area of instruction in the Dimmitt schools. Goals and indicators for achieving those goals were drawn up by the self-study steering committee.

A survey of third, sixth and twelfth grade students shows that major weaknesses are in third-grade awareness of the environment, (with 42% of those tested demonstrating mastery) sixth grade use of the metric system (with 40% of those tested demonstrating mastery), sixth grade ability to classify items according to similarities or differences, ability to describe animal behavior and ways in which animals learn, and ability to interpret consumer information (45% mastery in all categories).

Other discrepancies reported in the science program include no exhaust fans and no safety glasses or aprons in the middle school, not meeting the new requirement for 40% of classroom time to be spent in lab activities, inadequate storage and lab space, and the learning activities of each

course do not necessarily build on the previous levels.

The board accepted the report and indicated that some of the short-term problems have already been dealt with.

Board members agreed to approach their attorney Jimmy Ross concerning a possible agreement between the district and the local adult softball association for construction of a softball field on school property in the southwest section of the vacant lot near the First Baptist Church just off of the bypass road.

David Schaeffer told the board that the association wants to construct a permanent field, including lights, bleachers, watering system, restrooms, and a fence.

Board members approved administration application for state funds to be used in the gifted-talented program. If allocated, the grant would be for approximately \$4,500.

Members of a recently formed parent support group for the gifted-talented program informed the board of some of their activities and plans and commended the local G/T program.

DHS senior dies in accident Sunday

Douglas Wayne Garibaldi, 20, of Dimmitt, was killed in a one-vehicle accident Sunday afternoon on an unpaved county road 3.5 miles southeast of Dimmitt.

Texas Dept. of Public Safety Trooper Rick Bentley reported that Garibaldi had been a passenger in a 1979 Chevrolet pickup owned and driven by Primitivo Peralez Sanchez, 29, of Dimmitt.

Sanchez sustained only minor scrapes and bruises but had been kept at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt for observation for possible internal injuries. He was released Monday afternoon.

Pending results of a blood sample test, Bentley said that charges may possibly be filed in the incident. At the least, a citation for unsafe speed will be issued, he reported.

Heading west on the dirt road, the vehicle approached an offset intersection and pulled too far to the right, causing the vehicle to run into the bar ditch on the right side of the road.

Bentley said the ditch appeared to have been recently cut and was three to four feet deep with fairly steep sides. He reported that the pickup slammed into the right side of the ditch, then lurched to the left, back toward the roadway.

"I think the deceased was thrown out the open window as the pickup started up the left slope," Bentley said. "Then the pickup came back to the bottom of the ditch and traveled about 21 feet before coming to a stop."

Bentley reported that Garibaldi apparently died of head or neck injuries from the fall.

The two men had been visiting friends who live about four miles east of where the accident occurred. Sanchez walked back to their residence to get help. During his absence, another vehicle came on the scene and then drove into town to report the accident.

The call from Sanchez came after officers, alerted by the passing motorists, were already at the scene.

Castro County Judge Polly Simpson was acting coroner at the scene.

Funeral services for Garibaldi were to have been held Wednesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt with Rev. John Street, pastor, officiating. Burial was to be in Westlawn Memorial Park by Parsons-Foskey Funeral Home.

A senior at Dimmitt High School, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Silvestre Garibaldi of Dimmitt; a son; three brothers; and a grandmother.

Police calls

All three Dimmitt schools were burglarized and vandalized during the week.

At Dimmitt Middle School and Richardson Elementary, burglars tore open vending machines and broke doors Saturday night as they roamed through both buildings.

Jenette Malone, Dimmitt Middle School teacher, discovered the burglary at 7:30 a.m. Sunday when she arrived at the school to care for some animals in her classroom and noticed that some pencil vending machines in the hallway were torn open. She notified police and school administrators.

Officers found that six hallway vending machines and several dispensing machines in the girls' restroom and women's lounge had been torn open and the money removed.

They also discovered that the burglars had broken doors to enter the main office, the library and a classroom, and had damaged a gymnasium door.

