## Cowboy Reunion at Stamford, July 2-4

Spur has been invited to send a sponsor to the Sixth Annual Texas Cowboy Reunion to be held in Stamford, July 2, 3 and 4. One hundred towns and cities of West Texas are expected to send girl riders to represent them at the Reunion this year according to a letter received here from H. G. Andrews, chairman of the committee in charge of that feature of the reunion.

Miss Zell Ellis represented this city at the reunion last year. A handsome, special made saddle will be awarded for first prize.

Prizes totaling \$2,500 will be awarded in the rodeo events and various other contests to be held in connection with the gathering of cowboys.

Besides the \$1,600 in cash, the prize list includes six handsome hand-made saddles and various other trappings, such as bits, spurs, boots and hats coveted by cowboys and cowgirls.

Two saddles will be awarded as grand prizes. One will go to the champion calf-roper, one to the champion wild-cow milker, another to the champion bronc-rider and a fourth to the winner of the cutting-horse contest, a unique feature of the Stamford rodeo.

The winner in the old-time calf-ropers' contest, open only to cowboys over 55 years of age, will also receive a saddle. Prettiest of all is the saddle to be awarded to the winner of the cowgirl sponsors' contest. A pair of shop made boots are being offered to the champion roper in the rodeo.

The cash prizes will be awarded as day money in the various rodeo events. Old fiddlers also will come in for a share of the cash prizes in their contest, totaling \$32.50. Another \$25 will be given for the best entries in the grand parade on July 3.

Prizes will also be given the most typical cowboys attending the Reunion, one for a cowboy over 55 years of age and one under 55. The younger cowboy will receive a gold watch and the older cowboy a Stetson hat. The most typical junior cowboy will be given a cowboy suit.

Besides the prize saddle in the sponsors' contest, a pair of riding boots will be awarded as second prize; spurs as third prize; and bits as fourth prize.

Cash prizes amounting \$25 will be awarded in the junior steer-riding contest.

## Securities Defined Under State Law

Under the new Texas law regulating the sale of securities, the term includes any form of stocks, bonds, mortgage certificates, any form of commercial paper, any certificate in or under a profit sharing or participation agreement, lease or royalty interest in an oil, gas or mining property. In addition there are many lesser known forms of securities.

The Texas Security law which replaced the old Blue Sky Law, on May 23, 1935, is broad in its definitions of what constitutes a security, according to Secretary of State Gerald C. Mann.

Before purchasing any form of security, such as those named above, the buyer should determine if the person doing the selling has registered with the Secretary of State. Emphasis is placed on the fact that in no case does the State guarantee or endorse any security.

But registration is not the extent of responsibility on the part of the seller. Under the law he may be held accountable for representations as to fact made in the sale of a security.

## Taxpayers Can Save 9 Per Cent By Paying Taxes During June

June is the time for tax payers to pay the last one-half of 1934 taxes without penalty or interest. If taxes are delinquent a saving of 9% can be made by paying these by June 30, 1935 as a total of 14% penalty and interest will have to be collected on or after July 1, 1935 whereas they can be paid during this month with a 5% penalty. THE signing of the Deficiency Bill, making the \$60,000,000 for Crop and Seed Production Loans available, was good news for farmers who are now buying seed, fertilizers, and other supplies. The bill will be a boost for American industry, since the Farm Credit Administration suggests that borrowers buy American-made supplies. Agricultural leaders have long felt that farmers should support American industry by using fertilizers made in the United States, such as American nitrate of soda, sulphate of ammonia and potash.

"I became a clothing demonstrator for several reasons: first I wanted to learn how to improve my clothes and also learn how to make new clothes, second I wanted a clothes closet and felt that being a demonstrator I would get one; third, I wanted to keep a record of the clothes I made and bought including the price, wearing life, and self-satisfaction while wearing them. In this way I may see whether it is cheaper to make or buy clothes ready made," says Juanita Rose, clothing demonstrator for the McAdoo 4-H club and winner of first place in the county in the demonstrators' contest Saturday.

Since I have been demonstrator I have made a collar and cuff set, a slip, a smock, and four dresses. I have learned quite a bit about sewing. Daddy helped me build a big new clothes closet of which I am very proud, for I have wanted one so long. I have enjoyed keeping a record of my clothing and do not mean to stop keeping the record but shall continue it for I find it helps me in the selection of my clothes."

