Crop land harvested in this county in 1934 was more than 62,000 acres less than in 1929. Much of this apparent decline was due to the fact that crop failure in 1934 was almost 77,000 acres as compared with about 17,000 acres in 1929. Assuming no crop failure in either year the crop-DEVELOP- ping intentions were practically the same, or around 150,000 acres. Much of the crop failure in 1934 was due directly to the drought.

Summer grown crops, such as hays, corn, and grain sorghums, were more severely affected by the dry weather than were small grains which matured before the worst part of the drought. Wheat was harvested from 7,606 acres with a production of 57,-187 bushels. 