While the investigation was underway at the middle school, Supt. Robert Ryan checked the Richardson Elementary building and found that it, too, had been burglarized in the same manner.

No dollar amount has been set on the thefts or property damage. The investigation is continuing.

Dimmitt High School Principal Alex Glass notified city police last Thursday that the school had been entered via a bathroom window in the south end of the cafeteria, but that no damage apparently had been done to the building. All that could be ascertained as missing was a cash register key and less than a dollar in change.

A Dimmitt High School student filed a criminal mischief complaint last Wednesday after the rear window of her father's pickup was shot, apparently by a BB or pellet gun, while the vehicle was parked at the school. Police estimated the damage at \$250, and are investigating the incident.

The investigation is continuing into a burglary last week on the Cecil Crum farm six miles northeast of Dimmitt, in which burglars stole approximately \$4,000 worth of equipment and tools from a barn.

TRADE HURDLES HURTING AGRICULTURE

Prospects are rather bleak for agricultural exports, and that's hurting Texas agriculture since many of the state's commodities go into overseas markets, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The export picture is dim due to the strong dollar abroad which makes U.S. commodities cost more to foreign buyers, protectionist trade policies of foreign countries, competition from foreign producers, and weak credit conditions in many countries. With exports decreasing, farmers must cut back on production to keep commodity supplies at reasonable levels.

The first vandalism occurred at Dimmitt High School, where a stock trailer also was taken. Officers later found the trailer along FM 2567 northeast of Dimmitt, where the burglars apparently had failed to negotiate a curve and had abandoned it after running through a ditch and fence.

The other vandalism incident in which the six subjects have made statements involved \$400 worth of damage to a Dept. of Public Safety trooper's patrol car.

Charges are pending in both cases. Dimmitt police Sunday arrested Lester Limicy, 31, of Dimmitt in connection with the Saturday night burglary of the Beverage House liquor store at 605 E. Bedford St.

Police said burglars broke the glass in the front door to gain entry. Store owner Dale Prather estimated the total cost of the liquor known to have been stolen at \$166.95 and damage to the front door at approximately \$200.

An accident last Thursday at the intersection of Bedford and Broadway caused light to moderate damage to cars driven by Margarita Sandoval Rueda of Dimmitt and Marvin Dickson of Lubbock. Police said Mrs. Rueda attempted a left turn in front of Dickson's oncoming car. Mrs. Rueda was cited for failure to yield right of way.

A 31-year-old Dimmitt man was arrested here Tuesday on a warrant from Deaf Smith County, where he faces charges of criminal mischief and theft of livestock.

During the past week city, county and state law officers booked 12 persons into the County Jail on charges of drunkenness, DWI with no liability insurance, DWI after arraignment, disturbing the peace, assault, probation violation by DWI, and a traffic warrant.

Wheat field day is set

A Wheat Field Day will be held on May 24 at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland. Field tours to various research plots will start at 1 p.m. Dr. Bob Stewart, director of the research facility, invites everyone interested in wheat varieties and production practices to attend.

Hybrid wheat will be featured at the event. Dr. Kenneth Porter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Small Grain Breeder, has an irrigated nursery with 20 new hybrids he recently produced. Another nursery has

12 hybrids from commercial companies. Similar hybrids are being grown on dryland.

Pure line wheat varieties as well as barley and oat varieties will be shown in other irrigated and dryland nurseries. Dr. Frank Petr, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Area Agronomist, will discuss barley varieties. Gary Peterson and Jon Simmons will show visitors the dryland small grain nursery that has over 5,000 plots.

At another tour stop, Dr. Steven Winter will explain his irrigated wheat grazing trial. He is comparing two planting dates, four varieties and five removal dates for cattle. He is measuring both forage production and grain yields from the various grazing treatments.

Dr. Allen Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Weed Scientist, will show a no-tillage system in a wheat-sorghum-fallow crop-

ping sequence. Yields from no-tillage are being compared to sweep tillage in the wheat-sorghum-fallow cropping sequence. Reggie Jones, USDA Soil Scientist, will describe how he measures runoff from the cropping experiment. Jones said, "We anticipate the tillage system that saves the most water will produce the highest yields". At the same location, Dr. Wyatt Harman, TAES Research Economist, will discuss the economics of using no-tillage farming systems.

