### John Vann Died Here Saturday Afternoon

John Vann, 48, World War veteran and for many years a citizen of Spur, died at his home here Saturday afternoon. His death is attributed to the fact that he was gassed during the war and from which he never fully recovered. A complication of diseased lungs and kidneys forced him to retire some years ago from active life and for several days preceding death he was in acute pain being neither able to lie down nor lean back in his chair.

Mr. Vann was born October 2, 1887, at Hillsboro, Texas. He returned to Spur following the war and resumed his occupation here in the restaurant and hotel business but failing health subsequently forced him to retire. He made his home for a time at Crosbyton and at Clovis, N. M. where he was married in 1931 to Miss Josie Roberts.

Funeral services were conducted by G. Earl Woods, Minister of the Church of Christ, at the home Sunday afternoon at 2:15. Following the rites members of the local American Legion took charge of the body and interment was made with military honors.

Mrs. Fannie Sullivan who now lives at Hobbs, N. M. is an aunt of the deceased. He is survived also by a brother, Baxter Vann of the U. S. Marines; and a half sister who lives at Stanton, Texas.

John Vann was an unimposing Christian gentleman, generous and congenial to his associates, and has many friends here who are saddened by his long suffering and untimely death.

### Farms in Co. Show Decrease Since 1930

According to a preliminary announcement from the Supervisor of Census the number of farms in Dickens County as of January 1, 1935, is 1062, as compared with 1228 on April 1, 1930. (The 1935 figure is subject to correction).

The report shows a decrease in the number of farms since 1930 and this is attributed to a decided trend toward owner operation of farms and a larger acreage farmed by one operator.

### Swimming Pool For Spur Assured

To Be Built By City And Located Over Spur Hill Just East Of The New Stadium

At a meeting of the city commission here Tuesday night it was definitely decided that a swimming pool would be built by the city. Construction work to begin just as soon as plans can be worked out and arrangements made.

The pool will be located just over the Spur Hill approximately 300 yards east of the big new stadium.

The project will be conducted in the same manner of the Fire Line project underway at the present time—all material being furnished by the city and labor to be paid out of relief funds.

Spur has long been in need of such a place of recreation and the project at this time will not only fill that need but furnish employment at a time when it is most helpful. It is indeed fortunate that Spur has substantial cash surplus to finance its part of the national recovery program, and the city officials are to be commended upon their management of the city's business the last six years.

### Local Administrator Arthur Makes Report

Following is a brief report of business conducted and disbursements made by the local relief office taken from the report of Administrator O. C. Arthur.

Disbursements from the office during February:

Work relief \$9,502.50; Direct relief \$1,263.40; Office expense (including salary, postage, etc.) \$416.00. Total \$9,591.40. Dispersed out of warehouse: \$740 No. 2 cans beef.

784 families are represented and were benefitted by the above expenditures.

Jobs represented by work programs include the Water System and Stadium in Spur; School Building and Grounds improvement at Afton and McAdoo; Highway 18 from Dickens south; Highway 24 from Dickens west; and Lateral road work at Prairie Chapel, Duncan Flat, Croton, Wichita, Espuela, Dry Lake, and Red Hill.

Hall, superintendent of schools at Spur, will speak before the practical arts division of the fifth annual teacher training conference to be held at his Alma Mater, the North Texas State Teachers College, March 15 and 16, according to a statement recently made by Dr. L. A. Sharp, conference chairman.

Only ex-students who are outstanding in their respective fields are invited to address the conference, it was stated. Hall is one of eighteen graduates of the college who will appear on the two-day program. In addition to these, 14 students of the college will speak. Dr. Hollis L. Caswell of George Peabody College for Teachers, an expert in curriculum revision; Dr. Carleton Wolsey Washburne of Winnetka, Illinois; and Dr. Edwin Mims of Vanderbilt University are the principal lecturers.

### Patton Springs School Granted Full Affiliation

New \$50,000 Modern Building To Be Ready for Occupancy In Next Few Days

The patrons, pupils and faculty of the Patton Springs Consolidated School are rejoicing over the fact that the school was recently granted 16 units of affiliation by the Deputy State Superintendent, Miss Sue B. Mann. While in the school last week, Miss Mann commended very highly the type of work being done.

It is thought that seldom, if ever before, has any school in the State been granted full affiliation the first year it functioned. Usually three or four years are required to accomplish what the Patton Springs school has achieved in one.

This school district, comprising 180 square miles of fertile farming country in the northern part of Dickens county, was organized last year, and the school is operating its first year, 1934-35. There are 461 pupils and 15 teachers in the system. The high school enrollment is 106.

