TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 19TH

For nearly a year you have had before you my announcement for Congress from this new District.

Believing that the People generally have grown weary of the many-worded, time worn, inflated structures in American politics we call "Platforms" that so often become the funeral biers of numerous forgotten promises, I formally submit my candidacy to you in four simple sentences:

These four sentences pledge me to support every emergency measure of the President's Recovery Program consistent with the needs of those who live in this District.

They also pledge me to sincere and profound consideration of every future question of Government tending to promote the welfare and happiness of the people who live in this District.

Were I to detail a platform several times as long, I could say no more. The multiple problems of Government that are perplexing the greatest minds in the world cannot be properly discussed in a political announcement, nor can they be solved in a political campaign.

Questions of Currency, Revenue, Economy, Taxes, Tariff, Foreign Relations, National Defense, Commerce, Banking, Pensions, Transportation, Labor, Unemployment, Industry, Farming, Stock Raising, Marketing, Law Enforcement, and many others with their numerous related subjects, affect all mankind, and 434 other Congressmen will have an equal voice. All my life I have been a student of Law and Government. I shall expect to apply the knowledge gained, and my very best thought, to these matters as they arise.

However, if there are some who desire "an expression of my views on National subjects, I invite and welcome your inquiry personally and otherwise, and assure you a courteous reply. Before the campaign is over, I hope in some manner to acquaint every interested person with these views.

So far as I am able to observe at this stage of the campaign, every candidate in the race, regardless of the number of words used, is running on the same platform, which is: "A sincere desire to render a public service to the greatest number of people." This being true, the only ISSUE raised or that can be raised is "The Personal Ability and the Power of the individual candidate to Put Over the things he advocates and undertakes?" That is the only question for your determination, and one you must answer if you expect a full measure of representation in your law-making body.

Whether I fill the requirements in meeting this issue is for your determination. If I am not qualified to be your champion in any forum, and to stand man to man with any who oppose your interests, then I do not want to go to Congress. That is fair to you, and fair to me. VETERANS SEE THEMSELVES IN THE WAR



The pages of history will be rolled back at the Ritz Theatre in the near future when veterans will relive the World War as they witness "Forgotten Men," an official record of the war obtained from the archives of 14 participating nations.

A strange, tense atmosphere will pervade the theatre as these veterans recognize the very sectors in which they saw action. Once more they see themselves in mud stained uniforms and steel helmets, not knowing what the next moment holds for them. At intervals a gasp may be heard over the sound of exploding shells and the staccato fire of machine guns as one of these veterans feels once more the terror that is a part of war.

One New York resident recognized the ambulance which narrowly escapes destruction by a falling shell as one of the train in which he was a driver. Another declared the first tank shown on the screen to be the one in front of which he was walking in that particular battle.

As this history written in human blood is unfolded, veterans must of necessity recognize and relive these scenes, as they are authentic and were taken by official government cameramen, many of whom gave their lives that this record might be preserved for posterity. "Forgotten Men" is different in that it is complete. It begins with a scene showing the Kaiser and King George together just a few months prior to the outbreak of the war. The assassination of Archduke Ferdinand and his consort at Sarajevo follows and then comes the official order of mobilization by the Kaiser.

The following scenes take the audience to the front line trenches, where men fall like flies and human life is cheap; to European waters, where hundreds of ships are sunk by submarines, and into the clouds where man-made birds engage in stirring fights.

"Forgotten Men" is the World War stripped of every vestige of glamour and romance, stark and real. It may bring back harrowing memories, but in its authenticity, it must stand as an indictment of war with all its brutality and stupidity. It is made all the more authentic by the fact that eight World War veterans, representing seven participating nations and holder of the highest honors offered by their countries, explain the foreign sequences.

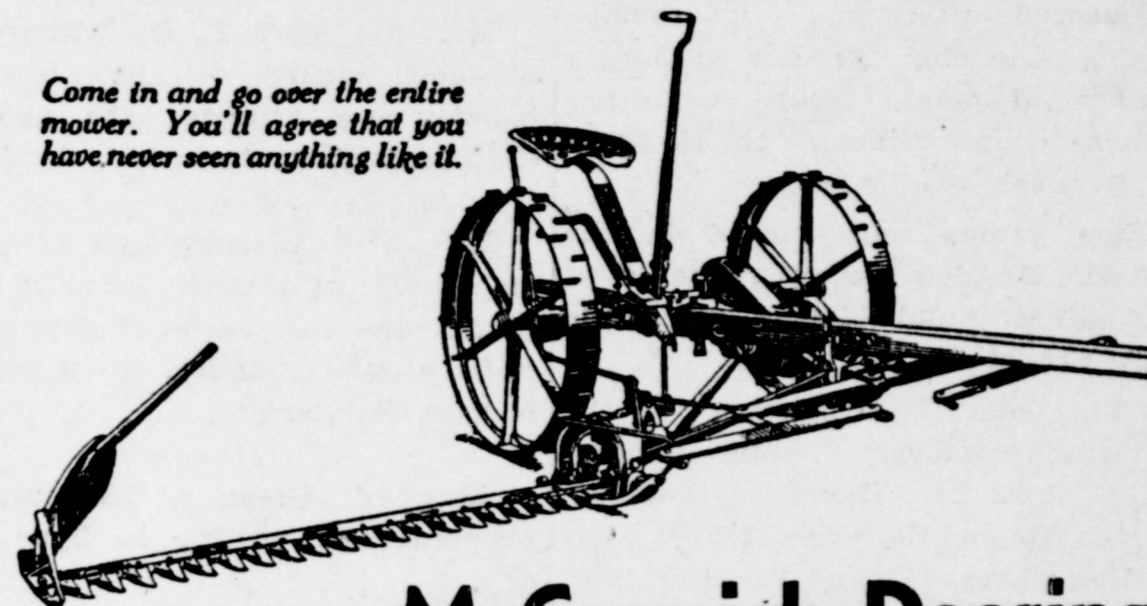

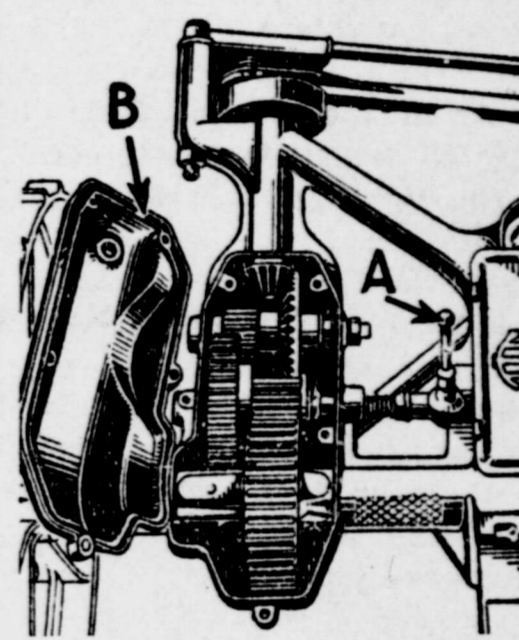