The Field Day is being sponsored by the USDA, Agricultural Research Service; Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Texas Wheat Producers Association.

Dr. Stewart said, "Researchers at Bushland have greatly improved wheat varieties and culture, and they are anxious to show their results to producers".

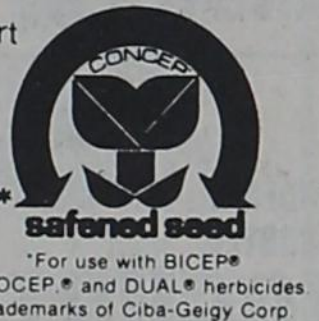

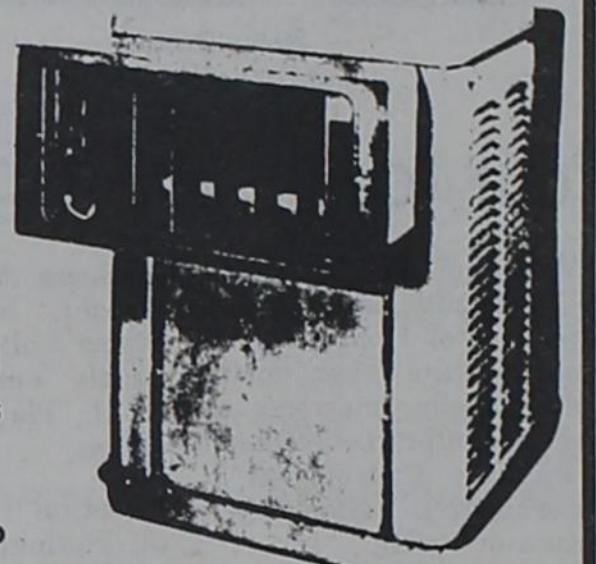

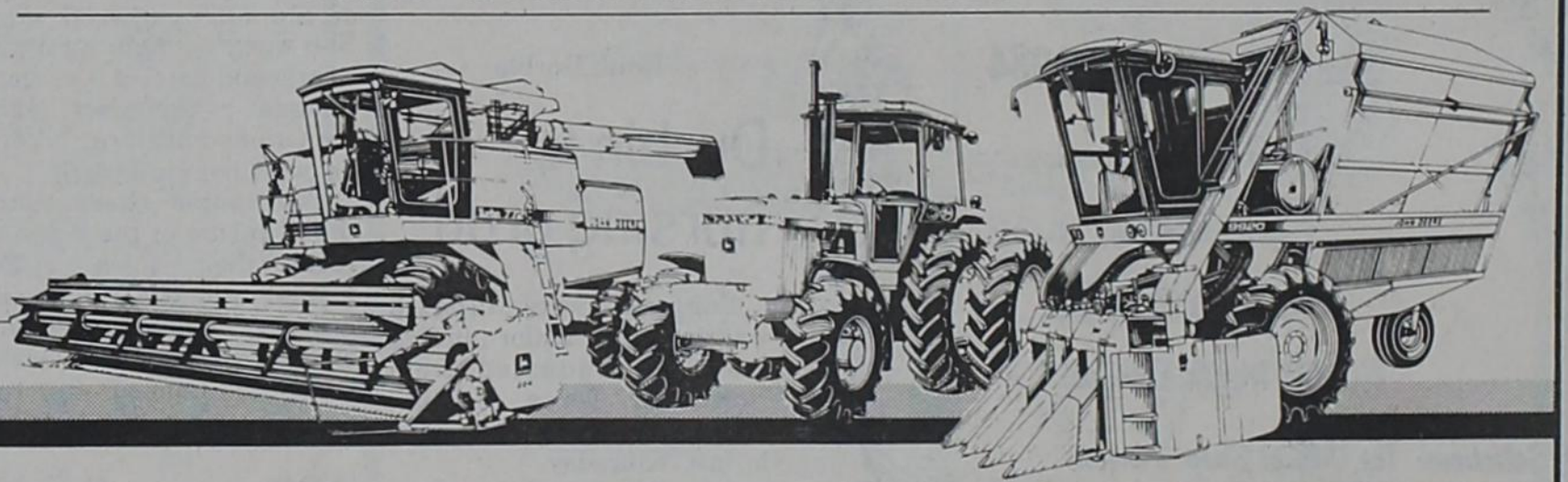

Kiwanians hear Pope

In the first five months of 1984, over \$1000,000 has been spent on surface repair of roads by the local maintenance district of the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation, according to Assistant District Engineer of the Lubbock District, Mel Pope.

Pope spoke Monday to the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club, telling the members that his district includes over 4,000 road miles and over 11,000 lane miles that have to be maintained.

He mentioned the upcoming special session of the Texas Legislature and the proposed legislation to raise Texas road taxes another five cents per gallon to bring about an increase in tax revenues to be used for road repairs and for the schools.

Pope said that the only new farm-market road planned for Castro County is a 3.4 mile-long strip in the southwest part of the county that would connect FM 303 to FM 145.

He informed the club that the local office has spent \$17,523.07 already this year on sign repair and replacement.

In response to a question he agreed that Texas roads are deteriorating faster than roads in surrounding states because of the limited maintenance the department is able to do with the funds available.

Pope was introduced by Kiwanian Doyle Wassom, who is the head of the local office of the department.

