



railroad job from which he was to be soon separated because of the itch to caricature, which he could not suppress.

Six months after he was "bumped," in the language of railroad workers, he embarked upon his life work as a newspaper man and artist. He was employed at different times on most of the dailies of Philadelphia Goosby and Mr. Goosby at their and Camden, N. J., making layouts, ranch home. retouching and doing sports cartoons. From this it was but a step to the comic strip field and he has made a name for himself among the younger cartoonists of the country through his portrayal of "Finney of the Force."






