Taken from the files of The Texas Spur, published 23 years ago this week. Oran McClure, editor and publisher.

At the beginning of the New Year Spur's cotton receipts show that four thousand bales of cotton have been weighed at the two yards and that three thousand bales have been ginned at the two gins in Spur during the season, up to date. The ginning season is not over for there are a number of bales of cotton yet in the fields of the surrounding country and hundreds of bales which will never be picked out.

We are beginning the new Year with the best crop prospects of many years. During the past month we have had several inches of rain fall and the ground has been frozen almost continuously, which insures not only a bottom season but the killing of many insects which deter crop production.

J. T. Seale Is Appointed As Spur Deputy

HUB SWAN IS HEAD OF TAX ASSESSORS DEPARTMENT

With the appointment of new officials here following the installation of Johnnie Koonsman as Sheriff of Dickens county, J. T. Seale, well known citizen and for many years a building contractor in the city, has been appointed to the deputyship of Spur. Sheriff Koonsman won the office in the general election with more than a two to one majority over his nearest opponent, and states that he has not been able until this week to make announcement of the personnel of his force.

Herbert Swan, who has been engaged in office and clerical duties with the Swenson office here for the past few years was placed at the head of the Tax Assessors office and will be at the service of Dickens County citizens in this capacity in the future.

Mr. Koonsman stated that he had no definite policies to announce upon his installation in office except that he would carry out the oath of his office and would give his best efforts in making the county a good sheriff and peace officer.

Theatre Operating Policy To Change

The Importance Of The Farm Census For '35

(From County Agent's Viewpoint)

The forthcoming farm census should be of unusual importance which will be taken beginning Jan. 2, 1935. Reports will be for the calendar year 1934. Everyone should be impressed with the importance of an accurate farm census during this time of adjustment programs. These reports will be used as a basis for allotments on farm crops and livestock in the county.

Director Wm. L. Austin of the Census Bureau wishes to emphasize the fact that every supervisor and enumerator, as well as all census employees are sworn to secrecy regarding these reports. The Director desires particularly to impress every farmer with the fact that these reports will not be used as a basis for tabulation, nor communicated to any tax official. The schedule has been designed to provide for the gathering of the greatest amount of basic information that can be assembled rapidly and tabulated in a minimum amount of time.

It is important that every farm report contain full and accurate figures, and it should be the duty of every citizen to aid in the collection of the Agricultural facts in the county.

Many agencies will be benefited from new farm statistics gathered in this census report. Among them are those which have to do with acreage adjustments, subsistence homesteads, marginal lands, land utilization, soil erosion, farm credit, farm housing and labor, and unemployment.

Not only will various interests be served in an accurate census, but the farmer himself—in that an accurate basis for comparison of his production with that of his neighbor will be established.

A former President of the United States has this to say about the importance of a farm census: "The chief instrument of American statistics is the census, which should accomplish a twofold object. It should serve the country, by making full and accurate exhibit of the elements of national life and strength; and it should serve the science of statistics by so exhibiting general results that they may be compared with similar data obtained by other nations. The census is indispensable to modern statesmanship."

It behooves each and everyone to give their who'se-hearted support especially the farmers, to the end that we may have a complete and accurate census of Dickens County.

