District Court Meets Dec. 14th

District Court will convene at Dickens, Monday, December 14. be on the bench as presiding judge and District Attorney Alton B. Chapman and County Attorney L. D. Ratliff, Jr. will represent the state.

The heaviest docket in several years with one murder case faces the court this term.

285 Miles Road Work In Program of **WPA** District

Lubbock, Dec. 2 .-- More t han two hundred and eightw-five miles of roadwork are included in the Lubbock District WPA program, according to District director J. O. Jones.

Based upon statistics of September 15 WPA records show that workers in the Lubbock District have completed repairs and improve ments on 213 miles of lateral roads and that work is progressing upon an additional 71 miles.

"In addition to providing work for needy unemployed persons in this area, the road program has been one of the most beneficial types of public improvement under taken by this organization," Jones declared. "In many instances these all-weather roads established by WPA workers replaced roads formerly impassable in rainy weather. Farm people living along these routes are no longer dependent upon the weather in getting to market. School busses and mail marriers are able to maintain schedules with less difficulty. City and rural dwellers alike will realize gratifying returns for years to come from the investment which WPA and the counties have made on these roads."

Counties which have shared in the district road program include Bailey, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Hale, Hall, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Motley, Parmer, and Swisher.

State Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought has recently announced that 6.333 miles of roads have been built in Texas during the past twelve months and that projects still in operation encompass the improvement of an additional 3,724 miles. Reaching into 214 and everyone should buy their tickcounties, the program has been financed by WPA grants of \$9,182,- pupils. 946 and sponsors' expenditure of \$3,957,224. Of the 9,957 miles of roads included in the Texas WPA program, 9,507 are classified as farm-to-market roads. Such projects have provided jobs for an average of 26,300 needy Texans during the past year.

December. Meat Cutting and Curing Demonstration Conducted On the J. C. Dopson Farm

A group of nine farmers met at faction and appreciation of this J. C. Dopson's farm on Monday the method of killing, and as to how 30th to learn the improved methods clear the meat appeared when cut in butchering and curing meat as up the next day. demonstrated by County Agent, G.

Three choice hogs were used in the demonstration. The hogs having been fed out by the self-feeder method of feeding. They weighed approximately 275 pounds each at the age of 7 months, which is the ideal for production of choice feat.

The hogs were butchered by the use of the bleeding method, which assures a carcass free from bloodshot shoulders and other objectionable features resulting from improper bleeding. Those attending the demonstration expressed satis- mains until ready for use.

After the hogs were killed and dressed they were sawed down the middle of the back bone and left to cool over night. The next day the meat trimmed and placed in a cure consisting of 8 lbs. salt, 3 lbs. brown sugar, 3 oz. saltpetre to the hundred pounds of curable meat, which is the A. & M. way of curing meat. The meat is left in this preparation a day and one-half per lb. for bacons and 3 days per lb. for hams and shoulders; and then taken out of the cure, the surplus salt washed off, smoked and put into refined cottonseed oil where it re-
