J. C. Christopher Dies Suddenly

J. C. Christopher, age 66 years, 8 months and 22 days died suddenly Sunday night about 9:30 o'clock, at his home in the Prairie Chapel community. Death resulting from an ailment of which he had suffered for some time.

Saturday Mr. Christopher was a Spur visitor and while here engaged in conversation with a number of his friends and from all appearance he was in a perfect state of health, but Sunday following the evening meal he complained to his wife and daughter that he had an indigestion or gas condition of the stomach which caused a smothering feeling and a pressure on the heart.

Notwithstanding this ailment he and his wife were planning a trip to Roaring Springs the following day and retired about nine o'clock, still talking of their plans he remarked that if they were going it would be wise to go to sleep, he turned over and as he did so, exclaimed in pain, he then arose and walked into an adjoining room and sat near the fire on a divan.

Mrs. Christopher followed and as she neared where he was sitting he began to fall backwards, she immediately took him in her arms and called to their daughter, Mary, to go for a near by neighbor and before she returned her father had passed away.

J. C. Christopher was born in Alabama, near Athens, March 17th, 1868, he affiliated with the Church of Christ at an early age and lived a very exemplary life.

Two years before Spur was established he with his family moved to Dickens county, living first near Afton until a few years ago he bought a farm near Spur from which place he moved to their present home.

Exemption Certificate Pool Close Dec. 15

Holders of Exemption Certificates will have the opportunity to place their surplus certificates in the Pool. The certificate Pool reopened December 10, and will close Saturday December 15.

It is very necessary that people who are notified to call for their Tax Exemption Certificates, do so at the very earliest date so we can send in our report. All certificates not called for in Dickens County by Saturday, December 22, will be returned to the State Board. Anyone holding Inter Tax Exemption Certificates (Ginning Permit), used or unused, should return them to this office at once, or send in authorized paper saying they were lost, stolen or destroyed, in order that we may cancel the receipt you gave for them.

Friday, December 15, is the National date set for the Bankhead Referendum. All eligible voters should make every effort possible to vote. Only one vote is permitted from each cotton producer, and that in the county and state issuing his certificates. Ballot boxes have been provided in the local communities throughout the county.—Wm. W. 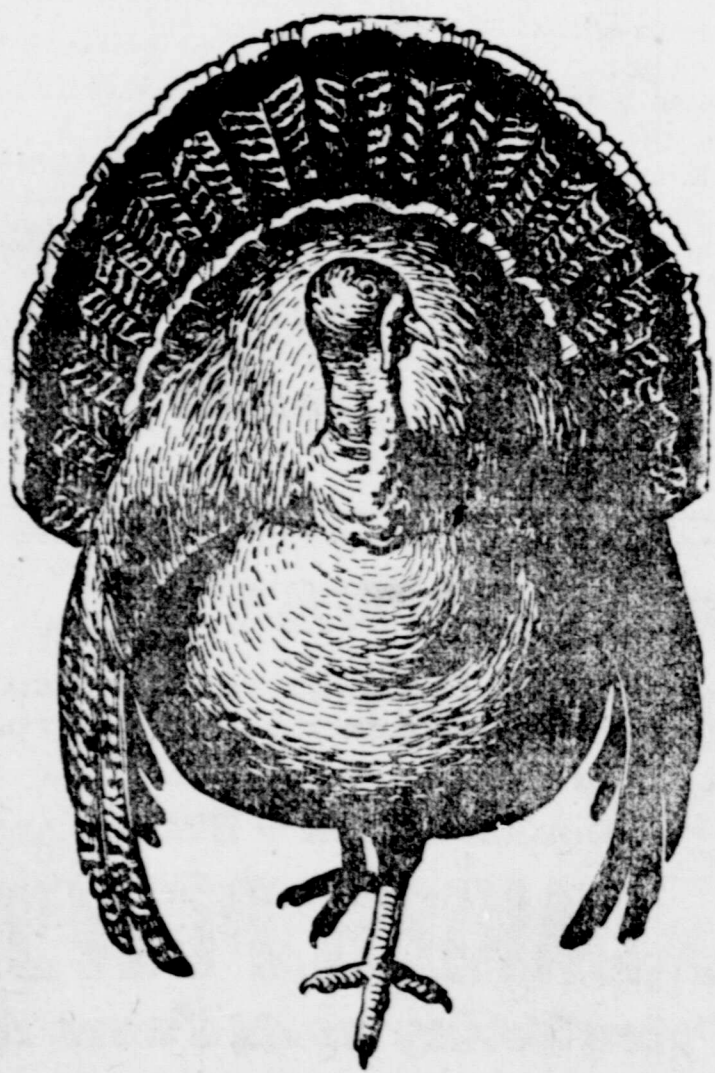

