The building erected by the class is southeast of the church building and is constructed out of natural stone, moss covered, set in concrete. The fixtures are rough and beautiful with a wagon wheel chandelier, old fashioned lamps on each side of the fire place. Rev. Yeats has done most of the work of the building, devoting a lot of time to carrying out the plans of the class. Dr. Clark was pastor at Dickens for several years beginning in 1905 and erected the first Methodist Church in Dickens County while he was pastor there. Many old timers will recall him and be glad to hear him preach again. The churches that he pastored, and this was the beginning of this minisry, were Dickens, Duck Creek, Croton and Northeast Corner (now Dumont). Since that time Dr. Clark has been pastor of several of the larger churches in West Texas, being one of the leaders in the Northwest Texas Conference today.

Dr. Clark preached his first sermon on the Dickens charge at the home of Uncle Jonas Carlisle at Duck Creek. The church erected under his ministry was contracted by a brother to Chas. 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# Historical Letters From S. F. Austin

SERIES II, No. 4

Another letter written two years later, to his brother-in-law, James F. Perry, also refers to the perplexities and difficulties confronting the empressario:

"San Felipe de Austin 14 Oct. 1830

"Dr Brother, "I have the satisfaction of acknowledging the receipt of yours of 2nd October from New York, and of informing you of the safe arrival of the Nelson. I rec. a letter yesterday from John Austin stating that the Nelson was at Brazoria and he was then unloading your goods-She lost her false keel coming over the bar and thump ed severely—the bar is much worse than when you came over-Henry Austin came near losing his steam boat going out, he put to sea very much damaged and I have not

heard of him since.

"I wrote to John to follow your instructions strickly as to the goods and not open them until Mr. Hunter arrives. I have not yet finished the store house, it is raised, the shingles are hawled, the plank is all sawed and wagons have gone after it. So that I hope it will be ready by the time Hunter arrives. I have no house under way for the family-you will get out in the spring and the weather will be pleasant, and you can get along very well until some buildings are put up. Emily has seen a new country in times long past and can manage very well for a month or two. The fact is I have no one to attend to business and if I undertake to build while I am absent it will cost ten prices. My advice is that you build on the out lots above Williams; in this place on the creek -I think the situation a healthy







or nuts or dried peas and beans. Grains: At least one serving of whole grain.

Fats, sweets and other grain in
