Dickens county schools have, despite the fact that the last few years have been the hardest in a long time, kept in a better financial condition than most of the counties in the drought stricken areas; so much so that salesmen of school supplies and other commodities have commented on the fact, often, This is partly due to the fact that schhool finance has been wacthed carefully and expenditures kept down to minimum.