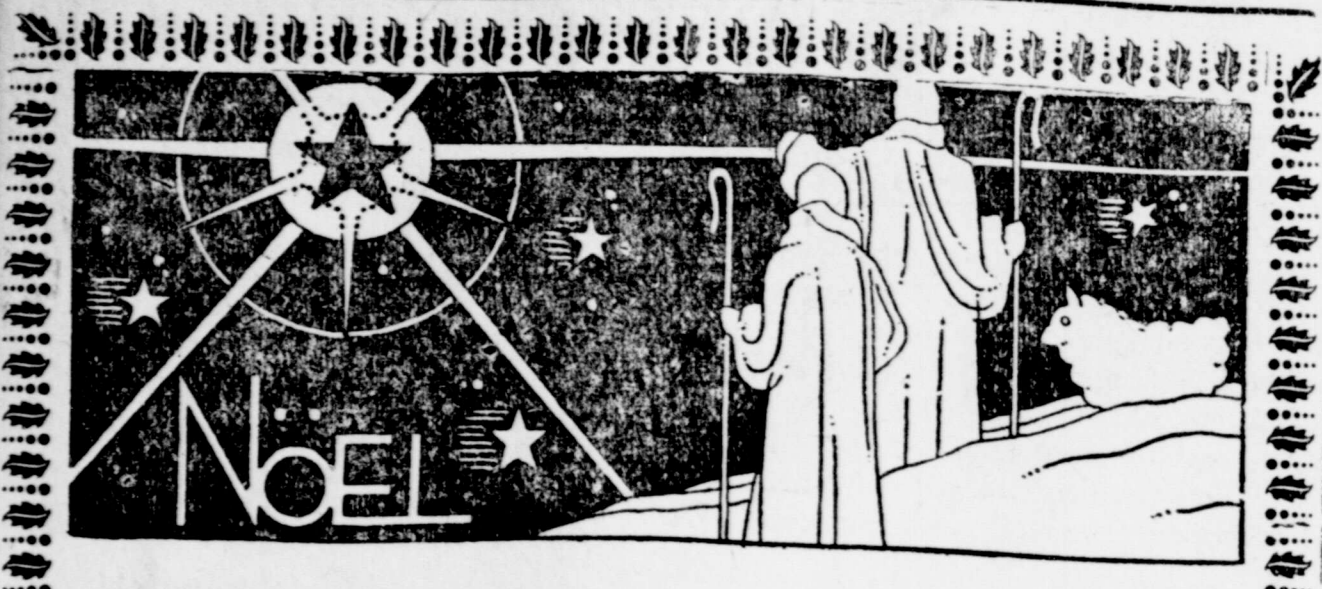

Resident Endorses Xmas Seal Campaign

President Roosevelt, in a letter written at Washington November 27, endorses the nation-wide Christmas Seal Campaign that is conducted from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas by the 2,000 affiliated tuberculosis associations of the U. S. The letter addressed to Dr. Kenyon Dunham, President of the National Tuberculosis Association, is as follows:

"The approach of the holiday season brings again to our thoughts the annual sale of Christmas Seals to aid the nationwide fight against tuberculosis for another year. Although in recent years the death rate from tuberculosis has been halved, this disease still ranks first as a cause of death between the ages of 18 and 40, and it still causes nearly 75,000 deaths in the United States annually.

Not by one thing alone, but by many means attack, both direct and indirect, tuberculosis must be fought. Fifty years ago Doctor Trudeau pointed the way to successful treatment. Sanatorium care is still indispensable. Hence, we need commendous special and general hospitals for tuberculosis patients.

For those with early disease, I believe the sanatorium is best for cure; and patients with advanced disease also need a resourceful hospital. More beds are needed, especially for tuberculosis children. But prevention is even more important. To protect infants and young children and to avoid the infection of adolescents and adults, the resources of every community are taxed.

The task before us is more than a medical problem. Physicians, nurses, and hospitals are only a part of the great defensive force, which must include the heads of all families, governors and mayors, educators, social workers, scout masters, volunteer workers, charity organizations, pure food experts and the forces of the United States Government. The National Tuberculosis Association and its local branches give competent leadership.

By wise arrangement, the responsibility for the sale of Christmas Seals is a local one. The money is spent locally by and for the residents of each city, town, or county. It is part of wisdom for each locality to assume its due share of relief and responsibility.

The need is urgent; the cause most worthy."

The Seal this year commemorates the fiftieth anniversary of the beginning of the sanatorium movement in this country. The one room cottage it depicts was the first American sanatorium for the modern treatment of tuberculosis. It was constructed in 1884 by the late Dr. Edward Livingston Trudeau, "father of the sanatorium movement," and was the forerunner of the 600 institutions in the United States today.

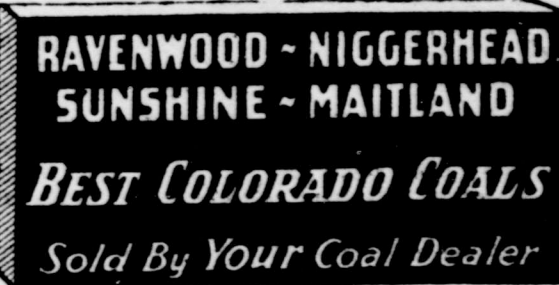
CLUB COOK BOOKS READY FOR SALE
