Keith Murphy, 7-year-old son o Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Murphy, o Prairie Chapel, died at a Lubbock hospital Tuesday morning, February 26, at 3:00 A. M. He became ill the Saturday preceding, suffering he was rushed to the hospital

March 1, 1936. This represents an actual reduction of 18% over the insurance costs of 1934, inasmuch as a 3% penalty was applied for that year.

With the 4 cent key rate reduction effective last February 1st, this really makes the fire insurance costs in the city limits of Spur considerably lower than they have ever been. The present key rate is 48c, whereas only a few years back it was 56 cents.