#### DUMONT CLUB 100% ON GOALS REACHED

The 12 members of the Dumont high school girls' home demonstration club are 100% in reaching the three goals in clothing work for the year. They are to make a collar, a slip and a school dress. Ten of the girls exhibited their dresses in the county clothing contest Saturday. Each member has turned in a history of her community or county; that is another goal in this year's work.

The first and fourth places in the cooperators' contest Saturday went to members of this club, Lillian Pense, and Dorothy Scott. Alma Schooler, clothing demonstrator placed third in that division of the county contest.

Much credit for the good standing of this club goes to their sponsor, Mrs. Chan Smith. This is the first club in the county to reach all the goals in any one demonstration 100%.

#### DEMONSTRATOR APPRECIATES HER WORK

"When I was asked to be wardrobe demonstrator class I for our club I hesitated because I did not think I would be financially able to

carry on the work but after learning more about the work I decided that was the real reason I should be a demonstrator," Mrs. Don Meriman told the Twin Wells home demonstration club members in their achievement program Friday. "I have learned how to buy my clothes so each article will harmonize with the others thereby making my clothes more attractive and making my wardrobe money go farther."

"Since I did not have a clothes closet I had to build one. We had enough scrap lumber to make a frame and covered this with cardboard boxes then papered it to match the room. I put only one shelf in the closet for hats for the remainder of the space was needed for hanging garments. I put a rod under the hat shelf for the children's clothes; it is low enough for them to use it nicely. We have a shoe rack the entire length of the closet and a rod on the door for ties and belts. For hat racks I covered cereal boxes with the ceiling paper and they make good hat racks. We now have a place for our clothes and can keep them with much less care."

#### CLUB HOLDS ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

"I've learned to cut sleeves that fit," said Miss Lona May Barrington; "I've learned to make Bound Button holes and how to sew on buttons," said Mrs. Vaughn White club members of the Prairie Chapel Home demonstration club in answering the roll call with something learned in wardrobe work this year in the way of sewing in the achievement program Wednesday afternoon.

The Wardrobe demonstrator give the report of her work. The Cooperators made reports which were compiled in a club report. "I have cut and fitted 27 foundation patterns," said Mrs. C. W. Vancleeve in giving her wardrobe report.

There were 8 Contest dresses and slips modeled. Some were sport suits some plain street dresses and there was one party dress.

Five sleeve ironing boards were exhibited. Others have made boards but didn't bring them.

The club is planning to be 100% in exhibiting dresses and slips in the County Contest.

