## Cotton Exemption Certificate Pool To Close November 10

A surplus of 3,186,250 pounds of Tax Exemption Certificates coming from six hundred Dickens County Cotton Farms have been placed in the National Surplus Tax Exemption Certificate Pool in Washington. This figure represents an approximation if better than one-half of the amount that we intend to pool in Dickens County.

A tentative date of November 10th has been set for closing the pool. This information should be given wide publicity for the benefit of producers who may have surplus certificates. We urge the Cotton Producers in Dickens County to have their surplus certificates pooled by the 8th of November.

The certificates must be pooled in the County where they are issued. Tennants may pool their landlord's certificates, provided they have their permission. Producers, who haven't harvested all their cotton crop this season, are eligible to pool an estimated surplus, saving enough certificates to take care of the cotton that is to be ginned.

It is necessary that cotton producers holding Interim Tax Exemption Certificates turn them in to this office at the earliest date. Approximately two hundred persons eligible for Tax Exemption Certificates have not called for theirs at this date. It is required that all the Interim Certificates be turned in, and all the Exemption Certificates be called for this week.

Certificates are not negotiable outside the County and State. The only legal sale outside the county is through the National Pool. Certificates may be transferred from person to person within the County, provided the transaction is accorded in this office.

According to an Associated Press Dispatch, Homer Seale, 27, and Ray Reagan, 33, were wounded fatally in a shooting affray a mile south-west of Corsicana, Tuesday, Oct. 23.

Rufus Pevehouse, sheriff, and Jack Floyd, deputy sheriff, investigated circumstances of the killing and expressed the opinion it was a case of murder and suicide. Reagan died in a hospital at Corsicana, Tuesday night.

Both men were shot in the head one time. Seale was reported lying in the automobile when found and Reagan was in a ditch nearby with a .38 calibre pistol clutched in his hand.

Homer Seales and family were former citizens of Spur and operated the filling and tourist camp north of town several months prior to moving to Corsicana.

**CITY ORDINANCE**

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PREVENTION OF FIRES, ESTABLISHING FIRE LIMITS, A STANDARD OF CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIRS AND REMOVAL OF BUILDINGS, PROVIDING FOR PERMITS FOR BUILDINGS AND FEES FOR SAME, WITH RESPECT TO ALL CONSTRUCTION, REMOVAL AND REPAIRS WITHIN THE FIRE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS, AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SPUR, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1: FIRE LIMITS**

That the following described area within the City of Spur, Texas is hereby designated as fire limits.

The East One-half of Block Nos. 5, 12, 28, and 37;

The West One-half of Blocks Nos. 6, 11, 22, 27, and 38;

The North West One-fourth of Block No. 21;

The South West One-fourth of Block No. 28;

Block No. -7 and;

The South East One-fourth of The North-east one-fourth of Block No. 2. All in the original townsite of Spur, Texas.

**SECTION 2: PERMIT REQUIRED**

No wall, structure, building, or part thereof, shall hereafter be built, enlarged or altered, until a plan of the proposed work together with a statement of the material to be used, shall have been submitted to the City Clerk, who shall, in accordance with the provisions herein contained, issue a permit for the proposed construction or alteration. Structures hereafter erected without a permit or not in conformity with this ordinance shall be removed.

No building shall be moved from one location to another within the fire limits until a permit has been obtained therefor. A permit shall be issued only in case the construction is in accordance with this ordinance.

**SECTION 3. INCOMBUSTIBLE CONSTRUCTION REQUIRED WITHIN FIRE LIMITS**

The purpose of this section is to prohibit the erection within the fire limits of wooden, iron-clad, stucco, or veneer type of buildings.

Every building hereafter erected, altered or enlarged within the fire limits shall be enclosed on all sides with walls constructed wholly of stone, well burned brick, or reinforced concrete and shall have the roof, also the roof and sides of all roof structures covered with incombustible material. All cornices shall be of incombustible material.

**SECTION 4: FRAME BUILDINGS**

No structure, whose walls are wholly, or in part, constructed of wood, shall, hereafter, be built or moved into the fire limits as here-in designated, or as they may hereafter be established, except as follows:

A. Temporary one story frame buildings for the use of builders.

B. Small out houses not exceeding One-hundred square feet in area, and eight feet in height, not located within thirty feet of any other building nor within five feet of any lot line.

Any existing frame or iron clad building within the fire limits, which may hereafter be damaged by fire, decay, or otherwise to an amount greater than one-half its present value, exclusive of the foundation, shall not be repaired or rebuilt but shall be removed.

**SECTION 5. GAS CONNECTIONS**

Gas connections to stoves and similar heating devices shall be made of rigid metal pipes. For small portable heating devices, flexible metal or rubber tubing may be used when there is no valve or other shut off on the device.

**SECTION 6: FEES REQUIRED**

Before the erection, construction or alteration, or raising of any building, structure or wall or any part thereof, or any platform, staging or flooring to be used for standing or seating purposes is commenced, the owner or lessee, or agent or either, or the architect or builder thereof shall apply to the City Clerk for a permit to do such work, such application shall be in writing, and shall contain a plan of the proposed work, with a statement of the material to be used with the contract price or estimated cost, and shall be accompanied by a fee of Two & 50/100 (\$2.50) Dollars. The City Clerk shall then, upon approval of the application, issue a permit for such improvements if said application is in accordance with the provisions herein contained.

**SECTION 7: PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS**

Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any part of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction, be fined in any sum not exceeding One-Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

**SECTION 8: CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED**

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.
