grown good roots, so give them water during the hot, dry summer months."

This advice comes from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College. She says that experience with the transplanting of native shrubbery has shown that the first two years after setting out the plants is the most critical period, after that they are hardy enough to withstand normal weather conditions.

Contours and small terraces to catch and hold water after every rain will help to keep the soil moist. Shallow cultivation will also help. The use of mulch is an excellent way to hold moisture around trees and shrubs.

Among the good mulches to be found around farm and ranch homes, Miss Hatfield says, are decayed leaves, grass clippings, decayed wheat or oat straw, decayed hay or barnyard fertilizer. Place the mulch two or three inches deep.

An inch or two of sand is sometimes used on tight soils. When the sand or mulch, or both, are worked into the soil next year, they will improve the soil's water-holding capacity.

The growth of favorite flowers, shrubs and trees often can be helped by removing other

plants which take up the moisture.

Miss Hatfield points out that a light watering does more harm than good, as it causes roots to grow near the top of the soil. A good, slow watering once a week, giving the moisture a chance to soak several inches into the ground, is much better than a light watering every day.

SIMPLIFY YOUR WORK

When extension home management specialists of Texas A. & M. College meet with farm and ranch women over the state the theme of their workshops is "Make Motions Count," or "More Work With Less Effort." And they prove that it is possible.

"You will get more and better work done in less time and with less effort," they tell the women, "by making the best use of manpower, materials and equipment. And the first step is to break down the job."

List all the steps of the job as it is done. Include such motions as pulling, pushing, bending, walking, lifting and moving materials.

Then question every step made. Ask: why is it necessary; what is its purpose; where should it be done; when should it be done; how can it be done more easily, more quickly or better?

After these questions have been answered, the specialists point out, quite often the homemaker has found that she can eliminate a number of unnecessary steps. Rearrangement of work centers are often the results of such studies of housework.

"Leave out any part of a task you can," the specialists advise. "Use the best tool for that particular job. Sit to work whenever you can. Keep every-

thing in easy reach. Make one job out of two or three, and finally, make both hands work and you'll be surprised at the time and energy that you will save."

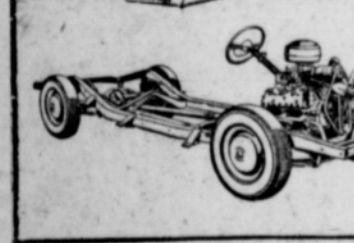

this time of year, for such things as headaches, fever, stiff neck, pain in the legs, irritability and drowsiness. These, the health officer stated, are symptoms of polio.

"It is well to guard against panic in polio cases," he said, "for complete recovery is not impossible. Even in the more severe cases, when the germ has penetrated the nervous system causing paralysis of one or more groups of muscles, some remarkable recoveries have been made."

Dr. Cox indicated his belief that the first line of defense against polio is a carefully conceived and thoroughly executed clean-up campaign in all communities.

"Local police power should

make such clean-up mandatory," he said.

S. J. R. No. 2
A JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for appointing the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at