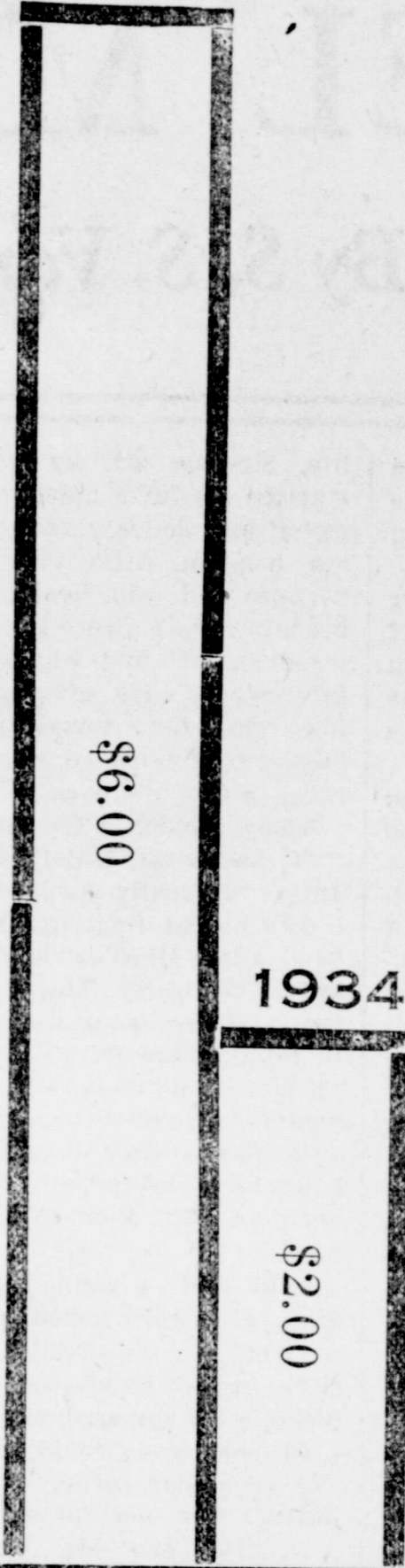

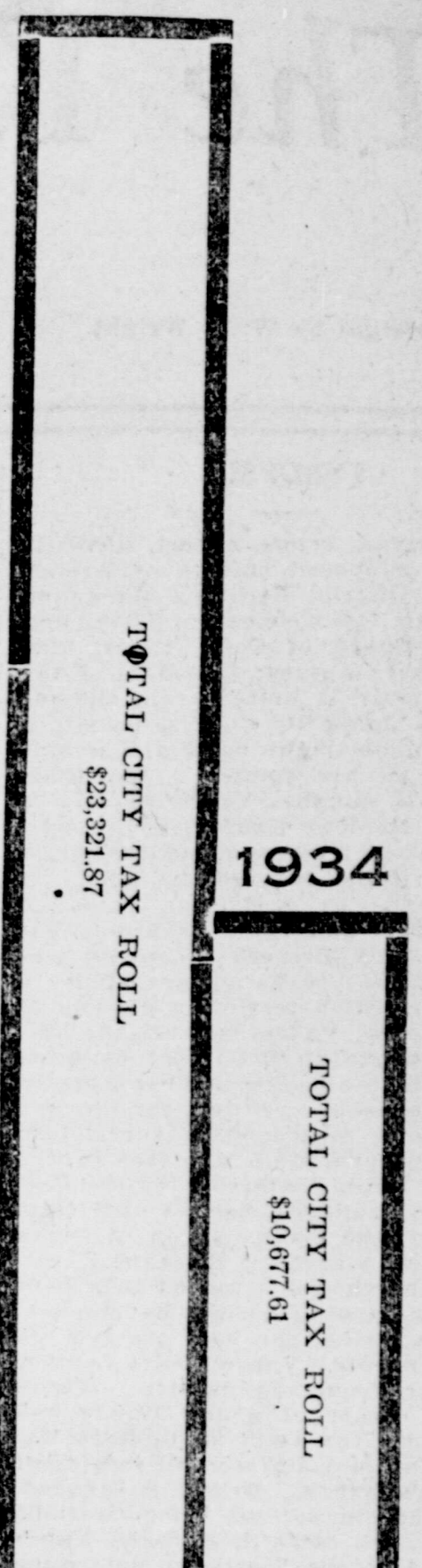

