COOPERATOR MAKES PICKLES

Mrs. W. G. Hinson, cooperator in the Red Top home Demonstration club is making bread and butter pickles this week. She is using a recipe given by the Extension Service of A. and M. College and which has been used by club women in the county for several years.

The recipe calls for 25 large cucumbers, 12 medium sized white onions, 1/2 cup salt, 1 pint vinegar, 2 cups sugar, two tablespoons each of whole mustard seed, ginger and turmeric.

The unpeeled cucumbers should stand in water overnight. Then

slice cucumbers and onions and place in pan with the salt and no water. After standing in the salt one hour, rinse them, add vinegar and spices and cook together until the peel turns yellow which requires about forty minutes. Pack into sterilized jars and seal. They should stand ten days before using. A few sweet peppers may be added.

YARD CONTINUES TO IMPROVE

Mrs. J. J. Griffin, yard improvement demonstrator for the McAdoo home demonstration club, has nearly a solid turf of Bermuda grass on her lawn from seed sowed in February. The grass has been mowed regularly and that has helped it to spread.

The lawn was plowed and leveled and grass seed sowed. The result is a smooth even turf that well repays the owners for the time they have given it.

All of the ten Chinese elms are growing nicely and 12 of the 13 nursery shrubs are doing fine. The Crepe myrtle and butterfly bushes are in full bloom. All of the native shrubs are growing except the native cedar.

The yard is already showing a wonderful improvement and will continue to improve as the shrubs and trees grow.

COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT

"In the second year of our yard improvement work in the county, 515 shrubs and 389 trees were set and many lawns have been and are being set to Bermuda or native buffalo grass," said Mrs. Floyd Barnett, chairman of the county home demonstration council and of the education committee of the council, when that committee made a six month's progress report to the Commissioners' Court last week.

Mrs. Roy Johnson, home food supply demonstrator for the Espuela club sent a report showing that fifty per cent of the home demonstration club members have made meal plans for a week and 75 percent presented prepared vegetables. Dishes for the scoring demonstration in May. One demonstrator has canned more than 100 pints of vegetables toward her budget this summer. Mrs. Johnson included in her report a copy of her food budget for this year

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, composed of three members, whose terms of office shall be for a period of six years, one to be appointed by the Governor, one by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals, such appointments to be with the advice and consent of two thirds of the Senate present; and so as to provide that the Governor of the State shall have the power on the recommendation and advice of the majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons and to remit fines and forfeitures, and, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, to grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in cases of treason; and to provide that the Governor shall have power to grant one reprieve in any capital case not to exceed thirty (30) days; and shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons; and to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to regulate procedure before the Board and to enact parole laws; and to provide for an election for such proposed constitutional amendment, and to make an appropriation therefor.

grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature. "Against the amendment of Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board of Pardons and Paroles, and to make the Governor's pardoning power subject to recommendation of said Board, except in cases of treason the Governor may grant reprieves, commutations and pardons with the advice and consent of the Legislature." Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which does not indicate his desire regarding the above proposed amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the above proposed amendment published in the manner and for the time required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy. R. B. Stanford, Secretary of State.

S. J. R. NO. 14

A JOINT RESOLUTION

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows: "Section 11. There is hereby created a Board of Pardons and Paroles, to be composed of three members, who shall have been resident citizens of the State of Texas for a period of not less than two years immediately preceding such appointment, each of whom shall hold office for a term of six years, provided that of the members of the first board appointed, one shall serve for two years, one for four years and one for six years from the first day of February, 1937, and they shall cast lots for their respective terms. One member of said Board shall be appointed by the Governor, one member by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, and one member by the presiding Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals; the appointments of all members of said Board shall be made with the advice and consent of two thirds of the Senate present. Each vacancy shall be filled by the respective appointing power that theretofore made the appointment to such position and the appointive powers shall have the authority to make recess appointments until the convening of the Senate. In all criminal cases, except treason and impeachment, the Governor shall have power, after conviction, on the written signed recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, or a majority thereof, to grant reprieves and commutations of punishment and pardons; and under such rules as the Legislature may prescribe, and upon the written recommendation and advice of a majority of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, he shall have the power to remit fines and forfeitures. The Governor shall have the power to grant one reprieve in any capital case for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days; and he shall have the power to revoke paroles and conditional pardons. With the advice and consent of the Legislature, he may grant reprieves, commutations of punishment and pardons in case of treason. The Legislature shall have power to regulate procedure before the Board of Pardons and Paroles and shall receive it to keep record of its actions and the reasons therefor and shall have authority to enact parole laws."

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salaries of certain constitutional officers by amending Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars per annum; by amending Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars per annum; by amending Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum and by amending Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making an appropriation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000) Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that the amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1937." Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: "Sec. 22 The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, and no more."

Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Sec. 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars, and no more; reside at the Capitol of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury." Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars and no more." Sec. 5. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) dollars per annum; the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum, and the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum." And those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the State Constitution fixing the salary of the Governor at Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars per annum;

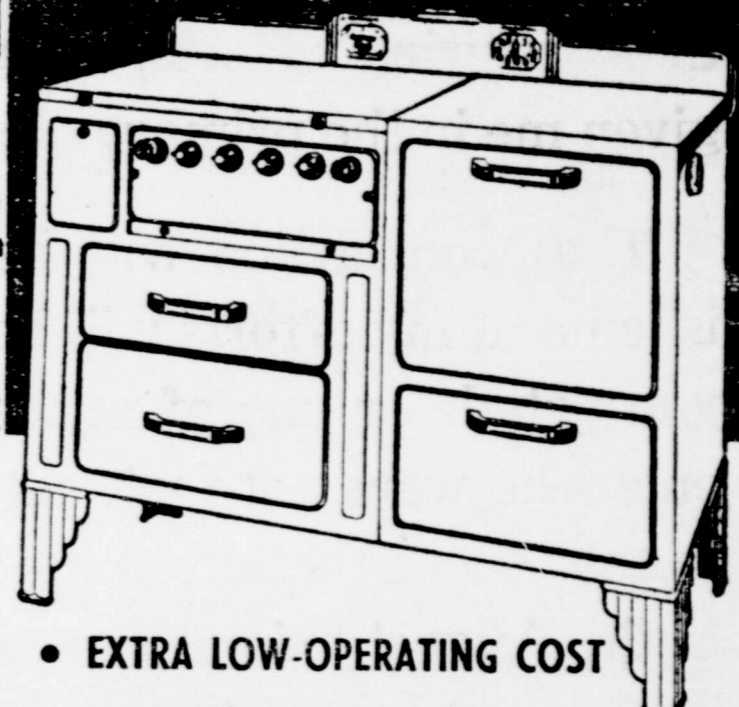
the salary of the Attorney General at Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars per annum; the salary of the Comptroller, Treasurer, and Commissioner of the General Land Office at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum, and the salary of the Secretary of State at Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars per annum." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution. Sec. 6. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. Sec. 7. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy. R. B. STANFORD, Secretary of State.

And those opposed to said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of Texas, limiting every county to not more than seven (7) Representatives under any apportionment unless said county shall have a population of more than seven hundred thousand (700,000) people as ascertained by the most recent United States Census in which event such county shall be entitled to one additional Representative to each one hundred thousand (100,000) population in excess of seven hundred thousand (700,000) population." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the voters are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas, is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election. The above is a true and correct copy. R. B. STANFORD, Secretary of State.

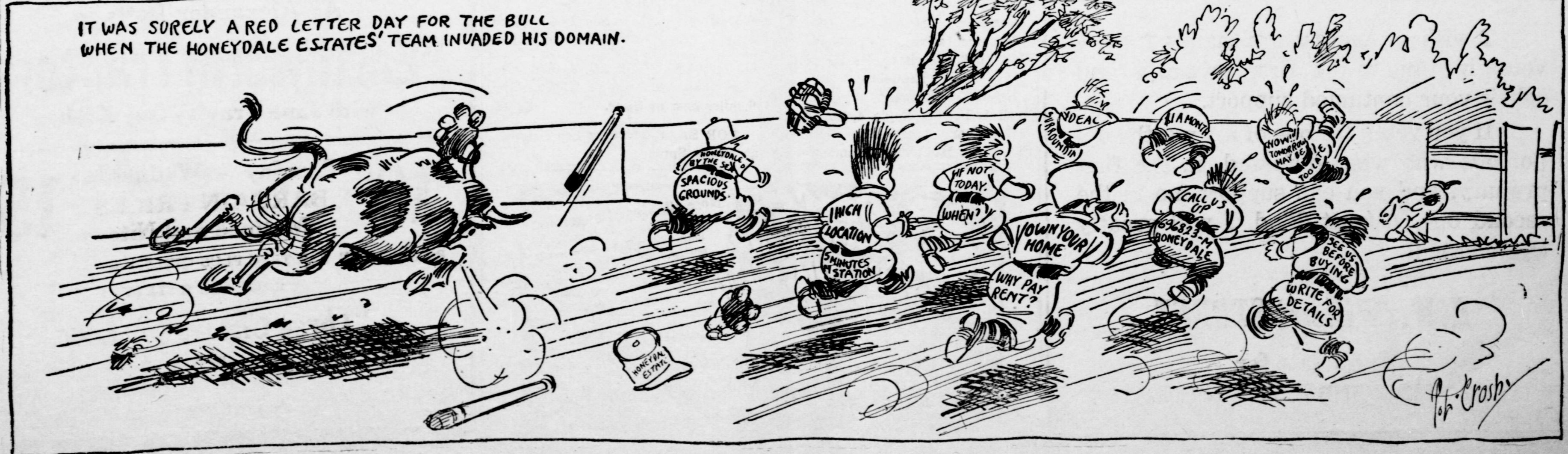
