She planned her food supply last spring before she made her garden and found that she needed to can 609 pints of vegetables, fruits, meats preserves, pickles and relishes to provide her family with adequate well balanced meals during the non productive months of the year. She needed 609 pints and she canned 1404 pints valued at \$153.45.


