#### ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

##### SECTION I.

That it shall be unlawful to park any motor truck more than seven feet in length on Burlington Avenue, (Main Street) between Third and Sixth Street, being that portion of Burlington Avenue paved with concrete.

##### SECTION II.

That it shall be unlawful to park any motor vehicle with trailer attached within the area described in the above Section I.

##### SECTION III.

Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

Passed this the 11th day of May 1935, by the unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur.

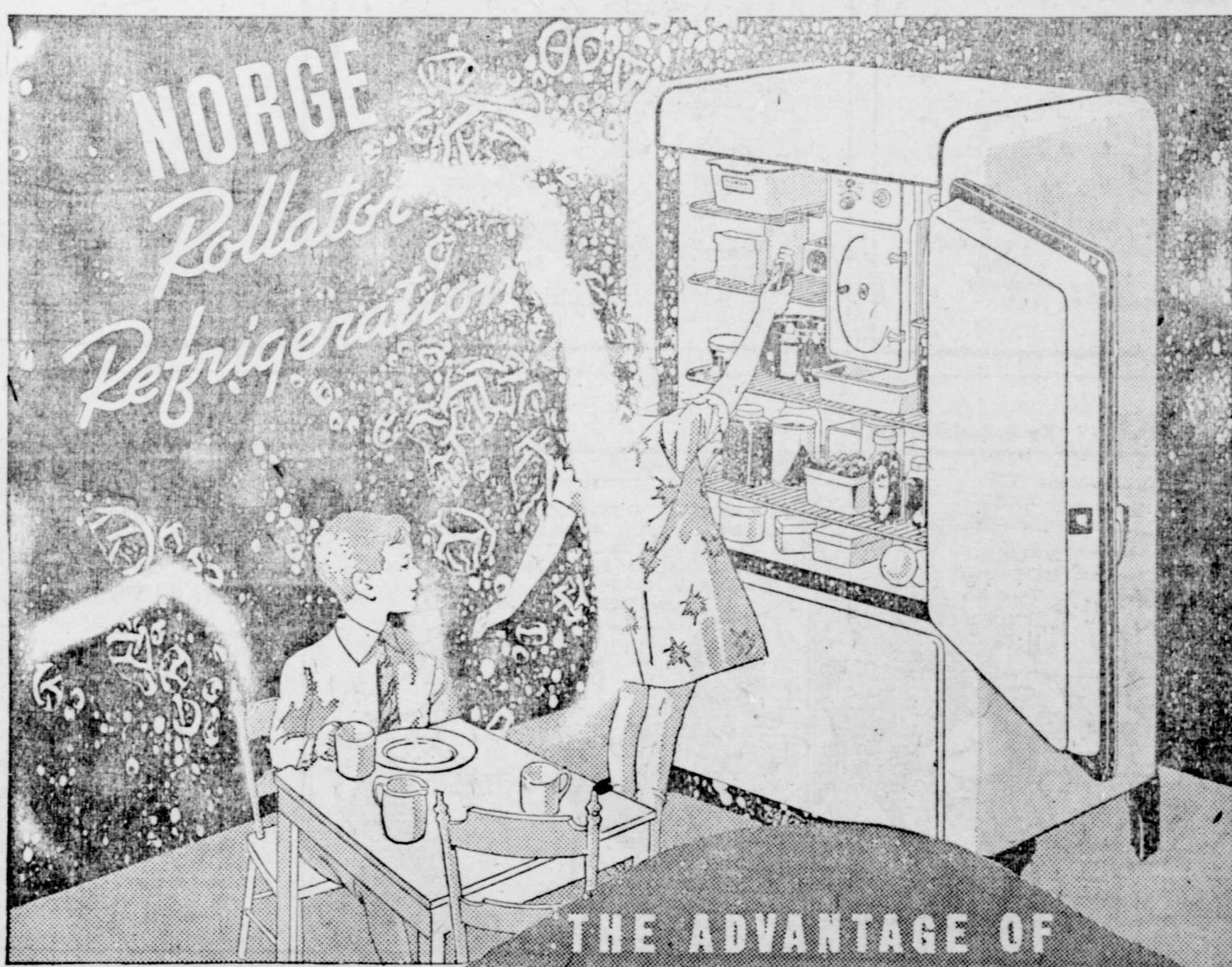

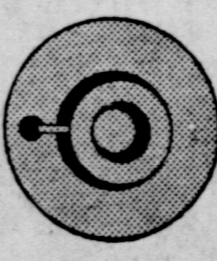

Friday evening, a play entitled "A Daughter of the Desert" will be presented.


These programs will be staged in open air an improvised stage and seats having been provided for all