Credits granted the school are: English 3 units, history 3 units, mathematics 3 units, Spanish 3 units, general science, bookkeeping, typing, civics, economic, commercial arithmetic, commercial geography, and commercial law; the total of 16 units. In addition 1½ units in vocational agriculture will be sought at the close of the current term. Affiliation in agricultural work was not requested at this time, since the Agricultural Supervisor has not yet visited the school to pass on the work. Next year home economics will be taught in the school, and also two years of vocational agriculture.

This week the school board expects to receive a new \$50,000 school building from the contractor C. S. Oates & Son, Abilene. The architect, S. B. Haynes, Lubbock, states that the building will be modern in every respect, and will rank with the best in West Texas.

Authorities of the district plan appropriate dedication exercises in the new building April 12. It is expected that many of the leading citizens and educators of West Texas will attend. A basket dinner will be served on the school grounds; it is expected to begin the program at 10 A. M. and to conclude about 4 P. M., with suitable intermission for the lunch.

### Keith Murphy Died At Lubbock Tuesday

Keith Murphy, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Murphy, of Prairie Chapel, died at a Lubbock hospital Tuesday morning, February 26, at 3:00 A. M. He became ill the Saturday preceding, suffering from ear ache and cold and his condition became so critical that he was rushed to the hospital for treatment. Dr. Hughes diagnosed the case as a form of meningitis.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. A. P. Stokes at 3:30 Tuesday afternoon and interment was made in Dickens cemetery. W. A. Campbell, of Roaring Springs, directed the funeral.

### BROTHER OF LONNIE LEWIS DIED IN MONTANA, FEB. 25

### Spur Gets Good Fire Credit For 35

15% Credit Allowed on Premiums After March 1st.

According to Clemmons Insurance agency a further insurance reduction comes to Spur, the one representing the largest saving thus far, in the way of a 15% Good Fire Credit to apply to all fire insurance premiums from March 1, 1935 to March 1, 1936. This represents an actual reduction of 18% over the insurance costs of 1934, inasmuch as a 3% penalty was applied for that year.

With the 4 cent key rate reduction effective last February 1st, this really makes the fire insurance costs in the city limits of Spur considerably lower than they have ever been. The present key rate is 48c, whereas only a few years back it was 56 cents.

### Mrs. C. A. Love Died At Home in Okla.

Mrs. Bessie Love, 64, wife of Charles A. Love, died late Saturday evening March 2 at her home in Dover, Oklahoma. Death followed an illness of several months duration.

Mr. and Mrs. Love are well-known here having been residents of this city some sixteen years previous to their removal to Oklahoma in 1929. Mr. Love was for a time associated with his brother, C. L. Love in the Love Dry Goods Company and later establishing a grocery business which he conducted for a number of years.



## A CONSTRUCTIVE TRAFFIC PROGRAM FOR STATES

Motor accidents last year struck deeper at the heart of the American home than ever before. Conditions have now become so critical that one child in three needlessly faces the probability of death or injury in an automobile accident before he completes his normal life span, according to the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters, which has analysed the street and highway fatalities and injuries for 1934.

To the typical American family of father, mother and three children this statement should have great significance. And to national, state and municipal authorities who are responsible for the safety of all citizens, it is a challenge to drastic action.

Last year, 36,000 persons were killed and more than a million injured in traffic accidents. While traffic itself was slightly heavier, as shown by registrations and increased gasoline consumption, speed and criminally reckless driving, as well as the apparent indifference of the public must bear a lion's share of the blame.

A constructive program for the states must include:

1. Uniform traffic laws such as driver's license laws, financially responsibility statutes and other uniform traffic rules and regulations as recommended by such representative bodies as the National Conference on Street and Highway Safety, the United States Bureau of Public Roads, the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators, the National Safety Council, and others.

2. Modern enforcement procedures such as those advanced by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and others.

3. Good driving instruction for upper class high school students.

4. Adult education. Certainly, enough effective material has been developed by competent observers during our many years' experience with the traffic problem. Much of it is waiting only for an aroused public sentiment to compel its use.