any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act

and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

"Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving

the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

H. J. R. No. 7
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail

to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the

date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the

State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

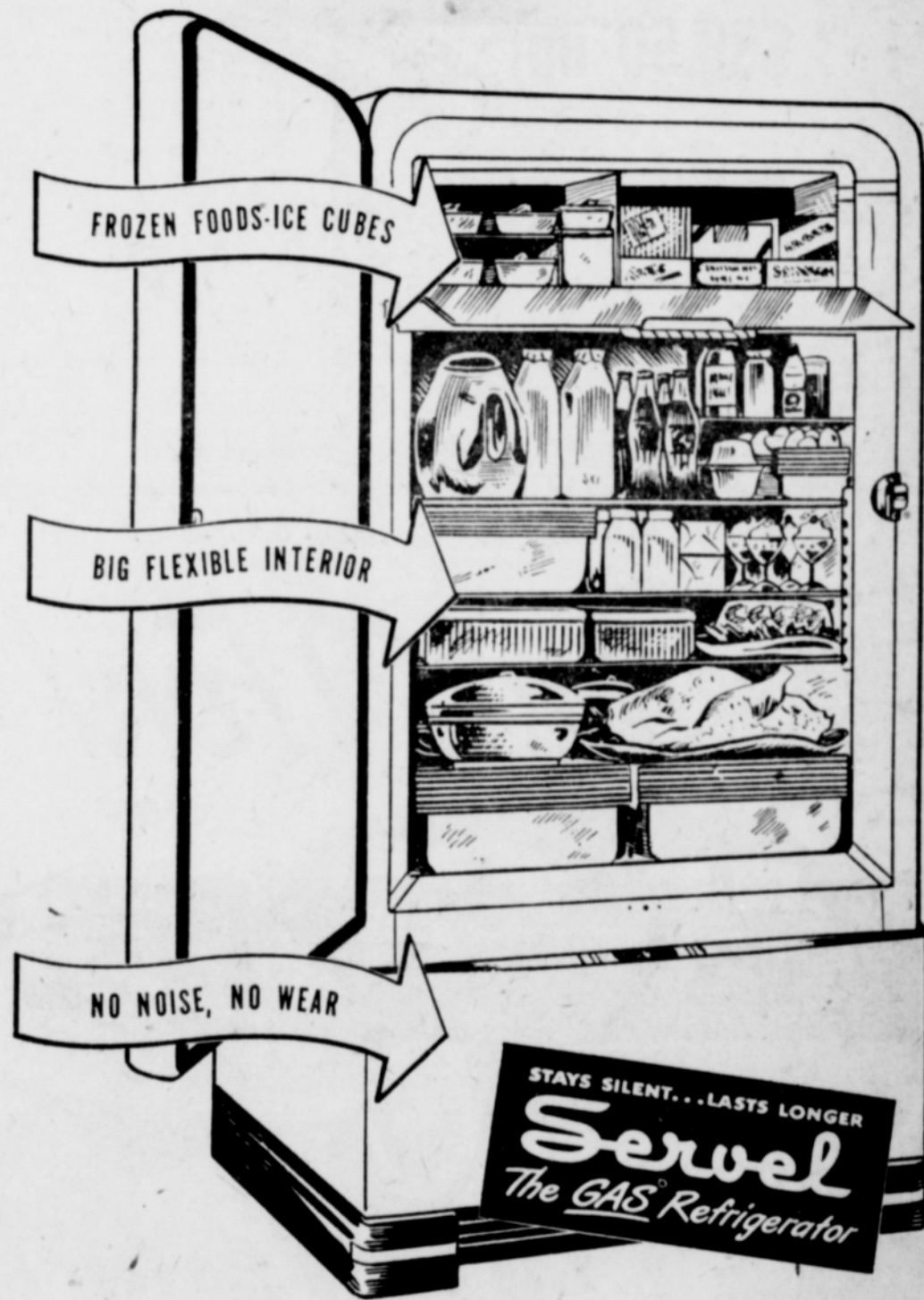

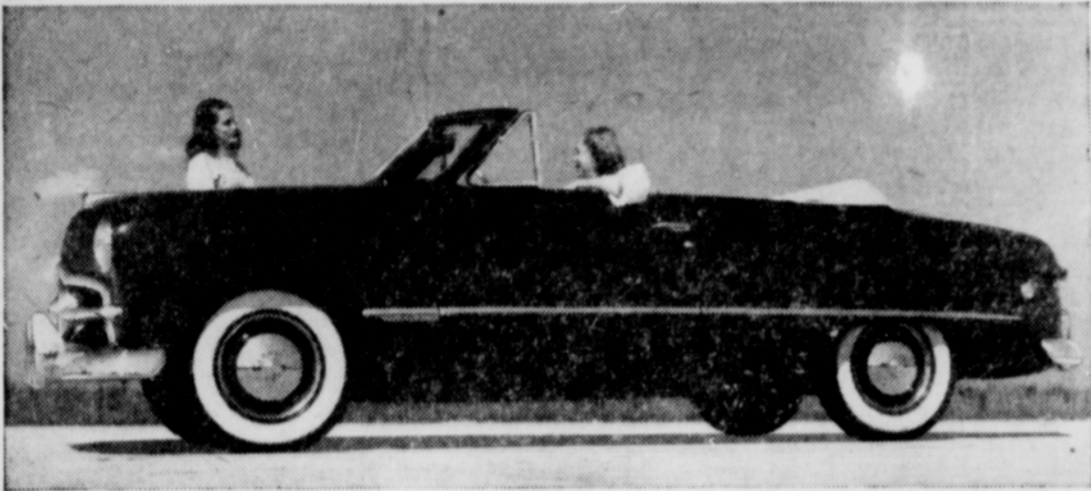

That Bogota Affair The bloody uprising which almost wrecked the Inter-American Conference at Bogota recently was headlined in the American press. Most observers thought it was just another South American political upheaval. Yet, when the smoke of pillaging, the looting, and the dynamiting had ceased, it was evident that this rebellion had something different. The new ingredient was the amazing precision of timing and the speed with which the events moved.

When American newspaper men who were in Bogota had time to think about it, they discovered that this "revolution" was pulled off with the same practiced techniques that European Communists have been known to use. It was also discovered, after the haze cleared, that our own State Department, including our Bogota foreign office, had received warnings out of Chile that something was afoot. Yet, nothing prevented the uprising.

"Mass" Action First a liberal party leader was shot down on the street under circumstances that indicate the Communists may have killed one of their own, just to get things started. The assassin was stomped to death and mutilated so that identification was impossible. After that, just like clockwork, mobs in widely scattered areas got busy. They grabbed radio stations and asked the "masses" to go forward to the attack.

The Communists then really took to their soapboxes. They openly identified themselves as Communists and called for comrades to raid any place that might have weapons. Other mobs attacked public buildings, including the famed Capitol where the Inter-American Conference was being held. Yet another mob dragged the assassin's corpse to the Colombian president's mansion, where it was flung across the doorstep for the rest of the afternoon.

Lawless Fanaticism What happened to the police? They had disappeared. Nor did the army show up. The mob, therefore, went about freely burning automobiles and wrecking buildings. Though the army was said to be critically short of gasoline, yet plenty was available for the gangs. Plenty of dynamite also. While these things were happening in Bogota, key centers elsewhere were being burned and pillaged in the same manner.

Why am I recounting all this? I want to demonstrate that Communism is not a law-abiding political party. It is a lawless fanaticism. We have had a demonstration right here in this hemisphere which shows the type of terrorism and force Communists use to gain political power. What Communists have done in Russia and in European riots and uprisings, they will do again wherever they can, in whatever countries they find sleeping on the job.

America must not be lulled to sleep by the sweet words of misguided idealists, who are being used by revolutionists the world over. There are few real Communists in America. There are not many Americans that desire to join lawless mobs. But Communists will stop at nothing which will cause strife and division among our people. We must know the methods of Communists, for if we do not anticipate the harm that even a few of them can do, we stand to lose what is America.
