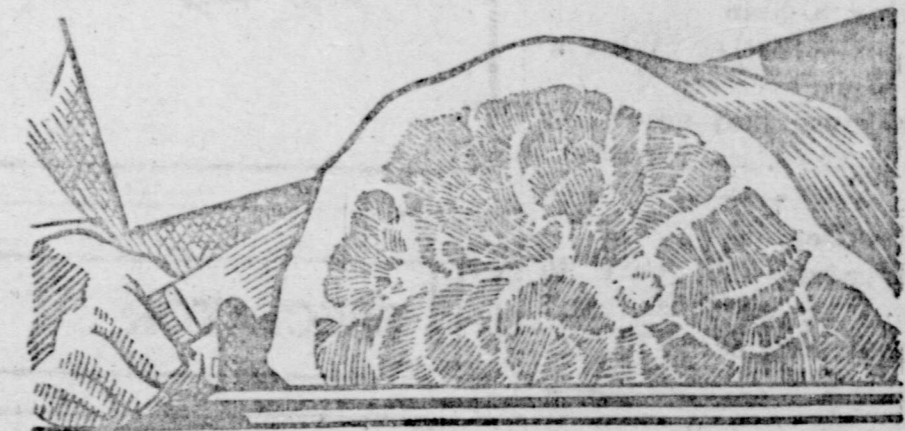

Sudan Growers Set Seed Price At 5 Cents

Sudan growers of several Panhandle Counties, recently met and organized The Sudan Seed Growers Association, with the purpose of securing fair prices for their seed.

From a thorough investigation of conditions, they find the principal causes of the ruinously low prices, evidently due to reports of large yields of seed in California, South Texas and other places.

These reports, in every case, were found to be untrue or greatly exaggerated and have been put out evidently, by speculative buyers, for the purpose of securing the uninformed grower into selling his seed at the present low price.

Sudan seed are used for planting only; planting time is six to eight months away and the big seed buyers do not want to stock up with seed now unless they can buy at a very low speculative price; so a farmer selling his sudan seed now, is like a merchant trying to sell his straw hats in mid-winter.

From our investigation, we believe there will be little if any surplus seed, above the planting demand in the Spring.

Considering all these facts, we ask all growers to cooperate and hold their sudan seed for 5c per pound.

Conditions justify this price, and the planters of small grazing patches (who plant about nine tenths of all seed sold) can afford to pay this price, or even higher.

With your cooperation we will be able to get, reasonably accurate information on amount of seed held if there should be more than will be demanded for planting, we expect to be able to interest the larger growers in holding over, until next year, a sufficient percent of their seed, to take care of such surplus.

There will perhaps be a very small percent of growers, who will have to sacrifice something to get badly needed cash, who will "dump" their for anything they can get but since practically all the larger growers, have already stacked their sudan, and do not even intend to thresh it until near planting time, it seems certain that the small amount of seed that will be "dumped" will supply only a small part of the Spring planting demand and there is no doubt but what the large buyers will pay 5c for enough to finish supplying the Spring demand if they cannot get them for less.

The Association charges no fee for membership and no one is get-

ting any money for services or even for actual expenses.

Your local newspaper is interested enough in helping you get a fair price for your farm products, to print this at its own expense; so we hope you will duly appreciate this cooperation and will cooperate yourself and urge your neighbor grower, to immediately write us a postal card, saying you will associate yourself with us in this effort, giving your name and address, amount of seed you will probably have, and the number of acres of sudan you had in last year, this year and how much you expect to plant next year.

Every grower who refuses, ne-

glects or puts off doing this makes the efforts of the association less effective, this is the least you can do to help yourself get better prices.

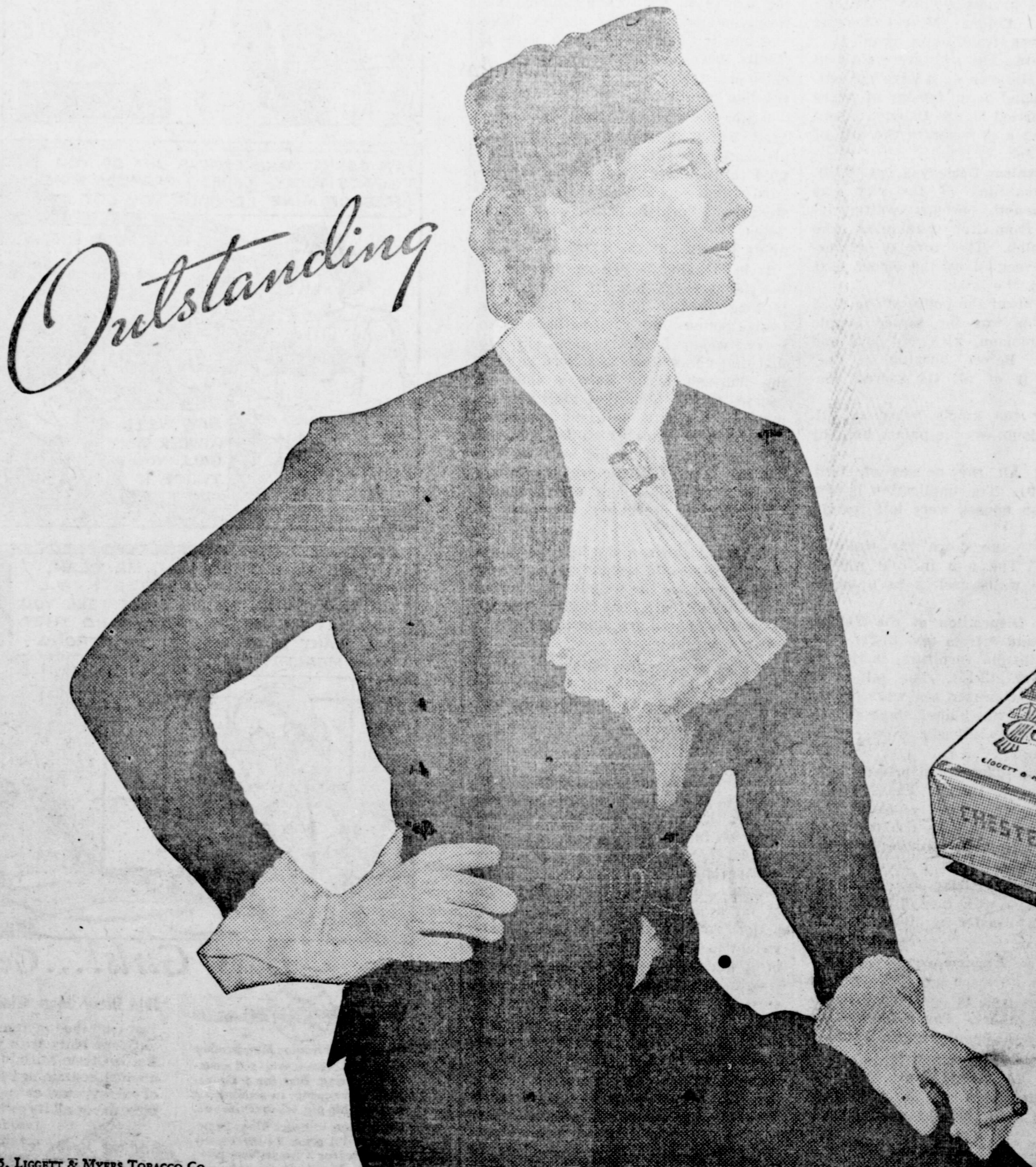