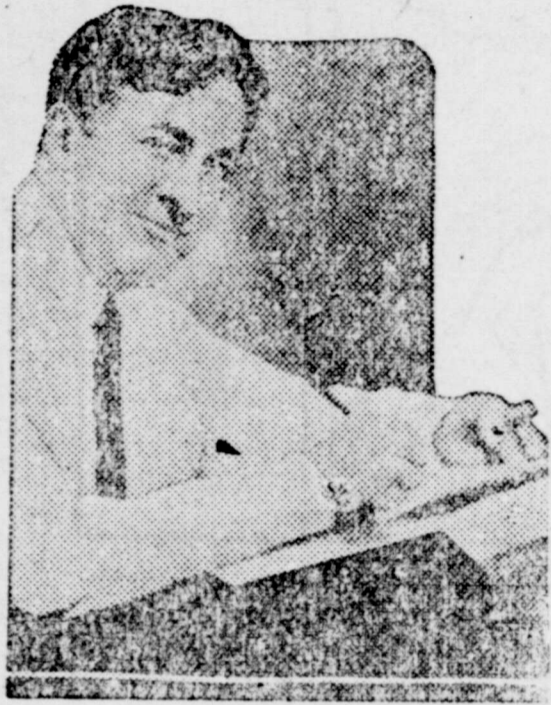

**ORDINANCE**

An Ordinance Entitled an ACT prohibiting the keeping of hogs within the corporate limits of the City of Spur, Texas, fixing penalties for the violation thereof: etc.

SECTION 1—That the keeping of pens or enclosures, wherein hogs are kept or maintained within the area of the City of Spur, be and the same is hereby declared a nuisance.

SECTION 2—That it shall hereafter be unlawful to keep hogs in any manner described in Section 1, within the Corporate Limits of the City of Spur, as they now exist.

SECTION 3—Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating any section or provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction in the Corporate Court of the City of Spur shall be fined not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for each offense, and each and every day of such violation shall be deemed a separate offense.

Passed by the unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners in regular session this the 8th day of January 1935.

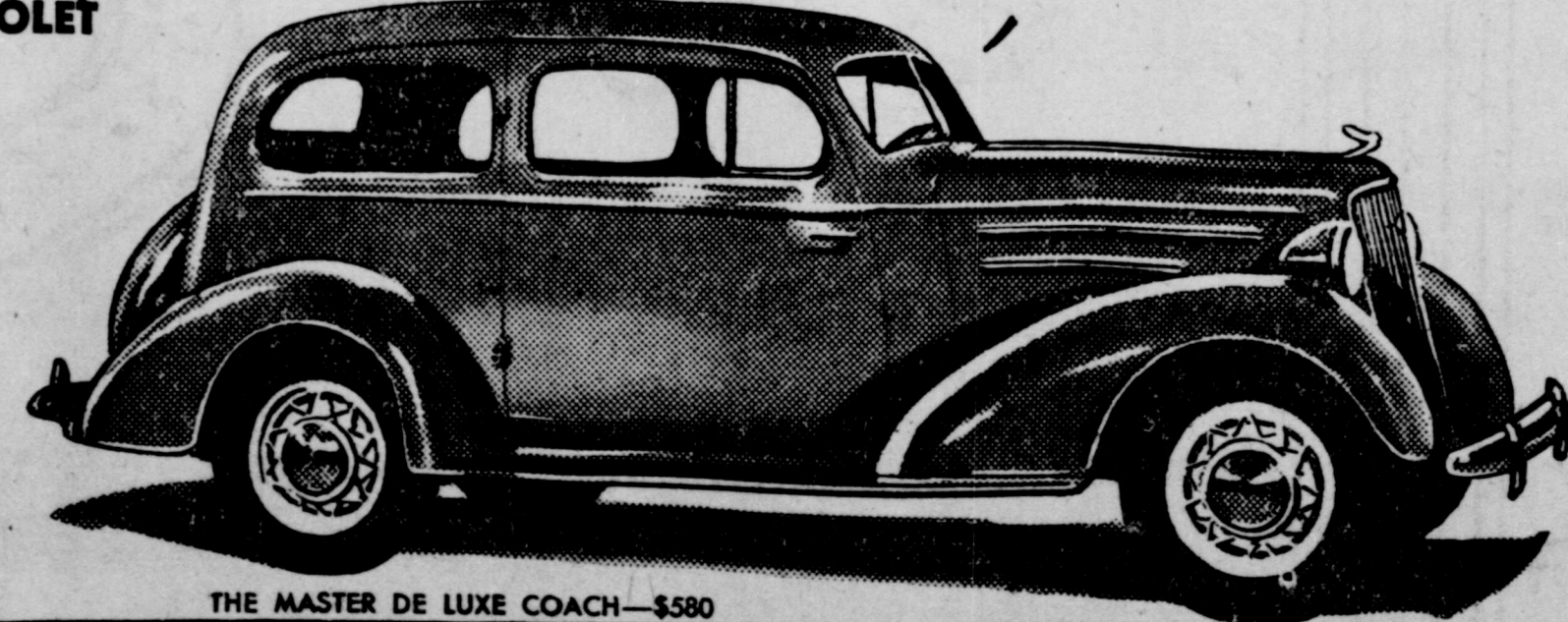