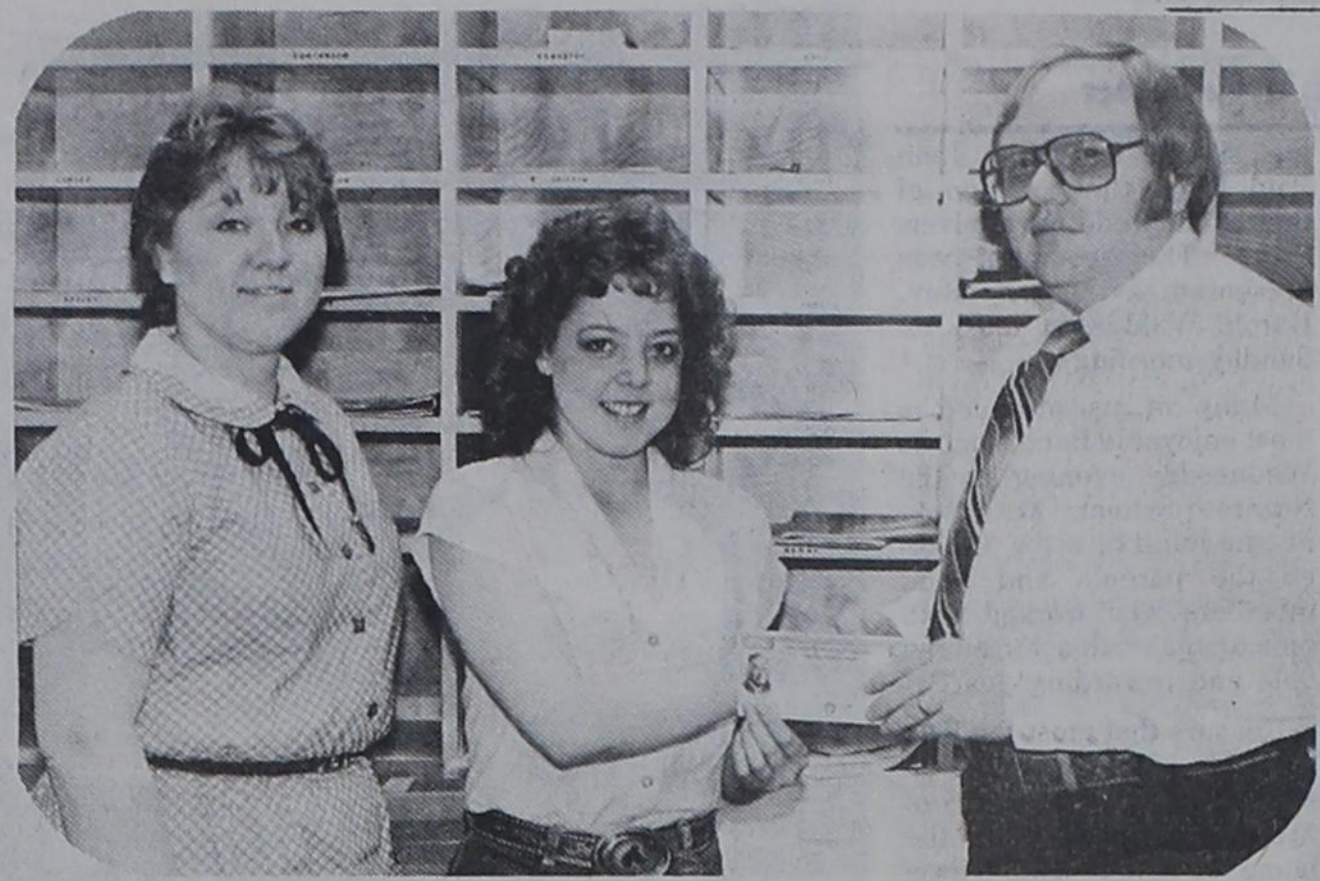

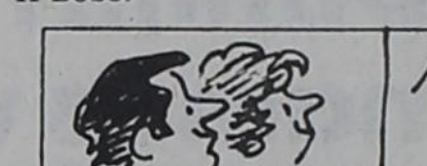

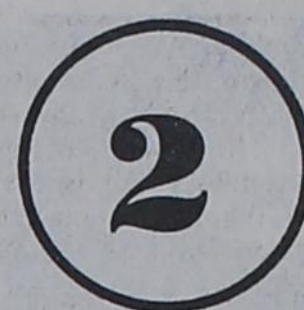

A NEW CONCEPT IN HANDLES

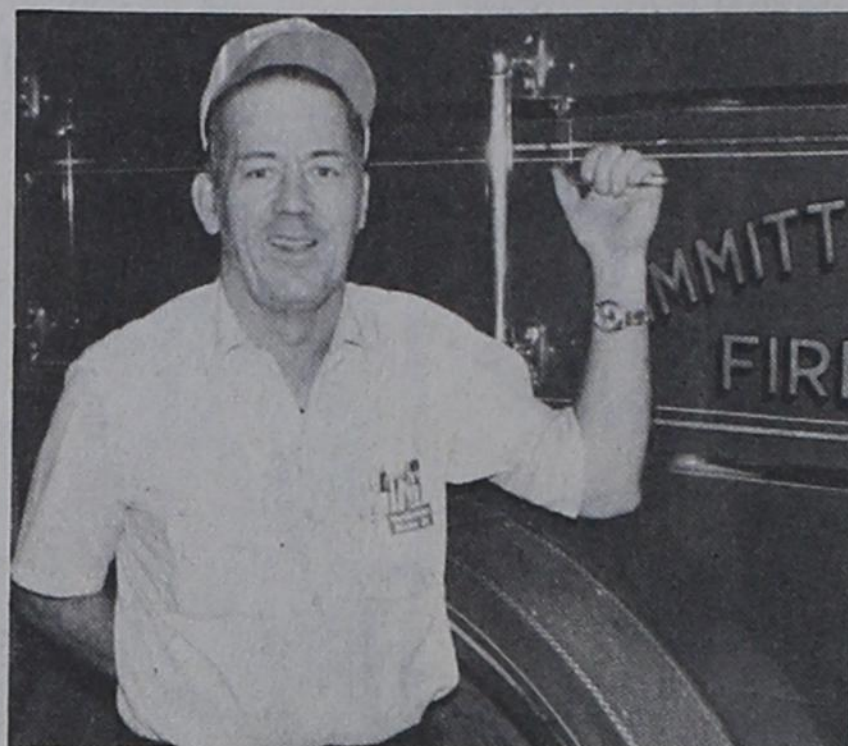
The idea of placing handles at a 19-degree angle — or "Bennett's Bend" — as it has been patented by its inventor, makes things easier to hold and use, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist Bonnie Piernot. The main effect of a 19-degree angle handle is that it eliminates "ulnar deviation," or the bend in your wrist that occurs as you pick up or use a tool, she explains. "The bend" allows you to keep your wrist straight. Persons with lifting problems, including those with arthritis, the handicapped or the elderly, may find angled handles especially useful, she says. Products currently available with a 19-degree handle include kitchen cutlery, pots and pans. Hammers, pens and even softball bats with a bent handle are under development. Although the angled handle seems a little strange at first, it can provide a better grip, control and balance for many household equipment items, notes the home economist.