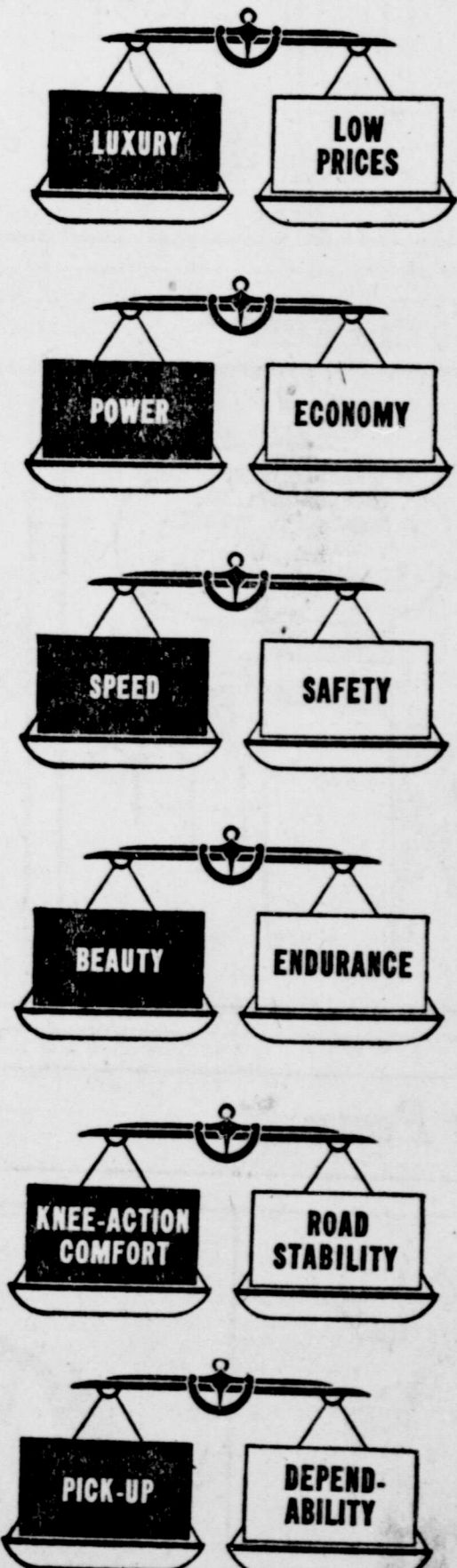

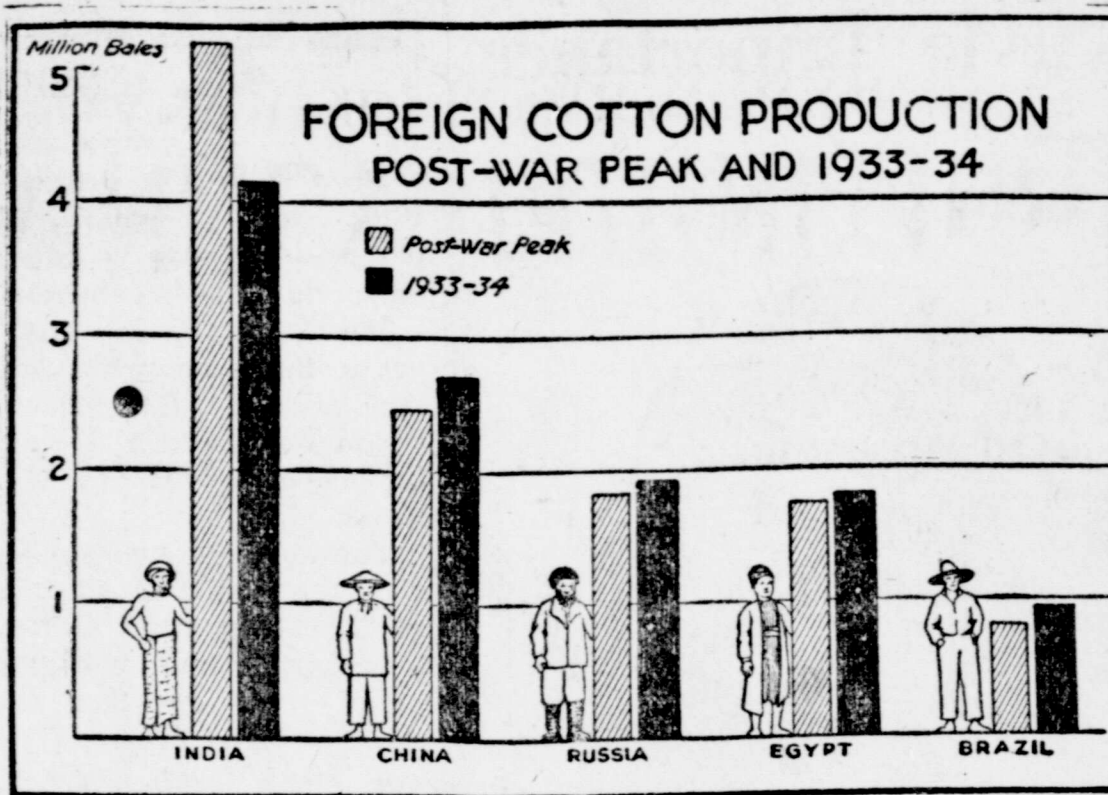

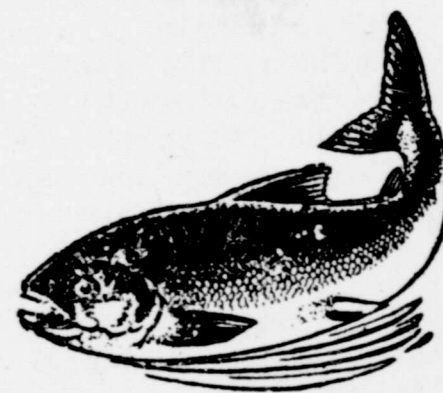