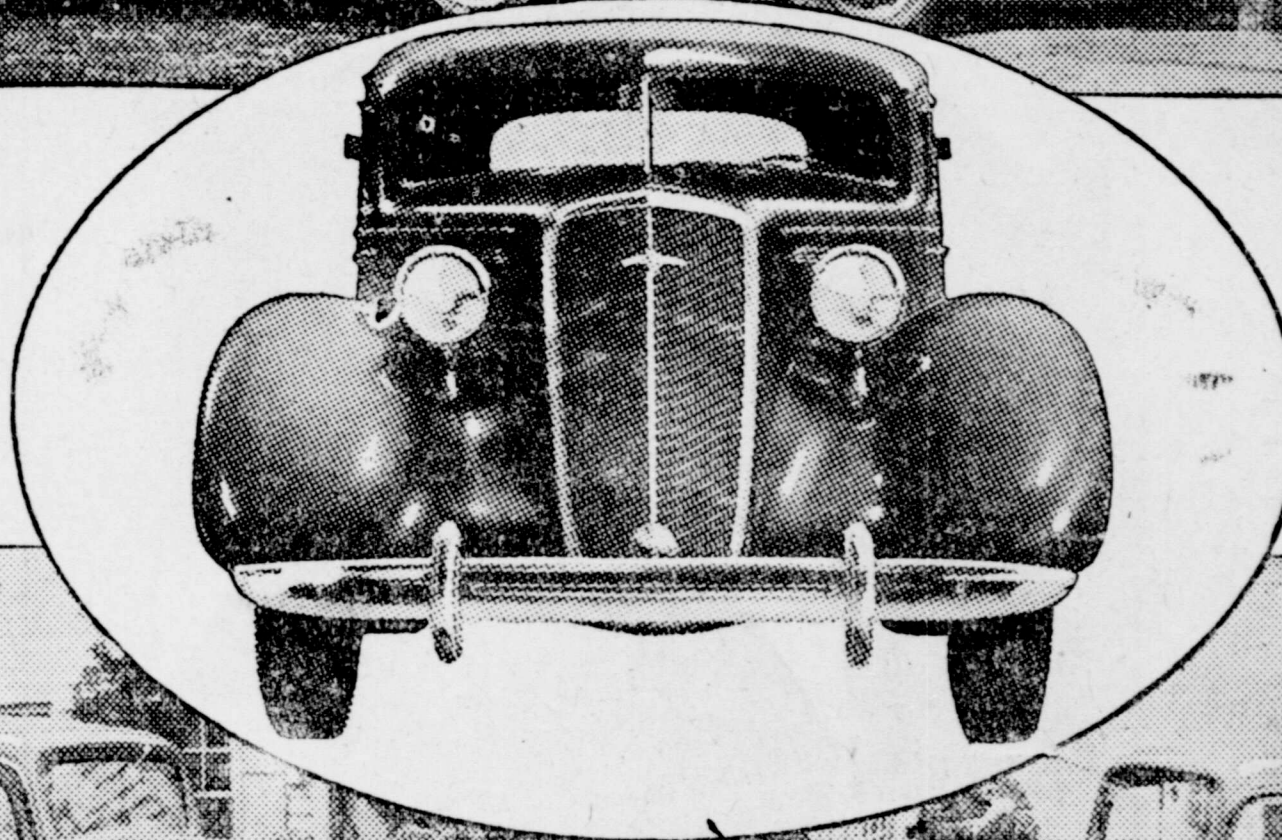

