Dramatizing what Texas and the whole southwestern territory means to Hart Schaffner & Marx clothes is the central idea around which this famous clothing manufacturer's exhibit at the Dallas Centennial is built, it was announced yesterday by Bryant-Link Company, exclusive local Hart Schaffner & Marx dealer.

"Texas produces more wool than any other state in the Union," Mr. Geo. S. Link said, "and since Texas wool is of exceptionally high quality an unusually large proportion of it goes into Hart Schaffner and Marx

clothes.

"Mohair, extensively used in the blending of rare wools, especially in fine overcoatings, practically all comes from the Angora goat ranches of Texas," Mr. Link stated. "This new and profitable industry is a growth of recent years, as only a comparatively short time ago all mohair was imported from Asia Minor.

"Even southwestern cotton fields contribute their part," Mr. Link emphasized, "since pocket material is made of cotton, and cotton linters form the base from which fine cel-

anese linings are made. And the horns of many a Texas steer go into buttons."

In addition to the Texas scenes, the exhibit which is in the Varied Industries Building, shows from historical and scientific standpoints how the modern business of making fine clothes has grown. The development of men's styles through the ages is depicted in colorful murals; sources of authentic style in Europe and America are photographically shown.

which new patterns and fabrics are created, and all materials are tested for quality, can also be seen in operation," said Mr. Link.

"Lastly, the hidden portions of a suit are exposed to view, with an immense many showing how every continent contributes its choicest materials. "The exhibit is an education in the development of an industry" concluded Mr. Link, "which is second only to the procuring of food in the development of civilization—for man made clothes of a sort before he learned to make a fire."

## Beauty Treatment Is Incomplete Without Care of Eyes

By Jean Prentice

THE fact that proper lighting enables us to see better should be ample reason for having it. But there's a further reason than that; proper illumination actually helps us to look better. Those eye wrinkles that come from continued squinting and eyestrain don't have much chance to form when the light is glareless and abundant.

The question is, however, how to obtain this kind of light conveniently and economically? Well, let's take a typical case; that of the attractive lady in the picture.

The numbers and lines on the illustration have been placed there to help you visualize the relationship between lamps, the position of the eye work and the amount of light as it would be shown by a light meter. By actual measurement it has been proved that when a good-sized table is used for a lamp beside a fairly large comfortable chair, there will be approximately 32 inches between the lamp and the eye work.

### Utilize Light Effectively

When sitting in the average chair, the book or eye work is held about 30 inches from the floor. Under such conditions it is found that 150-watts, or two 75-watt bulbs are needed in the table lamp to obtain on the task the desired amount of light for average eye work—approximately 25 foot-candles. (The foot candle, you know, is the unit of measurement of illumination intensity.) One bulb may of course be turned off when eye work gives way to conversation, and still hold the charm of this grouping.

The lamp shade, you'll notice, has a white lining, a very desirable virtue if we want to utilize the light most effectively. It is tall enough to throw a generous circle of light so that our lady doesn't have to hug close to the

lamp in an uncomfortable position. A lamp with a fortunate combination of important elements in home lighting is:

1. Enough light to do the work.
2. Shaded light to prevent glare and lends attractiveness to the scene.
3. General light to give local light for close eye work.

True beauty demands proper care of the eyes. The right kind of light, properly shaded, and sufficient in quantity, will help to minimize eyestrain, reduce fatigue, and prevent the formation of those tell-tale wrinkles resulting from eye-abuse that do so much to spoil facial attractiveness.
