It is important for people in the local area to know when to contact a Social Security office.

A person should contact Social Security:

-Before getting his or her first job, because a Social Security number is needed to get proper Social Security credit for earnings. This should be done at least four weeks before the number will be needed.

-After a death in the benefits can be paid.

-When someone in the family is disabled, to find out if disability benefits can be

-At retirement age - at 65 for full rate cash benefits, or as early as 62 for reduced benefits. Sign up for Medicare two or three months before 65, even if there are no retirement plans.

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