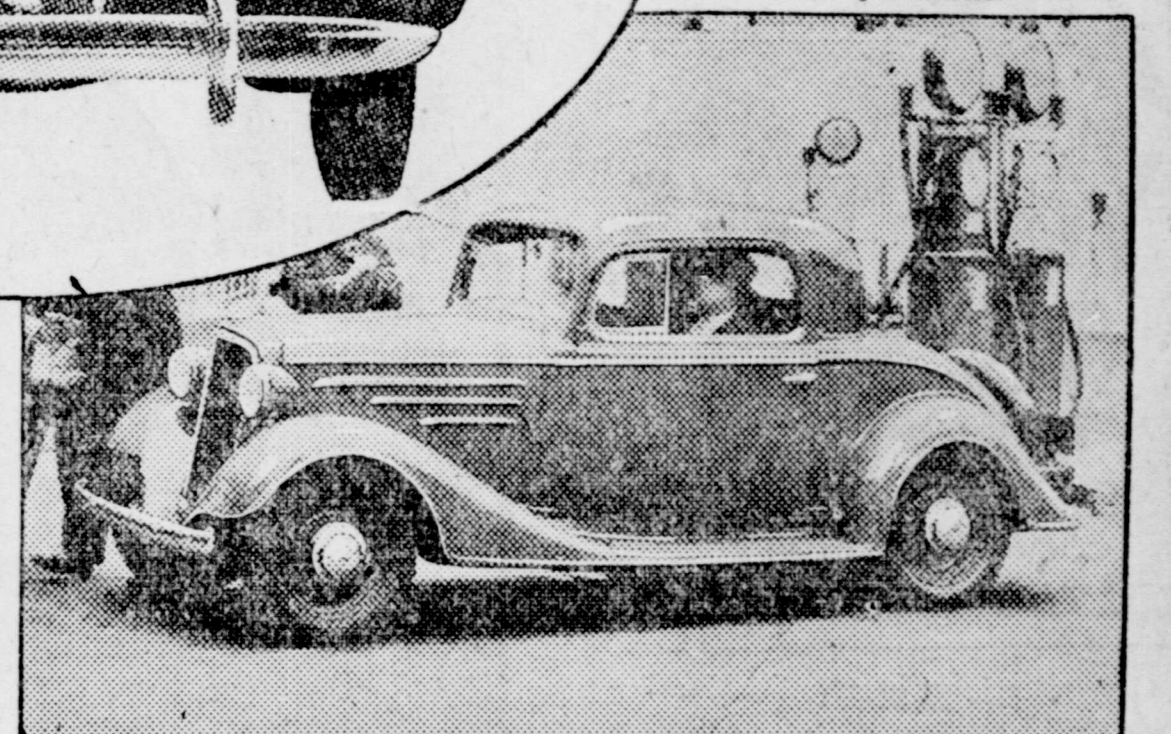
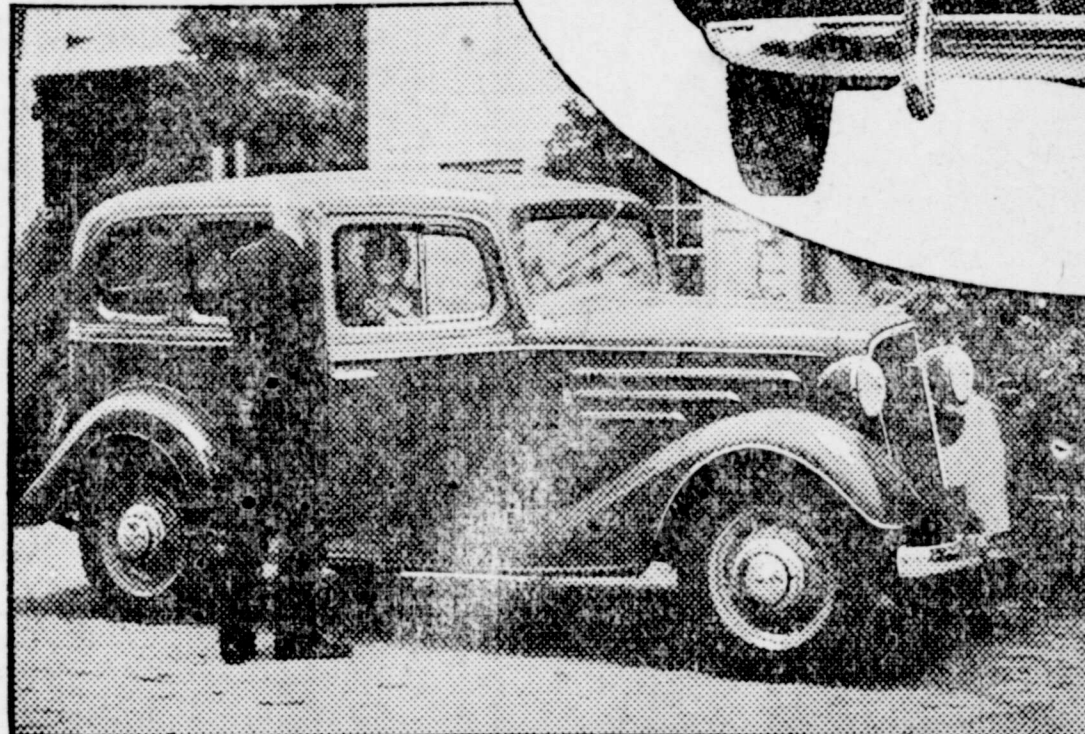
