Crockett the other day. Mrs. Crockett was farm food supply demonstrator for the Espuela home demonstration club last year and her pantry was complete in every respect.

She planned her food supply last spring before she made her garden and found that she needed to can 609 pints of vegetables, fruits, meats preserves, pickles and relishes to provide her family with adequate well balanced meals during the non productive months of the year. She needed 609 pints and she canned 1404 pints valued at \$153.45. "I use some canned food every day," she says.

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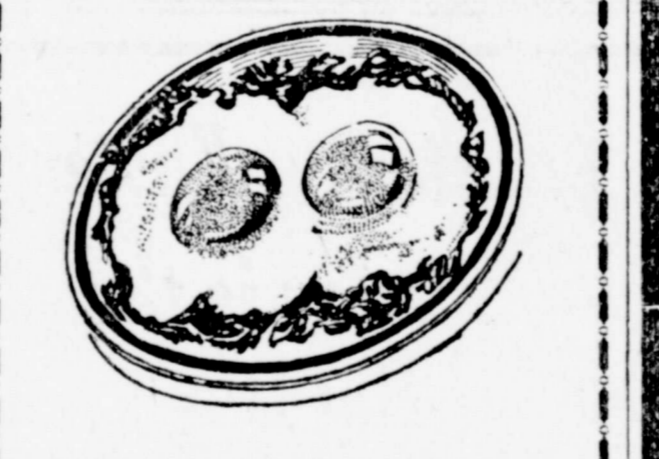

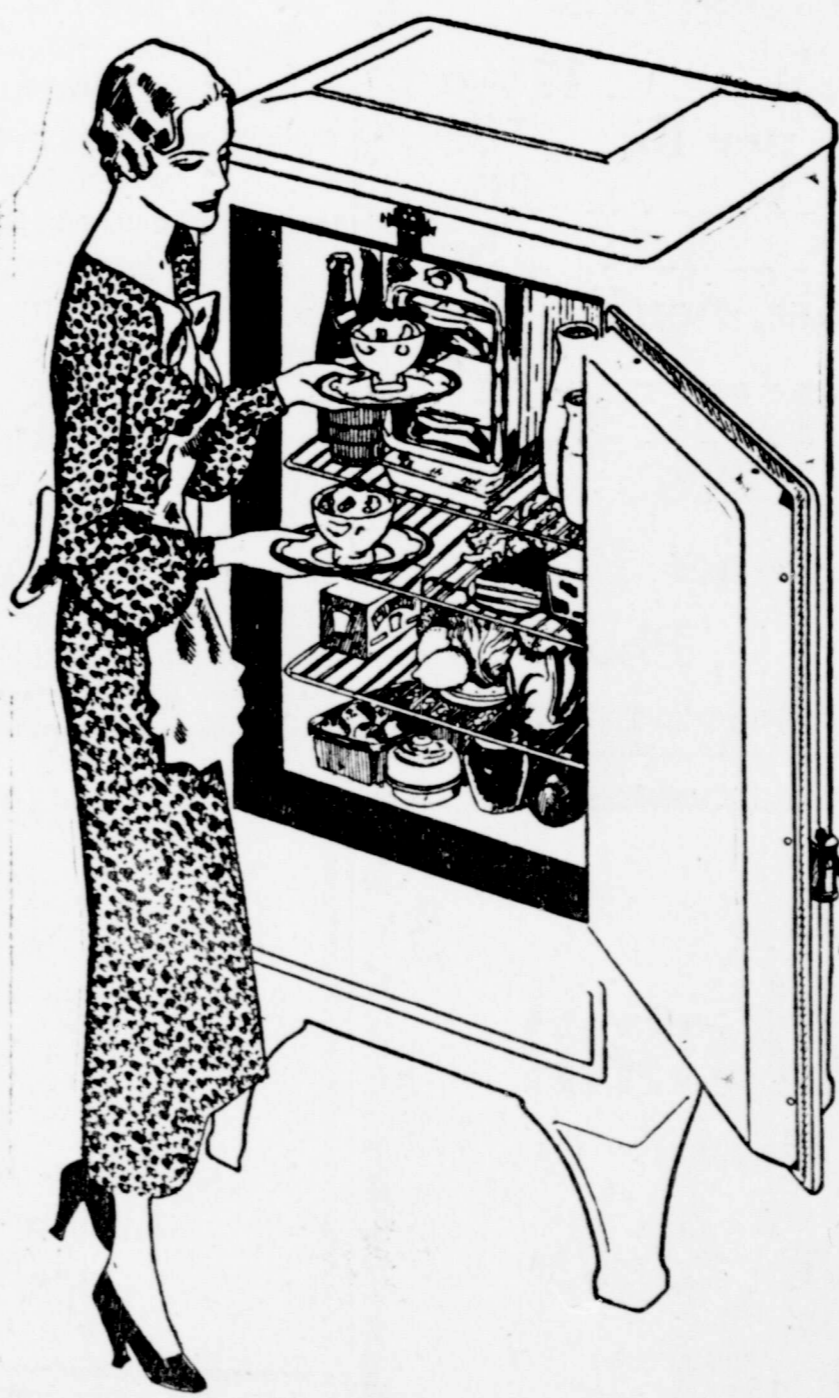