Commissioners approved a bill for \$2,127.50 to Lubbock Electric for repairs to the nail picker.

County Veterans Service Officer Bedford W. Smith tendered his resignation, effective as of Aug. 31.

Burros requested that the commissioners allow him to hire an assistant for the summer months to aid him with his routine bookkeeping so that he could spend more time preparing an inventory for the budget preparation and a three-year review and projection of the budget.

Burros said that WTSU could provide a student and pay 70% of the wages. Commissioners agreed to look into the matter.

City awards insurance bid

Following a called meeting of the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Tuesday night, the insurance proposal from the Texas Municipal League was accepted at an annual cost of \$22,845.

The only other bid received was for \$27,229 from Ronnie Parker Insurance of Dimmitt.

City Manager Paul Catoe said that the questions the aldermen had had about TML's handling of the bid were adequately answered.

"They do include a higher deductible, but the aldermen felt that the other benefits of the TML plan outweighed that, and also provided a broader coverage in all areas," Catoe said. He also explains that TML felt some of the coverages included in the specifications were unnecessary in their past experience with cities.

Catoe said the session lasted two hours, with the aldermen asking lots of questions.

"TML will allow the city to make monthly payments on the premium, rather than asking for a lump-sum payment," Catoe reported. He noted that the city should get some back on their present coverage under Parker's agency on a pro-rata basis.

All of the city's insurance will now be under TML.

Commissioners buy deed books

The Castro County Commissioners agreed Monday to pay \$25,080 over the next two years to Business Records of Dallas for the service of reducing in half the size of the County deed records and deeds of trust.

Storage space in the County Clerk's office has become a problem. The reduction of the deed volumes would allow space for approximately 30 more years of records.

The 88 volumes of deed records and 44 volumes of deeds of trust are already on microfilm. The charge of \$190 per volume will go toward printing the smaller pages and binding them in reinforced bindings.

Payment of the cost will be divided into three equal payments, with one-third due in about October when the job is completed, one-third due in July of 1985 and one-third in July of 1986, with no interest charges.

County auditor Reeford Burros told the commissioners that Continental Telephone has given notice that as of Sept. 1 a charge of \$44 per hour will be made for repairs to phones that are still being leased.

Cost of purchase of the 22 phones already in use by the county will be \$2,308, including prior replacement of

faulty equipment. A 36-month payout plan is provided that will include interest charges. Also, a maintenance agreement can be obtained for \$44 per month, with the agreement continuing after the purchase of the equipment is completed.

Current phone lease charges for the county runs \$121.50 per month. The lease purchase plan would cost \$68.80 per month plus the \$44 maintenance contract. Commissioners agreed to take the 36-month payment plan.

The Nazareth Mayor Tommy Hoelting, City Commissioners Eugene Hochstein and Carroll Gerber, and Rev. Harold Waldow of Holy Family Catholic Church asked the commissioners to look into the rules and regulations governing county participation in local law enforcement.

The men reported that Nazareth has a problem particularly on weekend nights with drunkenness and reckless driving in the city by young men aged 18 to about

25. "Recently the disturbance continued as late as 3 or 4 a.m.," Rev. Waldow said. "We need help. Just the occasional appearance of a patrolman could be a deterrent."

Hoelting said that the city, because of limited finances, is unable to provide its own full-time police force.

