Palace Theatre To Bill Bingham, 22,

H. O. Everts, manager of the Palace Theatre, states that patrons of the theatre will have the comfort of the latest and most highly improved air conditioning equipment this summer that money can buy. Sometime before the first of June the air conditioning machine, now being built by the Buffalo Engineering company of Buffalo, N Y., will be installed. The system will be 12 feet square and the air will pass through five feet of con. ditioning space before being pulled into the theatre. 280 spraying nozzles will send a fine mist into the cooling system, capable of handling 200 gallons of water per minute which will be pulled into the theatre by a fan capable of handling 40,000 cubic feet of air per min-