County Sheriff Lonny Rhynes and the commissioners agreed that a county deputy would not have the authority to enforce city statutes. However, they did agree to ask County Attorney Jimmy Davis to investigate what ways the county could aid in the problem.

County Judge Polly Simpson agree to suggest to the Department of Public Safety troopers that additional, surprise visits be made to Nazareth to try to discourage some of the activity.

Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce President George Sides and Castro County Industrial Development Board Chairman George Lamberth told the commis-

sioners about the working fund they are trying to establish in order to attract new business and industry to the county and requested a \$14,000 donation from the county.

Commissioners agreed that new business and industry is needed to increase the county tax base, but did not take any action on the request for funds at this time.

Castro County Sesquicentennial Chairperson Linda Maxwell presented the committee's master plan to the commissioners for approval, prior to its submission to the state Sesquicentennial Commission for approval. The plan, outlining details of the county's celebration of the 150th anniversary of the State of Texas, was approved by the commissioners.

Commissioners approved a bill for \$2,127.50 to Lubbock Electric for repairs to the nail picker.

County Veterans Service Officer Bedford W. Smith tendered his resignation, effective as of Aug. 31.

Burros requested that the commissioners allow him to hire an assistant for the summer months to aid him with his routine bookkeeping so that he could spend more time preparing an inventory for the budget preparation and a three-year review and projection of the budget.

Burros said that WTSU could provide a student and pay 70% of the wages. Commissioners agreed to look into the matter.

Children may also suffer hypertension

Hypertension, or high blood pressure, has long been recognized as a serious health threat to adults, but only recently has its occurrence in children been noted.

For years hypertension was thought to occur in children only as the secondary result of other diseases, such as heart disorders.

However, recent research reported by the Texas Department of Health stresses that primary hypertension, or high blood pressure with no obvious cause, is probably the most common type of hypertension in children as well as adults, says Dr. Mary Ann Shirer, a health education specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In the United States, 2.4 percent of children ages 3-15, 7.5 percent of adolescents ages 14-18, and 10-15 percent of adults are estimated to have high blood pressure.

Hypertension is called a "silent disease," because signs and symptoms will become obvious only when the condition persists over a period of time.

The symptoms of hypertension in older children and adolescents usually include frequent headaches, dizziness and visual changes. Infants or young children may not even be recognized as having symptoms until complications such as unexplained seizures result.

The National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute now recommends that children three years of age and older should have their blood pressure measured annually.

Children diagnosed as at risk for developing hypertension, those on the borderline and those actually hypertensive should be placed in a prevention program and monitored regularly by their physicians.

Long-term prevention and control programs include weight control, reduction of salt intake, regular exercise and elimination of smoking, adds the specialist.

"The important thing about routine blood pressure measurement in children," says Shirer, "is that it presents an opportunity to help change behavior and promote healthy lifestyles early in life that can help prevent problems in adulthood."

1984 VETERANS HANDBOOK AVAILABLE — The 1984 edition of the Veterans Administration's benefits handbook, "Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents," is available for \$2.25, cut to half the price of last year's edition by the Government Printing Office's (GPO) new pricing formula.

Produced annually by the VA and printed and sold by GPO, the enlarged 73-page booklet provides a summary of benefits available to veterans and dependents.

VA benefits include medical care, education, job training, compensation, pension, insurance, loans and burial assistance. There is also information on Agent Orange, radiation, and consultations provided by the Vet Centers.

Job-finding assistance and other Labor Department benefits for veterans are described as well as benefits provided by the Department of Defense, Small Business Administration, and other government offices.

Also included are sections on eligibility; information in Spanish; the toll-free number for former prisoners of war (800-821-8139); and information for women veterans. While women veterans are entitled to the same benefits as male veterans, a law enacted last fall assures that appropriate care is provided in a timely fashion to any eligible woman veteran for any gender-specific disability.

Addresses and local phone numbers of all VA offices, medical centers, Vet Centers, and national cemeteries are listed in the back of the book.

"Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents," (IS-1 Factsheet) is available for \$2.25 from the Superintendent of Documents, GPO, Washington, D. C. 20420. Their stock number is 051-000-000162-1.
